

FRANCE SEETHES WITH INDIGNATION

Ferrer's Execution Causes Disturbances and Many Public Protests.

ALFONSO BURNS IN EFFIGY

Two Frenchmen Reported Shot at Barcelona—Spain Excited, but Held Down by Power of Government.

BOMBS EXPLODE IN BARCELONA.
PARIS, Oct. 15.—A dispatch to the Petit Parisien from Barcelona, via the frontier, says that three bombs exploded there, making five in all. Six soldiers were wounded.

PARIS, Oct. 14.—The demonstrations in protest against the execution of Francisco Ferrer were marked throughout France today, and, from reports received tonight, they still continue.

The Latin quarter here is seething, but several times during the evening a strong force of police scattered the demonstrators. Serious disturbances occurred at Lyons, where thousands of workmen, Socialists and Anarchists paraded. They broke windows of the reactionary newspaper offices and fought the police.

Several City Councils have adopted resolutions of protest against the execution.

The Mayor of Cherbourg has returned to the Spanish embassy the insignia of the Order of Isabella the Catholic, which was presented to him by King Alfonso.

Killed and Wounded in Riot.

The police records show that one policeman was killed and 76 persons were wounded during last night's rioting. Among those arrested were five Anarchists.

The press, with the exception of the Royalist and Clerical element, continues today to express indignation over the execution of Ferrer and to predict that grave events will follow in Spain. The Socialists are planning further demonstrations throughout the country.

Last night students in the Latin quarter burned King Alfonso in effigy. Count de Castellane has advised Marquis del Muni, the Spanish ambassador to France, to bring suit against the papers that have insulted King Alfonso.

Frenchmen Shot at Barcelona.

The Temps today prints, under reserve, a report from its correspondent at Cerbere, on the Franco-Spanish frontier, that two Frenchmen were shot at Montjuich fortress in Barcelona this morning.

The same paper's correspondent at Madrid says that the news of Ferrer's execution created a tremendous impression in the Spanish capital, but that the government has taken extraordinary precautions and there have been no disturbances. Troops surround the palace and public buildings.

DIES WITH CRY FOR CAUSE

Ferrer's Last Words, "Long Live the Modern School."

BARCELONA, Oct. 14.—Francisco Ferrer died with the cry, "Long live the modern school!" upon his lips. This and other brief details of yesterday's execution of the revolutionist escaped the censors and there have been no disturbances. Troops surround the palace and public buildings.

WOUND DEPUTY SHERIFF AND FLEE TO TIMBER IN DARKNESS WHEN FIRE IS RETURNED BY POSSE.

MANHATTAN, N.Y., Oct. 14.—In a battle today at the Stray Dog mine here between a band of "high graders" and a Sheriff's posse, Deputy Sheriff Martinson was wounded. It is believed that one of the robbers was shot, but he was carried away by his companions, who escaped in the darkness with a quantity of rich ore.

The "high graders" were discovered at work 220 feet below the surface by the Sheriff's posse.

They passed into the Stray Dog mine through an abandoned shaft, and thence through the Flanagan shaft to the Union Nine mine. The lease from which the ore was taken has been closed.

A watchman saw the light in the shaft and notified the officers, who waited at the mouth of the shaft for the members of the gang to come out. A demand by Martinson for their surrender was answered by a fusillade, and the officer fell with a wound in his scalp. The officers returned the fire, and the robbers dashed for the mine by timber, dropping one sack of high-grade ore in their flight.

Fifty shots were exchanged in the battle, and it is believed that one of the robbers was hit. Dense darkness prevailed, and no description of the number or appearance could be obtained. A posse is making a search for the robbers.

FATHER-IN-LAW IS FIGHTER

Son-in-Law Gets Broken Hand in Discussion of Family Affairs.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 14.—(Special.)—George Guler, night watchman at the yards of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound Railway Company at Land, was brought to Riverview tonight on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon upon his son-in-law, John Rouse.

Trouble between Rouse and his wife, who make their home with Guler, is reported to be the cause. Upon coming home after his night's work and learning of the trouble, the father-in-law made inquiry and a fight resulted. The son-in-law has a broken hand.

FIREMEN ANSWER TWO ALARMS.

Two still alarms, one at 7:35 o'clock and another ten minutes later, were reported to fire headquarters last night. At 10:01 East Salmon street, U. Z. Moore was warning turpentine in a vessel on a range, when it caught fire. In the excitement his wife turned in an alarm of fire and he deluged the kitchen with water. The only damage was that done by the water. At 7:35 o'clock a false alarm called firemen to Park and Alder streets.

INDIGNATION MEETING HELD THROUGHOUT ITALY—WORK STOPS.

