

GATEMEN LET OUT; ACCUSED OF GRAFT

Seattle Fair Makes Wholesale
Discharge of Its Em-
ployees.

\$28,000 REPORTED LOST

Newspaper Alleges That "Higher-
ups" Are Involved—Discharged
Men Take Case to Court to
Seek Vindication.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—All the gatemen at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition were discharged Saturday night, it being alleged that all of them had participated in or known of scalping at the turnstiles.

The Times today says that the gatemen were organized into a syndicate with some of their superiors and that money stolen was placed in bank, to be divided later. The fund so collected amounted to \$28,000 at the time the thing was discovered and stopped. The method of the gatemen, whose turnstiles were unlocked by slipping a coin into a slot, was to catch the gate before it had registered, pull it back, take in another person and pocket his coin.

Petty Thieving Overlooked.

"The gatemen were let out by my order. We are not prosecuting any petty thieves. We had evidence that two or three men were stealing, but that did not matter. The others were inefficient or they would have reported the thieves going on. There is no truth to statements that the ticket-boxes were stuffed on Seattle or any other day, and we have no shortages to account for."—President Childers, of the A-Y-P.

A score of the Exposition gatemen caught in the wholesale discharges in the admission department of the A-Y-P held a meeting in their assembly room in the Auditorium building this morning and formed a temporary organization. A committee was appointed to handle the matter and an attorney will be employed to immediately to attempt to wipe out what the men say is an indelible stain to their reputations.

Men Demand Vindication.

"Just because these 'higher up' caught two of three gatemen stealing, they discharged the entire bunch of us, branding all of us as thieves. It is not the week's work that we are fighting for now, although all of us have reported for work and we have never been officially dismissed, but it is vindication, and we are going to get it," said A. J. McCord, one of the discharged gatemen.

STOPS EMIGRANT FRAUDS

Japan Takes Elaborate Precautions
in Issuing Passports.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Japan has taken additional and unusual precautions to prevent substitution of passports among Japanese emigrants coming to the United States. Under new regulations, emigrants are photographed by the police at their place of domicile and duplicates are forwarded to the police officials at the port of departure.

After being examined by an American medical officer they are advised that they are free from any disease, are bathed and disinfected and put on board ship. One hour before sailing, during inspection, passports together with duplicate photographs are handed to emigrants. These photographs are taken up by the police officers on board ship. The impress of thumb marks also is required upon passports.

POPULAR PARTY GAINING

Russian Election Strengthens Dem-
ocrats in Douma.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 11.—M. St. Chepkin, a Constitutional Democrat, has been elected to the Douma from Moscow to fill the vacancy created by the death of an Octoberist member. M. Brodsky was elected from Odessa and succeeds a Constitutional Democrat, M. Pergament, deceased.

The result of the election is an especially noteworthy victory for the opposition.

HASTY WEDDING MISTAKE

Bride of Four Days Has Husband
Arrested for Fraud.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 11.—Mrs. Elizabeth Ruch, who last Friday married Richard Kuprow, under the impression he was a German Count, caused the arrest of her husband on a warrant when she learned he had another wife.

Mrs. Ruch married Kuprow after two hours' acquaintance. Her husband told her he was a schoolmate of Emperor William and an heir to an estate in Germany.

EDWARD TO CALL BLUFF

King Refuses to Accept No Comprom-
ise Idea on Budget.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—The "no compromise on the budget" banner, nailed to the staff by David Lloyd-George and Winston Churchill, has not been accepted by King Edward as disposing finally of his hope of reconciling the warring factions.

The King is returning to London today. He intends to consult and advise party leaders.

CLATSOP SANDS HOLD OIL

Valuable Deposits Believed to Un-
derlie Beach Deposits.

ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—While work has been stopped temporarily at least, on sinking the oil well at the Hess place, on account of the

parties who had agreed to give leases on their property having withdrawn their leases as soon as flows of oil and gas were found, the indications are that the oil properties of this section will soon be developed, as the attention of outside parties is being attracted to them.

That oil and gas in considerable quantities exist here has long been known by parties who have conducted investigations and today H. C. Harrison and W. B. Bennett were successful in an experiment of extracting crude petroleum from rock, which is found in almost endless quantities in this section. The rock used in the experiment was a specimen of hydraulic limestone, which was taken from a ledge containing hundreds of thousands of tons, and which is the crudest kind of a rock that was employed, a considerable quantity of oil was obtained.

