

BANK ROBBED TO FEED INFATUATION

Chicago Criminal Proves to Be
Able Lawyer Ruined by
Dissipation.

FOLLOWED ACTRESS EAST

Wine, Betting and Women Cause
Brilliant Career to Close in Crime
and Suicide—Actress Tells
of the Good Times.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—The police today succeeded in establishing conclusively that the man who shot and killed himself Wednesday after robbing the Bank of Chicago in Highland Park, was Lamar A. Harris, of 2901 Hobart boulevard, Los Angeles, member of a prominent California family, and once a respected lawyer.

Wine and women and the swift life of the race track lured him to his downfall. A few years ago he and his father, Will A. Harris, had a profitable practice in the California city. He lost this through his devotion to the cold bottle and the hot bird. Then came a period of wild speculation at the race tracks, which resulted in Harris' circulating a lot of bad checks and fleeing the state.

Followed Actress to Chicago.

His arrival in Chicago and the immediate cause of his attempt to rob the Highland Park bank was due to his infatuation for an actress whom he met in the West and followed across the continent. Frank Leighton, a vaudeville actor, who is now in St. Louis, but who a few days ago spent some time riding around Chicago in a taxicab with Harris, said today that this woman was May Harrington, an actress now playing in Chicago. George Detters, a chauffeur, told the police that Harris and a girl in blue were out in his automobile on two occasions.

Lavished Money on Her.

May Harrington told the police that she had met Harris in Los Angeles and that he had looked her up in Chicago a few days ago. She last saw him Friday, when she took dinner with him at a local hotel. She said she first met Harris in Los Angeles last August. When he found her here, she entertained lavishly and spent money freely. When Miss Harrington saw Harris last Friday, he told her he was going away soon and probably would not see her again. The police have been asked by relatives of Harris in Los Angeles for a full description of the body of the dead bank robber. It was forwarded to-night.

BRILLIANT BUT ERRATIC MAN

Harris Leader at Bar and Society,
but Ruined by Dissipation.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 14.—(Special).—Strong drink first, then horse races; and at last actresses, are the causes of Lamar A. Harris' downfall, according to his friends. He was the wayward eldest son of Will A. Harris, one of California's pioneer criminal lawyers and a noted orator. He inherited much of his father's brilliant gift of eloquence but there was a "screw loose" somewhere in his nature. As a schoolboy he got into serious trouble, and was expelled from the Los Angeles High School. Afterward at the university he got into trouble again.

Success in Society and Law.

Young Harris left Los Angeles the year of the Spanish war and went South, where his father's family held a high social position. He went to Millap College in Jackson, Miss., and took a degree, was admitted to the bar, and taught for a while in the university from which he graduated.

He paid court to a beautiful girl in Mississippi and they were married. The young couple moved to Los Angeles, where young Harris became a law partner of his father. The business of the firm was largely that of mines and mining law and they were a sensational success in damage suits.

Harris was an accomplished violinist, and a deep reader, and adorned the society of artistic people. His home at 2901 Hobart boulevard was a meeting place for many people of talent.

Bad Company Leads to Ruin.

After the death of his father he became a law partner of Glen Beymer. Within the last two or three years Harris drifted into fast company, associated with a company of young society men and knew actresses.

The last season of Santa Anita Park he played the races heavily. To this his intimate friends attribute his ruin. He gradually neglected his law practice and family and became involved in a scandal over bad checks in order to make a holiday for an actress at one of the local theaters.

YAKIMA HOPS ARE BEARISH

Decline Noticed and Further Reduction Is Looked For.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Oct. 14.—(Special).—North Yakima hops were a bear on the market today. They reported a decline of from 1 to 2 1/2 cents and were looking for a further reduction.

The highest price paid here was 25 cents for 200 bales. Speculators are said to be holding Yakima hops in the valley, having about 7000 bales. Growers are reported to have over 3000 bales still in their hands.

TWO DIE IN AUTO WRECK

Fatal Accident on Alameda County
Boulevard at Night.

OAKLAND, Oct. 14.—A report reached this city late tonight that two persons were killed in an automobile accident on the Alameda County boulevard shortly before midnight.

No details have been received beyond the fact that there were six persons in the car when the accident happened.

TESTIMONY IS IMPEACHED

Walworth Trial Drags as Defense
Puts on Its Witnesses.