ROME, Oct. 14.—Indignation meetings were held throughout Italy today in consequence of yesterday's events at Barcelona. In this city the protest against the execution of Ferrer has brought business almost to a standstill.

Workmen generally have abandoned their employment. No streetcars were

operated, and cabs and automobiles remained at their stations with no one to take them out. The whole normal life of the city is interrupted. Among the masses the feeling grows more turbulent as the people attribute the execution of the revolutionist to reactionism. Vatican influence and Jesuit support. The Spanish and Austrian embassies and the Vatican are closely guarded by troops.

GREAT DISORDER IN ITALY

Mobs Build Barricades and Cavalry Charges, Wounding Many.

ROME, Oct. 14.—More than 300 persons who attempted disorders today were arrested. In the provinces serious disorders occurred.

In Milan and Florence mobs attempted to erect barricades, which were destroyed by the cavalry. Many persons were wounded.

MARCHERS REGISTER PROTEST

Thousands Parade as Demonstration Against Execution.

TRIESTE, Hungary, Oct. 14.—A great demonstration of protest against the execution yesterday at Barcelona of Professor Ferrer was made here during the night. Thousands of persons marched through the streets, and all of the theaters and cafes were compelled to close.

DIAZ IS GIVEN OVATION

CHIHUAHUA WELCOMES RULER OF MEXICO IN TRIUMPH.

Grand Pageant, Flowers, Singing of National Anthem, Feast and Loving Cups.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 14.—No crowd had ever received a more magnificent welcome than that accorded President Diaz in the City of Chihuahua yesterday and today. His arrival on a special train of five coaches was heralded by the blowing of every whistle and the ringing of every bell in the city, and by the booming of cannon. He was met at the foot of Avenida Juarez by the entertainment committee and presented with an immense silver key to the city.

The avenue was spanned by nine arches erected by the different industries of the city, through which he passed on his triumphant march. The roofs of the buildings were packed with spectators.

At many points the people broke through the lines, crowded about his carriage and loaded it with flowers. The last three blocks of his progress was through lines of thousands of school children, singing the National anthem. Arriving at the Governor's Palace, where he was the guest of Governor Creel, President Diaz, with the Secretary of Foreign Relations, the Secretary of War, Governor Creel and other dignitaries, reviewed the long military and civic parade.

Then followed the magnificent electric display. Every building of any size was outlined by electric lights, the old Cathedral presenting the most notable appearance. The display on the main plaza was especially fine. The Governor's Palace was surmounted by a large electric star, on each side of which was a Mexican eagle and the Mexican coat of arms, the electric bulbs showing the National colors.

A reception was held at the Governor's Palace last night in which Chihuahuans vied with each other in doing their President honor.

Tonight President Diaz was the guest of honor at a banquet of 200 covers. His train leaves Chihuahua early tomorrow for Juarez and will arrive there early in the afternoon.

During President Diaz's stay in the city of Chihuahua he was presented with two loving cups of solid gold, one by the foreign clubs, composed mostly of Americans, and another by the Casino Club, accompanied by a certificate of membership engraved on solid gold.

HIGH GRADERS CAUGHT IN NEVADA MINE.

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FAR DISAPPOINTMENT IN ATTENDANCE

September at A.-Y.-P. Fails to Bring Number of Visitors Expected.

MANY EXPLANATIONS GIVEN

Poor Sleeping-Car Facilities Thought Mostly Responsible—All Considered, Says Chibberg, Patronage of Portland's Fair Is Equal.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 14.—(Staff Correspondence.)—The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition will close Saturday night with a total paid attendance for the entire period of approximately 2,700,000. The exposition management had set the paid attendance mark at 3,000,000 and had not the month of September failed to come up to all established precedents the mark would have been reached.

In nearly all other expositions September has been the highest attendance month and in all of them it has ranked among the top-notchers. The exposition management estimated the attendance in September here would be about 200,000. It was approximately 600,000. Why September was not the attendance peak it was in Portland, is what is puzzling the officials, and the crowded condition of transportation facilities has finally been decided upon as the principal cause. In returning home, tourists, it is said, often waited a week or more to get even an upper berth and the word went out throughout the country that it was next to impossible to secure sleeping car accommodations out of Seattle. The officials heard of these reports first early in September and they could not truthfully deny them, they say. Then about the middle of September the tourist travel suddenly slumped and of course the fair attendance fell off.

Paid Admissions 2,636,907.

Up to and including October 11, the total paid admissions to the fair were 2,636,907, and the free admissions 936,775. In the matter of passes the A.-Y.-P. is said to have broken the record of all other expositions in which it is generally looked upon as a virtue, rather than a vice. The percentage of passes to total attendance is about 35 per cent.