In this connection it may be stated that a few years ago the body of cement rock that is located on the north side of the river was drilled for the purpose of ascertaining its depth and directly under it quite a body of oil was found.

Another interesting experiment that was made by Messrs. Harrison and Bennett was the extracting of paraffine from sand secured along the beaches and which contains the oil product that in the finds made at Nehalem and even so far north as Cannon Beach had been so often described as "beeswax."

PEABODY MAKES ATTACK

BOSTONIAN LAUNCHES INVEC-
TIVE AT CHRISTIAN SCIENCE.

In White Temple Declares Mrs. Ed-
dy's Work "Efforts to Cause Dis-
ease and to Kill."

Not only did Frederick W. Peabody, a Boston lawyer, make the charge before an audience at the White Temple last night that Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, the founder of Christian Science, is an impostor, but he charged her with being a liar, and with attempting murder. He said also he believes the woman to be crazy, and thinks when her will is offered for probate it will be broken by the testimony of all those who have examined her.

The White Temple was crowded last night and many ministers occupied seats on the platform. Peabody characterized the work of Christian Science as "a skin game worked for the benefit of the inner circle of grafters." He went on to tell that she charged in tuition \$300 in advance for 12 lessons covering three weeks' time.

"The speaker continued in substance as follows: 'Mrs. Eddy says there is a mysterious power, by which disease can be caused by mental power, without the knowledge of the victim. She says this power may cause an estrangement in the family and may even cause death.'

"Several years ago Mrs. Eddy hated a man by the name of Spofford. Well, she tried to kill Spofford. She asked her friends to come to her house and to do as she said, and to take up Spofford in their thoughts, thinking of him as a diseased condition, and just as hard as they could think of him, and never succeeded in doing him any harm that way.

"Mrs. Eddy also hated a man named Richard Kennedy. I examined a man named Frank Brewster, and he said that he was instructed to think Richard Kennedy's lungs in a diseased condition."

The speaker heaped much abuse on the Christian Scientists, and especially the founder of the sect. He alleges he can prove the accusations made. At the close of his talk he asked for questions, and some of those sent up to him he read and answered.

CHURCHMEN IN CONVENTION

Followers of Alexander Campbell
Meet in Pittsburg.

PITTSBURG, Oct. 11.—Thousands of members of the Christian Church today attended the opening session of the centennial of their denomination.

One hundred years ago, in an unpretentious structure of logs in the vicinity of Pittsburgh, Alexander Campbell gathered a handful of worshippers about him and started the first denomination now known as the Disciples of Christ.

More than 50,000 members will be here for the celebration of that event, it is estimated.

Tonight sessions of the convention were held in Carnegie Hall and Luna Park Pavilion. The delegates were welcomed by the city officials. Responses were made by Rev. A. W. Rankin, Adelaide, Australia, and Rev. R. L. McHatter, of San Francisco.

Among the distinguished visitors are C. C. Chapman, known as the California orange king; K. Ishikawa, of Tokio, Japan, president of the Drake Bible College of that city, and six ministers from Australia.

FERRERA MUST PAY LIFE

Barcelona Revolutionary Leader
Sentenced to Die.

MADRID, Oct. 11.—Ferrera, former director of the Modern School at Barcelona, who has been on trial here on the charge of having been the principal instigator of the recent revolutionary movement, has been sentenced to death. He will be shot Wednesday night.

The court-martial was divided in the verdict, some of the members absolutely opposing the death sentence. Ferrera was transferred to Monjuich under heavy escort, and he is kept in close confinement.

His transfer to the fortress is said to have been due to fear on the part of the authorities that a rescue might be attempted.

Ferrera's recent arrest caused much agitation in Spain, France and Italy.

POPE MAKES NEW RULES

Bishops Must Visit Vatican Once
Every Five Years.

ROME, Oct. 11.—New rules affecting the bishops throughout the world were made known at the Vatican today. These prescribe that the bishops shall be allowed two years following their appointment in which to arrange the canonical visitations in their dioceses.

Five years after that they must satisfy the obligation of visiting the Pope, which visits to be repeated once in every five years.

