

STORM CENTERS ON JUDGE GAYNOR

Ignores Attacks on Judicial Acts, but Stands on Known Record.

DEATH STOPS HOT TIRADE

McCarren's Demise Announced in Midst of Speech Denouncing Him. Gaynor is Ambitious to Be President.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Two of the candidates for Mayor of Greater New York kept up the agitation of the campaign by speech in Manhattan and Brooklyn tonight. William J. Gaynor, the Democratic nominee, made his first appearance in Manhattan; Otto Hannard, the Republican nominee, made a series of speeches in Brooklyn. William R. Hearst, nominated by the Independents for Mayor, did not speak, although a mass-meeting in his support was held at Cooper Union.

Gaynor Stands on Record.

The greatest interest was centered in Gaynor's appearance, in the expectation that he would answer in detail the charges against him, the most serious of which is the insinuation that he favored the racketeer element and attempted to frustrate the enforcement of legislation designed to check betting. His hearers were disappointed, for he did not reply to the charges at length but declared, as he had done before, that his record must be the answer to his detractors.

Gaynor's Great Ambition.

William A. De Ford, candidate for State Attorney-General on the Independence League ticket in 1906, eulogized Hearst and denounced Tammany Hall. He told of a conversation with Rudolph Block, a former Hearst employee and an adherent of Gaynor, in which Block is quoted as saying: "Judge Gaynor expects to be elected Governor and then President of the United States, and he wants to take the nomination for Mayor from Tammany Hall, in order to work out this ambition."

McCarren's Death Stops Attack.

"McCarren is dead." An immediate hush fell over the assembly and De Ford apologized with the explanation that he was attacking McCarren's principles and not McCarren, the man.

It was a militant suffragette who disturbed the Gaynor gathering. Gaynor had barely got under way when a woman arose in the audience and called: "How about woman suffrage?" She was Miss Maud Malone, a familiar figure at political gatherings.

"The question which you ask me is not pertinent to this meeting," said Judge Gaynor, with some embarrassment, "and I shall ask you in order to prevent any further interruption, to go first and consult my wife."

Plea for Personal Liberty.

Gaynor's speech was a plea for "personal liberty" and a "liberal construction" of the laws. He attacked ex-Police Commissioner Bingham, who is now campaigning against Gaynor, as a "strut-about, a head-butler from the White House, brought here over the heads of 200 better men than he, who introduced militarism which never would be tolerated in Russia."

In discussing the cleaning of the city he paid a tribute to President Roosevelt and his work while a municipal officer in New York.

Gaynor Resigns Judgeship.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 14.—Justice William J. Gaynor, Democratic candidate for Mayor of New York City, today filed his resignation as a member of the appellate division of the Supreme Court, effective immediately.

WU DELVES IN SPIRITISM

(Continued from First Page.)

The latter was the more startling because, apparently, delivered in the Chinese language.

These messages are claimed by the spiritualists to be brought to the medium in trance by the spirit of a 16-year-old American Indian girl, under whose "control" she speaks in broken English; yet the conversation between Dr. Wu and the medium, while ostensibly under this "control," was somewhat extensive, lasting fully five minutes and seemed to be in the Chinese vernacular, question and answer, unintelligible to the auditors, passing back and forth with considerable freedom. There was every evidence that the diplomat perfectly understood the communication which apparently appeared to come from the spirit of Dr. Wu's own mother. It was asserted that the medium and her "control" are both absolutely ignorant of the Chinese language.

Mediums Make Mistake.

The spiritualists assured Dr. Wu before the séance that no newspaper men were present, but they were mistaken. In addition to that, the score of persons who attended the meeting had no means kept silent today concerning the remarkable interchange which took place.

Before the conversation between Dr. Wu and the medium, purporting to convey messages from the martyred President, the woman in "trance" had told Dr. Wu that her "control" foresaw terrible trouble for the Chinese Empire, in which the distinguished diplomat would occupy a place of great importance and influence, and it was in connection with this prediction that she brought what was claimed to be a communication from the former President, expressing an earnest desire for peace.

Accompanied by Wu Chang, the legation attaché who was with him on the previous occasion, Dr. Wu, in purple costume, was on hand early. At the private meetings of the "Temple League of Spiritualists," various mediums attended and rendered their services gratuitously, the audience being composed of any who wish to be present, and a collection is taken

up for the purpose of a building fund for a temple.

First, the spirit of a Chinese who gave his name, came to Dr. Wu. The mediumistic "control" said the spirit had left the earthly life some 20 years ago, but it knew Dr. Wu and would like to talk to him. "Minnie," the Indian "control," remarked through the medium that this Chinese was not a great Chinaman, like the "Big Chief," (as the Indians are always called a man of high standing), but had been a common Chinaman.

"He no like you, Big Chief," said the Indian girl to the diplomat. "He used to be a washer, washee, washee; you great Chinaman who talkee, talkee, talkee, heap much talkee all a time."

Suddenly the medium made a most profound salaam before Dr. Wu and "Minnie" informed him that his mother was there and wished to give him a message.

"Ask her to speak to me," said Dr. Wu. At that request the medium uttered, as if with great difficulty, a sentence in the Chinese language, or as near to it as it might be possible for an Indian girl, known to speak only the most broken English, to repeat to an American that difficult foreign tongue. This, in turn, passing from the lips of another woman, necessarily would be somewhat imperfect, but Dr. Wu apparently understood portions of the message repeated to him.