JACKSONVILLE, Or., Oct. 14.—(Special).—Impeachment of testimony offered against George H. Walworth, accused of manslaughter for killing James Mankins,

is the tack taken by the defense in the slowly-dragging trial. The state rested its case yesterday afternoon. Walworth was put on the stand and told again his story of the killing, saying he shot in self-defense. He exhibited scars remaining from wounds he alleged were inflicted by Mankins.

After the jury returned yesterday from the scene of the shooting, Henry Mankins testified that he went to Walworth's residence to serve a notice of ejectment, which he said he served in a quiet manner, but was met by an insulting reply and vile names. Walworth threatened him with a pitchfork, witness said. Carroll Mankins then appeared with a stick, and Walworth, crying out something about guns, ran to his house and appeared with a rifle at the door. Carroll Mankins also appeared with a shotgun. Norvil Walworth entered the house, too, and several shots followed from each side. Norvil fired from the corner of the house, finally killing James Mankins. Belle Mankins, sister of the dead man, swore she heard a shot fired from the direction of the Walworth house, and carried a shotgun to Henry Mankins. Carroll Mankins testified to seeing Walworth shoot. Walworth received part of a charge of shot in the face while aiming at Mankins. Walworth said he shot Mankins with a .38-caliber weapon and identified the gun.

PACIFIC GUNNERS SCORE

WASHINGTON WINS BATTLESHIP
SHOOTING TROPHY.

Fleet Under Admiral Swinburne in
Western Waters Leads Rivals
at Target Practice.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Record target practice scores of the vessels of the American Navy for 1909, made public at the Navy Department today, show that the Washington is a winner in the battleship class, the Charleston a trophy winner in the cruiser class, the Wilmington a trophy winner in the gunboat class and the Tingey the trophy winner in vessels competing for the torpedo trophy.

The Pacific fleet under Admiral Swinburne leads the fleet in target practice with a record of 42.

The Atlantic fleet, under Admiral Schroeder, was second in standing of the fleets with a final record of 38; the assigned vessels on special service third, with a final merit of 34, and the Pacific torpedo fleet under command of Commander Benson, fourth, with a final merit of 22.

The final merit of the Washington, the trophy winner in the battleship class, was 59, with the Montana, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Hampshire, Tennessee and Louisiana, star ships, which include those vessels attaining 85 per cent of the final merit of the trophy winner. The final merit of the Charleston, the trophy winner of the cruiser class, was 64, with the Cleveland second.

In the gunboat class, the Wilmington, the trophy winner, had a final merit of 50 and the Tingey, the trophy winner of the torpedo boat class, 45. In the final merit of the torpedo flotilla, first place is taken by the second flotilla of the Pacific torpedo fleet, second place by the first flotilla of the Pacific torpedo fleet, and third place by the third torpedo fleet of the Atlantic fleet.

HEADING OFF OUTLAW

POSSES DIVIDE TO KEEP AID
FROM WILLIE BOY.

Fear Plagues Will Poison Water
Causes Care—Fight With Indian Today Likely.

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Oct. 14.—(Special).—After an exciting chase of 20 miles, Deputy Sheriff H. J. West's posse returned to Danby this morning, unsuccessful in an effort to head off the Plutes passing Danby yesterday afternoon for Bullion Mountain. Sheriff Ralphs telephoned from Bear Valley this morning, having divided the posse, and they are taking a short cut across the mountains to prevent the Plutes reaching Willie Boy's lair.

Lon Boy, the renegade, kidnapper, has disappeared from Danby, his whereabouts being unknown. Every effort is being made to apprehend him.

For fear the Plutes may poison the water holes in the vicinity of Granite Peak, to handicap the officers, Surgeon Mills will test every spring before use, on account of fears communicated to the Sheriff today by trailers.

Mining men and Chemehuevi Indians are flocking to this city and Riverside, driving from the desert, because of the disquieting reports regarding the restlessness among the Plutes.

A conflict with Willie Boy is anticipated tomorrow, as the Hewins and De Crevecoeur posses are supposed now to be at Rock Corral, while the Sheriff's force will camp by midnight on the opposite side of the renegade's retreat.

AGED LUMBERMAN DIES

David H. Jones, Well Known in the
West, Expires in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—David H. Jones, identified with lumber interests in Chicago, New York, St. Louis and California for many years, died suddenly here tonight on an elevated train in the downtown district.

Mr. Jones was 72 years old and was at one time superintendent of the lumber interests of the late E. H. Harriman in Oregon.