GUN EXPLODES, KILLS TWO

Can't Stand Test and Flies in Frag-
ments Among Troops.

JUNCTION CITY, Kan., Oct. 11.—Two men were killed and six injured on the Fort Riley military reservation today by the explosion of a four-inch gun during military tests.

The explosion, it is said, was due to a defect in the gun.

YOUNG DESPERADO ROBS AND SHOTS

Arrested, He Coaxes Deputy
Into Bank and Holds
Up Cashier.

LOCKS BOTH MEN IN VAULT

Trilled Home, He Shoots Policeman
and Again Escapes—Kansas
Town Terrorized by Youth
of Only 18 Years.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Oct. 11.—Scores of armed citizens are searching tonight for Earl Bullock, an 18-year-old desperado, who robbed the State Bank at Eudora today and later perhaps fatally wounded Policeman Wilson Pringle, who attempted to arrest him at his mother's home here. Bullock was arrested in Eudora by Deputy Sheriff Woods today on a charge of robbing a store here. Desiring to talk with E. E. Wilson, cashier of the State Bank in Eudora, the deputy took the boy to the bank with him.

While Woods and Wilson were talking, Bullock drew two revolvers and ordered them to throw up their hands. Then he marched them into a vault and locked the door. Snatching up \$1000, he fled.

Two hours later citizens released the two men from the bank vault and a search for Bullock was started.

Pringle traced the boy to his mother's home and went there tonight to capture him. Bullock shot the policeman down and made a successful dash for liberty.

FANATICS FLEE FROM FIRE

Russian Colony in Los Angeles Is
Driven From Home by Flames.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 11.—Whether a fire which destroyed nine buildings in Little Russia tonight was of incendiary origin, is a question which is puzzling the police and fire departments. Because of their weird religious belief, warrants for disturbing the peace were issued against 18 Russians last night.

The fire which swept through the Russian colony on North Glass street, caused damage amounting to \$5000, rendered 100 persons homeless and consumed eight houses.

German Dreadnought Tried.

BREMEN, Oct. 11.—The battleship Westfalen, the first vessel of the super-dreadnought type built for the German navy, in a trial trip today developed a speed of 20 knots, while her engines indicated 24,000 horsepower. Her contract calls for a speed of 19 knots with 20,000 horsepower.

CARVER PROJECT WAITS

Eugene Has Second Scheme for
Railroad to Deep Water.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the Eugene Commercial Club tonight to consider Stephen Carver's proposition to build a railroad from this city to Elmira, for a bonus of \$4000 and the right of way, it was unanimously decided to defer definite action for the present.

At the meeting members of the Lane County Lumber Company explained that they had now pending for approval from Eastern railroad people a project to construct a road from Eugene to Coos Bay, a line of sentiment of the meeting was in favor of the road to deep water.

W. J. SNODGRASS IS DEAD

Prominent Citizen of La Grande
Passes Away in Portland.

W. J. Snodgrass, of La Grande, a prominent citizen and planter of Eastern Oregon, died yesterday at the Mountain View Sanatorium, aged 66. Mr. Snodgrass suffered a stroke of paralysis two years ago, and never fully recovered his health.

He was returning from British Columbia three weeks ago, when he was seized with illness and was removed to the sanatorium. He sank gradually until the end.

Remains were taken to Finley's undertaking establishment and will be forwarded today to La Grande, where the funeral will be held.

\$10,000 MAY BE HIS LOOT

Express Company Refuses to Say
How Much Robber Got.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 12.—Although the officials of the Great Northern Express Company have declined to make public the amount of money secured by the lone thug who robbed the express office in the King-street passenger station yesterday morning, police detectives are authority for the statement that it may reach \$10,000.

It is also said the robber overlooked gold, silver and currency in the safe amounting to between \$15,000 and \$20,000. As yet the police have been unable to find any trace of the hold-up man.

FALLS FROM OCEAN LINER

Woman Drowned From President in
Straits of Fuca.

SEATTLE, Oct. 12.—Miss Malvina Mourrain, aged 37, of Bethany, Cal., leaped overboard from the President while the steamer was passing through the Strait of Juan de Fuca yesterday. Although she had just written several letters to friends in Bethany, Cal., Miss Mourrain did not indicate in the letters that she was about to kill herself.

