

DR. WU PROBES REALM OF PSYCHIC

Chinese Minister Entertained
by Spiritualist Medium
at Washington.

MANY QUESTIONS ASKED

Woman's Answer Brings Shrug to
Shoulders and Exclamation of
Significant "Um"—Oriental
Will Investigate Further.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Having satisfied himself regarding the technique of flying machines when he visited Wilbur Wright at College Park, Md., and piled with all sorts of questions, Dr. Wu Tingfang, the Chinese minister to the United States, tonight turned his attention to spiritualism and took his first plunge into the mysteries of the spirit world.

He attended a meeting of the temple league of Spiritualists, where he was informed by a medium that half a dozen spirits hovered by his side.

From the time the "human interrogation mark," as Wu has become known here, entered the hall he was all open-eyed attention.

Dr. Wu's Attention Keen.

When Mrs. Hennen, regarded as a very good medium by the Spiritualists, took the floor and asked whether any one was present who had never received a message from the spirit world, Dr. Wu signified that he was such. Mrs. Hennen declared that she was standing by the Chinese Minister's side, a woman of his own country with two children. She said she had not been given their names, but described them to him and remarked that if during the evening the names were given her by the spirits, she would make them known to him. While she gave spirit messages, names and descriptions of spirits to persons in the audience, Dr. Wu watched and listened with the keenest attention.

Shoulders Give Significant Shrug.

When the meeting came to a close Dr. Wu sought out the different mediums and interrogated them.

"Why is it I cannot see the spirits?" "How long have you been trying to see the spirits?" asked Dr. Wu.

When answered that the power was a gift and that the medium had been able to see the spirits since she was a child, Dr. Wu shrugged his shoulders and uttered a significant "Um."

Many were the questions he asked before he left, and it was not until he left that the spiritualist leader learned who her visitor was.

Before leaving, Dr. Wu carefully inquired regarding future meetings, and gave the impression that he intended to investigate further.

AGED WOMAN DIES ALONE

Son Returns Home After Several
Days to Find Mother Dead.

MONMOUTH, Or., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—Mrs. Heaster A. Herren, a widow, aged 74 years, who had been living alone in a small house for the past few weeks in the main residence part of the town, was found dead last evening.

An examination of the body showed she had been dead two or three days, but as she frequently went away to stay with relatives for a few days at a time none of the neighbors called to look after her, and her death was not discovered until her son, William Herren, called to see her.

Deceased was a pioneer of Kings Valley in Benton County and well known to many of the early settlers, and was apparently in good health when last seen.

PREDICT ANOTHER STORM

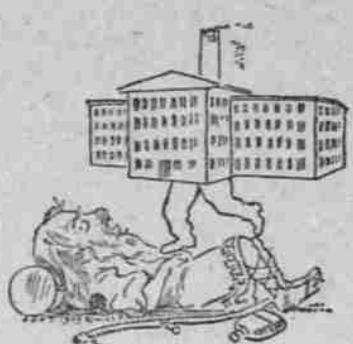
Weather Forecaster Sends Warning

\$18,000 CHURCH BUDGET

DR. BROUGHER TELLS NEEDS
OF WHITE TEMPLE.

Congregation Supports Four Missionaries—"Lot's Wife" Is Theme of Pastor's Sermon.

The White Temple's budget this year will be \$18,000, of which \$12,000 is to defray its own expenses and \$6,000 for the support of its missionaries. Yesterday was rally day at the church. Dr. Brougher presented to the members of the congregation at the morning service the needs of the church, and told of the plans for the year's work.

A registration of all the members of the church present was taken, and the budget was submitted to the church members for subscriptions. As there are 1000 resident members in the First Baptist Church, the average each member contributes \$1.80 a year to the church. Dr. Brougher asked all his church members to adopt the tithe system, saying, if this were done, the church's budget would be about \$38,500 a year. The pastor thought the average wage of the church members would be at least \$1 a day, a tenth of which would bring this amount.

The White Temple supports four missionaries, two in China, and two in India. Rev. and Mrs. P. J. White, in the United States on a furlough from Shanghai, China, will speak at the White Temple October 21.

