

PROSECUTE HEAD OF GEORGE MEYERS

Governor Offers \$1000 Reward for Capture of Salem Murderer.

SHERIFF IS STILL ACTIVE

In Addition to State's Offer, Three Other Amounts, Making Total of \$1100 Are Hung Up for Slayer of Policeman.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—Tonight George Meyers, slayer of Policeman Tom Eckhart, sleeps in some farmer's granary or hayrack with a price upon his head.

After an hour's discussion of the case this afternoon with Sheriff Minto, Governor Benson issued a proclamation offering a reward of \$1000 for the arrest, detention or advice of Meyers.

The announcement of the reward is expected to instill new vigor into the man hunt and bring about some definite results.

The reward is offered under Chapter 49, laws of 1905, under which Governor Chamberlain twice offered rewards for the capture of murderers.

Sheriff Minto declares there is no reason for criticism of the officers in connection with the hunt of the Meyers boy.

He said today all I could all the time. The pursuit has never been given up.

My deputies all over the county and the officers of neighboring counties have been posted and are on the lookout for Meyers.

I received information that made it seem certain Meyers was on the way to his claim.

We went there and were out of touch with the world for nearly two days. Before I went into the woods I left orders for the boys to follow a certain plan, but they failed to understand the arrangement and the trail was lost.

However, the chase has never been given up and will not be until the fugitive is captured.

Sheriff Minto says he has no definite information as to the recent movements of the fugitive, but intimates that it was he who was seen south of town Sunday and that Meyers was then working back toward Salem.

It is understood that no word has yet been received from J. L. Combs, his messenger of Meyers Brothers, who has gone out in an effort to induce the fugitive to come in and surrender.

The County Court is now considering the plan of offering a reward of \$500. There is already a reward of \$50 offered by the city, \$25 by Chief Gibson and \$25 by Sheriff Minto, making a total at this time of \$1100.

The grand jury, which will meet in adjourned session Saturday, it is learned tonight from reliable authority, will take up the case of George Meyers.

In the minds of the officers there is no question that an indictment charging Meyers with first degree murder will be returned.

It is expected the grand jury will also return an indictment on Saturday against Arthur (Mole) Meyers on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon as the result of an encounter between Arthur Meyers and a hooligan named Al Allen.

Arthur Meyers summoned politician Tom Eckhart to the room occupied by the Meyers boys to elect George Meyers, which action by the politician led to the killing of the officer.

explosion of Sunday. Going on to the mule barn, they were further greeted by the faint mewling of a very grumpy kitten which was the mascot of the shaft and made its home in the mule barn. The astounded rescuers quickly watered and fed the famishing animals, for it is the first drop of water or food they have had since Sunday morning. The kitten was very tenderly carried to the surface by the rescue party.

Hope Strong for Jones. The finding of mules and kitten alive now leads to a strong hope that John E. Jones, the young pumptank, is still alive. The station where Jones was working is over 500 feet farther away from the shaft than where the mule barn is located, and if the mules survived the explosion there seems a possibility that Jones, and perhaps Penrich and Tomack, who were working on the 11th west, some distance from the shaft, may still be alive. As Jones' pumping station is 260 feet from the shaft, many have strong hope that he is alive.

This morning General Superintendent J. F. Menzies appointed Mine Inspector R. F. W. Thomas to take charge of clearing and putting the shaft in order and made the discovery. Ernest W. Haas, one of the proprietors of the store, identified the goods, and took them back to the store. No traces has been found of the men who committed the theft, however.

SMUGGLERS WORRY HAWAII. Island Customs Officers Ask for Cutter to Watch Jap Sampans.

HONOLULU, Oct. 7.—Customs officers at this port are urging that a revenue cutter be assigned to the station to watch the Japanese power boats, which have a wide cruising radius and for the most part are constantly on watch to prevent poaching and smuggling.

More than 30 Japanese-owned fishing sampans have been seized at the pier and the customs officers are unable to keep close watch on them.

The steamer of the transport Buford, which arrived from Manila yesterday, report that they observed one of these sampans, the Keo Maru, lying at anchor near Bird Island last Tuesday.
