Portland advanced one notch higher in the race for the pennant yesterday afternoon by defeating Charlie Graham's Braves by 5 to 0. The Beavers were in the game from the start and the Senators didn't stand much show at any stage of the game, for the "Little Giant" Jesse Garrett, was on the firing line and beat everything needed for a whitewash. Five hits were all the Sacramento boys collected off Garrett's delivery.

Ote Johnson hitted one of "Spider" Baum's aunts over the left field fence in the first inning with Jack Graney on base. The hit was one of the longest ever made on the home grounds, going over the fence about 20 feet high and at the rate of about a mile a minute.

The "Terrible Swede" also cut off a hit from the bat of Myers in the seventh frame and threw him out at first.

The Beavers annexed one tally in the fourth frame on a base on balls to Johnson, a sacrifice by McCredie and Ort's infield hit. The home guard scored two more in the seventh. Garrett got a hit to right and came home on Olson's two bagger to left. Graney came through with an infield hit, his third for the day, and scored the Brains shortstop.

The visitors had two men on bases with none out in the fourth inning but couldn't score.

FIVE TEAMS JOIN LEAGUE AND MORE COMING.

Sunday Games to Be Played This Year—Cup for Champion Team, Medals for Members.

Five strong teams applied for admission to the Portland association football league at a meeting of the Portland Football Association last night, all being accepted after discussion showed that a satisfactory schedule could be arranged. They were the Nationals, represented by Jack Coxon; the Queens' Park, represented by William Richmond; Balfour-Guthrie & Co., by Arthur Hayes; the Cricketers, by Harold Phil; and Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club, by Don Kydd. Another meeting will be held a week from tonight at which applications from any other teams will be considered and arrangements made to draw up a schedule. Games will start the last week in October or first week in November.

Both Saturday and Sunday ball will be played this year. The Multnomah and Balfour-Guthrie teams can play only one week day, the Queens' Park and Cricketers are nominally restricted to Sunday ball, while the Nationals can play either. It was found, however, that holiday fixtures would make it possible for all teams to get together without involving the Sunday teams in more than two Saturdays during the entire season.

The entrance fee to the city league this year was cut from \$15 to \$10. The Portland Football Association being in good financial condition. A cup will be put up for the league champions, in addition to which each member of the winning team was to receive a medal. Medals of less value will be given the runners-up.

The meeting was pronounced the best soccer promoters have had since the game was introduced here and the season's outlook, in view of the Sunday ball innovation and the high quality of the teams entered, is particularly good. PENNANT WINNERS READY FOR FRAY

Pittsburg and Detroit Warm Up for First of World's Series.

MEN FOR MOUND CHOSEN

PITTSBURG, Oct. 7.—Detroit, the American League champions, and Pittsburg, the winners of the National League pennant, will meet here tomorrow in the opening game of the series which will decide the baseball championship of the world for 1909.

It will be Detroit's third attempt in as many years to win the greatest honors in organized baseball. Pittsburg has not had an opportunity for contesting for the world's championship since 1905, when it won the National League pennant, and was defeated by the Boston Americans in the big series.

It is expected that 20,000 persons will see the first game. THOUSANDS SEEK TICKETS

Some of them took possession at the head of the line soon after midnight. To talk ticket scalpers only two tickets were sold to an individual. The supply was exhausted long before the demand had been satisfied. Only general admission tickets are now left for the two games.

BROOKLYN'S PROTEST FAILS

Heidler Refuses to Change Standings of National League.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—President Heidler, of the National League, has refused to reconsider the protest of the Brooklyn club to the game played with Chicago in Brooklyn on September 2. This game resulted in a Chicago victory by a score of 10 to 4, 8 of Chicago's runs being scored in the ninth inning.

President Heidler finds merit in Brooklyn's contention that the umpire should have stopped the game at the time previously agreed upon by the managers of the respective teams, but he does not feel justified in throwing out the championship game and altering the standings of the clubs involved.

The umpire of the game said that the Brooklyn club had adopted dilatory tactics when it was in danger of being beaten.

NATIONALS WIND UP SEASON

Pennant Floats Over Pittsburg. With Chicago Close Contender.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—With the pennant floating securely over the Pittsburg clubhouse for the next 12 months, the 1909 championship baseball season of the National League passed into history today. Boston and Brooklyn won the final victories of the season, the former defeating Philadelphia and the latter New York.

Pittsburg's victory has been widely predicted since May 8, when the team assumed an aggressive lead. Creative, finishing second, has held a threatening position all along, however, and the result was not clinched until September 28.

New York finished third and Cincinnati fourth. The disappointments of the year were the Brooklyn, St. Louis and Boston clubs.