The annual business meeting of the White Temple was held last Thursday night, when officers were elected. Rev. John Brougher, for four years assistant pastor to Dr. Brougher in Patterson, N. J., was elected to fill a similar post at the White Temple.

MAGNETS MEET TONIGHT

Re-Election of Lucas Considered
and Class A Standing Sought.

SEATTLE, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The annual meeting of the Northwestern League magnets will be held tomorrow evening in the Seattle Hotel. It was originally scheduled for last Saturday evening, but owing to the absence of Judge McCredie, of Portland, was postponed. In addition to routine business, President Lucas will undoubtedly be re-elected and the circuit question will be discussed. There is hope that Portland will cast her lot with the Northwestern. The pennant will be awarded to Seattle.

Everything indicates an unusually harmonious meeting. President Joe Cohen, of Spokane, will bring up the matter of putting the rights of the Northwestern to class A before the National Association at its next annual meeting. He will undoubtedly be selected as a delegate in the past, the Northwestern delegates have not accomplished anything in this direction.

BULLFIGHT TRUST FORMED

Cups to Be Offered to Encourage
Prize-winning Animals.

BILBAO, Spain, Oct. 10.—The proprietors of the bull rings in the north of Spain have formed an association which aims at the regulation and encouragement of this national sport.

According to the regulations just drawn up bull rings are to be divided into three categories—those that have a capacity of 15,000 spectators or over, those seating 10,000 and those that seat 5,000.

Every seven years a gold cup is to be awarded to the bull farm that produces the last line of bulls which are fattest as fighters. The prize will be valued at 15,000 pesetas.

THUGS GET \$10 AND WATCH

Man Waylaid at Tenth and Yamhill
Mum About Self.

Saying he had been held up and robbed by two highwaymen at Tenth and Yamhill streets, a young man, about 25 years old, appeared at police headquarters shortly after midnight and told Captain Slover the story of the robbery, refusing to give his name, address or occupation. Patrolman Wendorf and Jailer Robeson took the victim of the holding to the scene of the robbery in the police automobile and a search was made for the men for several blocks each way in the vicinity, but without success. He then got out at Tenth and Taylor streets and walked south. He said he was robbed of \$10 and a gold watch.

BALLOONS NOT SUCCESS

PORTOLA CUP CONTESTANTS

COME TO GRIEF IN BAY.

"Queen of the Pacific" and "City of Oakland" Fail in Attempted Race and Lives Endangered.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—The balloons "Queen of the Pacific" and "City of Oakland," which started late today in a preliminary race for the silver cup offered by the Portola committee to the airship first reaching San Jose, came to grief in the waters of the bay late tonight and the crews were rescued by a launch.

The Queen, which was entered by the Pacific Aero Club, and was christened today, descended to the water off Dumbarton Point and was abandoned there tonight when the launch took off the crew, Captain Ivy Edgwin and Jack Irvine, as the aeronauts were preparing to swim ashore.

The Oakland finally dropped to the water near Yerba Buena Island, only a few miles from the starting point, and A. Van Tassel, the aeronaut, was taken off by a launch. The engine of the launch broke down and the boat did not reach here until midnight.

The pilot balloon, Fairy, which led the way, made a successful landing inland from Dumbarton Point. Light air, with no prevailing current at an altitude reached, caused the balloons to circle about over the bay, making but little progress to the south.

AGED PROFESSOR DIES.

BOSTON, Oct. 10.—Dr. John P. Reynolds, for 50 years a professor in the Harvard Medical School, died today, aged 83 years.

SOCIALISTS FLAY TAFT

NEAR-RIOT STARTS IN LOS ANGELES MEETING.

Clubs of Police Are Effective and
Denunciators Are Broken Up
With Arrest of Leaders.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10.—A Socialist mass meeting at which speeches were made denouncing President Taft resulted in a near-riot here tonight, and the dispersal of a mob by the police.

The police swooped down and arrested three of the radical leaders. They will be held incommunicado as long as President Taft, who arrives tomorrow, is in the city.

Immediately after the raid another Socialist speaker organized a party from among the audience at the mass meeting. Shouting, they marched toward the police station to make a demonstration. But the police met them half a block from the jail and, with clubs ready for action, charged the crowd, which quickly dispersed.