Miss Mourrain and her brother were on their way to Seattle to visit relatives.

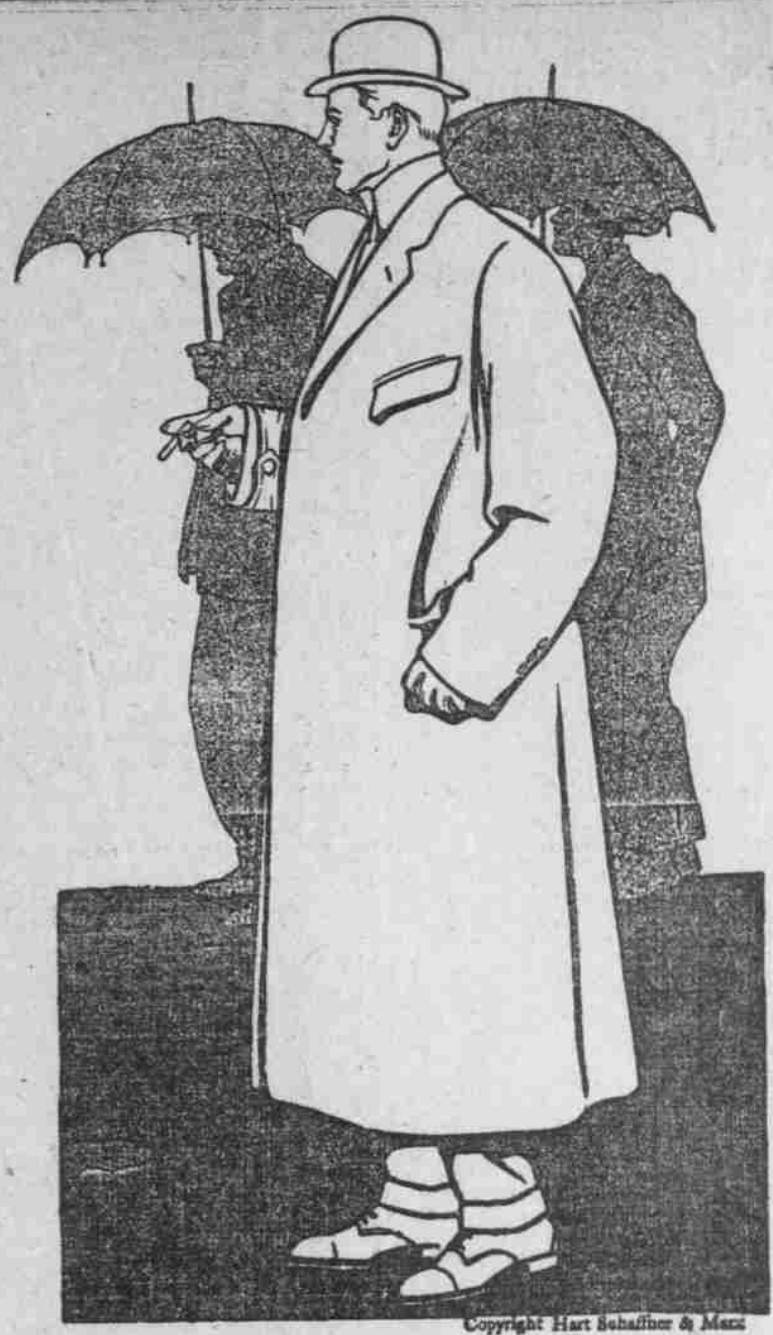

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IS OWN UNDERTAKER

"Black Horse Jones" Makes
Own Coffin, Quarries Tomb.

MADE WANDERER BY GRIEF

Tragedy Ends Life's Romance and
He Hides in California Hills,
Raising Black Horses—He
Carves Own Epitaph.

HANFORD, Cal., Oct. 11.—In a coffin which he had hewed from a log, the body of K. W. Jones, who for 45 years had led the life of a recluse on an isolated ranch near here, will be interred in a tomb built of rock he quarried himself in the hills 20 miles away and hauled to Grangeville Cemetery to be his sepulchre.

Jones died of heart disease Saturday on his lonely ranch. He was called "Black Horse" Jones because of his hobby for raising coal black horses, 60 head of which were on the ranch when he died.