The first sentence was in the nature of a salutation, and in reply the statesman questioned the "spirit" in Chinese, receiving an answer which seemed undoubtedly to be in Chinese, and the conversation continued fully five minutes. Through the medium, the Indian girl occasionally remarked that Dr. Wu did not fully understand what the medium was trying to say to him, owing to the third-hand manner in which the Chinese was reaching him.

During the delivery of a third message, purporting to come from Dr. Wu's mother, the medium stood close to the diplomat, at times holding his hand and patting him on the shoulder. Finally she knelt in front of him, continuing talking in that position a couple of minutes.

At the conclusion of this conversation the Indian girl told what she foresaw in the future in connection with the Chinese minister. First of all, she saw "much fighting" in the far-away country from which he had come. His native land was preparing, she said, for a mortal struggle. It was building ships of war. Dr. Wu would be vitally interested in this terrible conflict, and would hold an office of great importance.

Shortly after this the medium said there came to her a spirit, a friend of the minister's, who was not one of his own country, but an American. This spirit gave to the medium the name of "William," and finally, after some hesitation, she uttered the last name as "McKinley." "The control," remarked that the spirit had left this earth eight years ago. Assuming a dignified attitude, the medium bowed respectfully to Dr. Wu, and in a deep, clear masculine voice, said:

"How are you, my friend? I am William McKinley, former President of the United States. I have just heard what the little Indian girl predicted to you about a great war for China. I sincerely hope no such war will ever take place. I am for peace, and I know you also are for peace, are you not?"

"Yes," said the Chinese statesman. "I am for peace always."

"I am sure you will do all you can to prevent this great war, my brother, and I, too, will continue to work for peace," said the medium. This ended the communication.

From his attaché he obtained one of his cards, which he had in his hand for some minutes, while the medium went to other persons in the room and gave spirit messages. Then the Minister procured a piece of paper and proceeded to write a note, apparently something he wished to be given to the medium. Its purport was not divulged. Before the medium had come out of her trance, Dr. Wu and Wu Chang had departed.

RUSSIA PREYS ON FINNS

TO TAKE \$4,000,000 DEFENSE FUND FROM TREASURY.

Czar's Government Assumes Full Charge and Steers Ship of State With Reckless Hand.

HELSINGFORS, Oct. 14.—An imperial manifesto was published here today ordering that the military contribution of \$4,000,000 shall be taken from the Finnish treasury and turned over to Russia. The Finns have not decided upon any definite line of resistance, and disorders are unavoidable. Russian reinforcements are expected to arrive here soon.

RUSSIA MAY ANNEX STRIP

Subjects of Czar Fill Places Vacated in Finnish Senate.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 14.—Rear-Admiral Viscinski and Admiral Soloviev, Colonel Krause, and Master of Ceremonies Berg have been appointed to the Finnish Senate by the Governor-General of Finland, according to advices from Helsinki. These men replace the senators who in September notified the Governor-General that they would not accept reappointment to office.

The appointment is regarded as an almost final blow to Finnish autonomy, as it practically abolishes the Finnish National Administration, replacing the machinery of state in the hands of the Russian Governor-General.

It is understood that the judicial department of the Senate will now resign, and this will be followed shortly by the resignation by Russia of that part of the Viborg province that was joined to Finland by Alexander I in 1809, after the acquisition of the grand duchy from Sweden. This district is only 20 miles from St. Petersburg, and it is considered strategically necessary to the defense of the capital that it be placed under Russian control.

The conditions are such that open resistance on the part of the Finns by an uprising or repetition of the general strike of 1906 is scarcely expected.

FOUR BLOCKS ARE TAKEN

CRANE STEPS OUT

Taft Accepts Resignation, Crane Feels Relief.

OFFICE WAS REPUGNANT

Obligation Was to Let President Decide—Accepted in Hope to Be of Service—Called On to Endure Humiliation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—President

Taft has approved the action of Secretary Knox in asking for the resignation of Charles R. Crane and has accepted the resignation. Mr. Crane is relieved by this decision.

The President's announcement of his decision came as a telegram from President Taft, dated October 13, to Mr. Crane, his private secretary, which read: "Convey to Mr. Crane the following communication:

"I concur in the letter under date of October 12, which the Secretary of State has addressed to you, and I greatly regret that the circumstances found to exist by him make it necessary for me to accept your resignation."

Following the receipt of the President's statement, Mr. Crane issued the following statement:

"I am greatly relieved by the President's decision. There has been no minute since I learned the attitude of the Department of State when I have not contemplated the possibility of a continuance of my official relations with the deepest repugnance. Nevertheless, I have felt that my obligation to the President was to permit him to decide the issue. I have appreciated fully what would be involved in a decision by him that I should continue. I have realized also the impossibility of his securing complete information at this time. He has chosen to base his decision upon the circumstances found by the Secretary of State."

"I accepted the Chinese mission at his request and solely because of assurance that I could be and would be permitted to be of service to the country in constructive work of the greatest importance to it and of the greatest interest to me. It has been made perfectly clear that conditions here were not and are not such as to make this possible. To demonstrate this has involved a personal humiliation such as no self-respecting man who is drafted into the public service should be called on to endure, but I am grateful indeed that I have had the test of official choice and support here rather than in China and now rather than at some crisis involving the honor or the interest of the Nation."

PEKIN HEARS KNOX'S REASON

Secretary's Explanation of Crane's Recall Read in China.

PEKIN, Oct. 14.—The Japanese Legation today has before the Chinese Government and also gave to the native and foreign press the explanation of Secretary of State Knox for the recall of Charles R. Crane, United States Minister-designate to China.

The incident impresses the government as unfortunate and has aroused the feeling among Chinese officials that the only hope of national security rests in the co-operation of the powers.