The paid admissions are represented by regular single admissions of 50 cents each, evening and Sunday admissions of 25 cents each, special tickets at 10, 25 and 50 cents each, and season coupon tickets. The total revenue from tickets was \$1,067,574.74. In addition, the concessions have brought in \$288,362.18; exhibits, \$105,482.17, and special attractions \$11,553.58, making the total gross receipts to the close of October 11 \$1,462,970.57.

The average value to the fair of every person who paid admission has been 53.11 cents, when the fair's percentage of what each person spends at the concessions is taken into consideration. The per capita value of attendance at the Lewis and Clark Fair was 65 cents. The Seattle Fair officials say that if they had been permitted to sell concessions for the sale of liquor the per capita value of admissions would have equaled Portland's.

Portland's Admissions 1,588,858.

Portland's total paid admissions were 1,588,858, so Seattle's paid admissions exceed Portland's by about 1,000,000. Seattle's gross earnings will likely exceed Portland's by about \$400,000.

As stated, however, there are numerous conditions to be taken into consideration.

"If a comparison of resources is made on which the Lewis and Clark Fair and the A.-Y.-P. have to draw," said President Chibberg today, "I will say frankly that I do not believe there has been a great deal of difference in the patronage given the two institutions. Perhaps the Seattle Fair would run four or five per cent above the Lewis and Clark Fair, and perhaps it would be the other way. If Portland had given an exposition this year, the city, its greatly increased growth and resources, would of course expect better attendance than was given the 1905 fair. It is a matter of no importance, anyway, and there is no cause for jealousy on either side. Such an exposition as the one in Portland or the one in Seattle benefits the entire Northwest. When I saw the Lewis and Clark Fair in 1906 I felt an individual pride in it and I believe it was largely responsible for the rapid growth of the Northwest that immediately followed. I believe the present exposition will promote the growth of all this country to a similar extent."

Local Attendance Large.

The exposition management estimates that about 80 per cent of the paid attendance at the Seattle Fair came from Seattle. The gross 75 per cent of the attendance to the tourist class, or about 250,000. It must be admitted, however, that each paid attendance does not represent one tourist. For some visited the fair repeatedly. Making allowances for this factor and comparing with the figures of the validating offices of the railroads, the exposition management brought between 235,000 and 250,000 tourists to the Pacific Northwest this year.

Thus, with the main purpose of publicity accomplished, with financial affairs in good condition, and with its beauty a pleasing memory in the minds of all who visited it, the A.-Y.-P. Exposition is ending its days a success and a fulfillment of all that was intended for it.

\$20,000 IN OPIUM FOUND

Smugglers of Drug Grow Active in Philippine Islands.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 14.—J. J. Evans, of the United States revenue service at Cebu, who reached Victoria today on the steamer Montague, says the smuggling of opium into the Philippines since the sale and manufacture in the islands had been forbidden, has been extensive, and a vast amount of contraband was being run owing to the high price to which the illicit drug had been boosted.

There have been a number of important captures, the biggest being the seizure recently at Manila of \$20,000 worth of opium secreted in shafting of machinery, and the hollow drum of a winch. Smugglers have also done a profitable business selling firearms to the Moros.

POWER PROJECT OUTLINED

Huge Tunnel to Be Bored Seven Miles Through Mountain.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 14.—(Special.)—What is said to be the beginning of a great power project for Washington and Idaho has been completed, according to W. A. Sayers, an engineer and promoter well known in Grangeville. Mr. Sayers came to Grangeville today after the completion of a survey for a tunnel through a mountain dividing the Snake and Salmon Rivers at a point one mile below Freedom on the Salmon.

He says a company has been organized and \$200,000 put up for the project, which consists of the boring of the tunnel, 13 by 16 feet, through the mountain seven miles.

The tunnel would give a drop of 450 feet, and, according to Mr. Sayers, would permit the development of 160,000 horse-power.

BIG ORDERS MAY BE FAKES

Alleged Advance Man for Buffalo Bill Visits Many Dealers.

Representing himself to be the advance agent of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, a man giving his name as N. J. Reed is said to have visited at least 20 grocery stores and meat markets in Portland during the last few days giving orders amounting to \$200 and \$300 to each and directing that the goods be delivered October 25, at the show grounds at Twenty-third and Halsted streets.

Reed, after making out the bill, say the complainants, suggested he should have a discount as his part of the graft, and, as he must go right away, the case has been reported to the police.

Walla Walla Land Reopened.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—The Interior Department has restored, subject to settlement and entry next February, 173,400 acres of public land withdrawn for reclamation projects in Washington, California and Arizona. The lands include 56,000 acres in the Walla Walla, Wash., district.