The sudden ending of his life's romance, it is said, led Jones to his hermit existence. According to those who heard the story from him, Jones' fiancée fell and broke her neck while climbing him a few days before the day they were to have been married. His grief led him to California in an effort to get as far away as possible from the Iowa farm where his sweetheart died.

For years he had kept his coffin in the bedroom of his cabin and, as he lay upon it with his own hands, leaving blank the death date. His estate is estimated at \$40,000.

PAY DUE, HE SPOILS FLUE

Chimney-Wrecker Escapes Sentence
by Being Father of Four.

That he is the father of four children saved C. H. Buckbee, a bricklayer yesterday from a rockpile sentence. However, he was ordered by Judge Bennett to rebuild a chimney he had wrecked or suffer a severe penalty.

Buckbee was employed by M. W. Markham to build a chimney at 608 Carleton avenue. The flue completed, Buckbee demanded \$4.50 still due for the work, and Markham, deferring payment until the building inspector had scanned the chimney, Buckbee demolished 18 inches of the chimney, hurling the brick, one at a time, to the ground. One of the bricks grazed Mrs. Markham.

Buckbee said on the stand that he needed the money due on the chimney to buy food for his family, and that he wrecked his work that he could file a lien on the property.

BUY LOCK, HIS PENALTY

Prisoner Kicks Cell, Breaks Clasp.
Cost Added to Fine.

In addition to paying a fine of \$10, C. R. Jodon, an old offender, will be obliged to buy a new lock for the cell he occupied at the City Prison. The sentence was imposed on Jodon by Judge Bennett yesterday, testimony showing the prisoner, while drunk, had kicked the cell with such force that the lock was wrecked.

Jodon was arrested by Patrolman Sherwood at East Water and sent to the City Prison for disorderly conduct.

INSURGENTS ARE BEATEN

Revolution in Santo Domingo Meets
Reverse at Outset.

CAPE HAYTIE, Hayti, Oct. 11.—A revolution has broken out in Santo Domingo. The insurgents, headed by General Andre Navarro, today attacked Dajabon, but were repulsed by the government troops.

New Cemetery Is Planned.

Plans for creating an elaborate cemetery at Mount Scott are behind the filing

yesterday of articles of incorporation of the Mount Scott Cemetery Corporation, with a capitalization of \$500,000. The incorporators are H. E. Reynolds, M. E. Reynolds and Roscoe E. Nelson. Options have been secured by these on several pieces of property at Mount Scott. H. E. Reynolds, when asked about it last night, said that the plans for the newly-formed corporation are not fully worked out.

OIL SCORCHES FIREMEN

Explosion of Kerosene Severely In-
jures Three Fire Fighters.

COLFAZ, Wash., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—During a fire at Colfax today, Assistant Fire Chief Virgil Laird, Clark Baker and Jack Ininger were severely burned about the head and neck by the explosion of a large coal oil lamp. The fire caused a loss of \$3000.

The losses were: W. J. Willis, owner of the store building; George Middaugh, who conducted Colfax Dye Works; D. B. White, owner of a tea store.

New Oklahoma Bank Organized.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 11.—The Central State Bank, with a capital of \$300,000, was organized today in place of the Columbia Bank & Trust Company. The assets and liabilities of the latter institution remain in the hands of the state banking board, which took charge last week.

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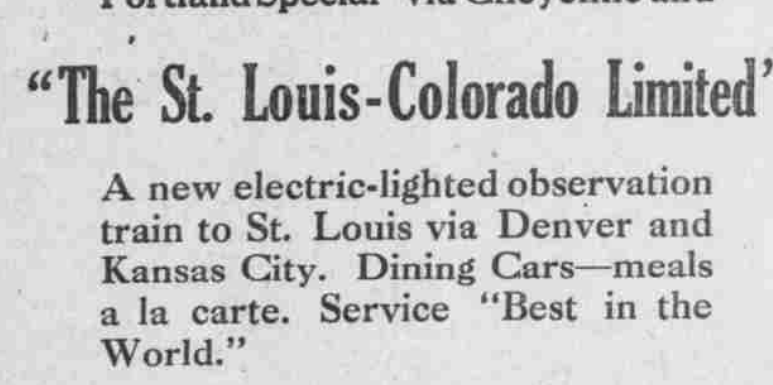
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
