Second in Sprint
and Throw.

HALEY WINS THE FEATURE

He Makes 100-Yard Dash in 11
Seconds Flat, Beating Spears
by One Foot—Fans
Cheer Contests.

In the field-day games at the Vaughn-street park yesterday afternoon, just before the diamond contest, classy exhibitions by the players won cheers from 5000 fans and others assembled to witness the final antics of McCredie's charges before their departure from Portland territory. The events started at 2 o'clock and included races around the bases, distance throwing, fungo-hitting and the century dash.

Ole Johnson became the hero of the day when he won a first place and two second places. He was first in the fungo-hitting contest, second in the 100-yard sprint, and second in the throw for distance.

For the enlightenment of those who do not know the meaning of fungo-hitting it may be said the stunt is simply hitting a ball for distance. Each contestant has three chances and the longest hits are counted. Although Johnson was booked to win in this event he had able competitors such as Little Jack Graney, Ort and Ryan of Portland and Branshaw and Stovall of Vernon. Johnson's bangle was ten feet better than the next best hit which was made by Ort. Olson took third place in this event.

The feature event was the 100-yard dash, which was won by Johnny Haley in 11 seconds flat. Johnson came in a close second. At the crack of the gun Billy Spears jumped to the front and was followed closely by Martinke. About 40 yards down the course, however, Haley forced ahead of Spears and then passed him, holding the lead to the tape. Johnson came up in the last 20 yards and pressed close behind Haley. Haley was fighting hard for the lead. Haley finally coming in first with an advantage of only about a foot.

WILY CHINAS ARE SCARCE

Opening Days of Season Find but
Few Pheasants.

The season for shooting pheasants opened Friday, and yesterday large numbers of aspiring nimrods journeyed to fields and meadows within reach of the city to try their luck in bagging the greatest of all game birds. Some of the hunters reported a great scarcity of birds, while others found many. In most instances, however, hunters experienced in the game succeeded in bagging at least a couple of birds.

Great difficulty was found by many of the hunters in distinguishing the cock from the hen. Without a gun it is not so difficult to ascertain the difference when the birds rise. When one steps, though, to find out whether the bird is a male or a female, it is apt to be out of shooting range before its sex is ascertained. It is thought that most hunters will find it difficult to secure the male.

The fields in all directions were alive with hunters at an early hour yesterday, and the reports of the numerous shotguns woke up more than one individual who was trying to take a Sunday-morning sleep. Many farmers were out on their own property and also kept watch for trespassing sportsmen from the city.

Charles J. Hiron, who was hunting in North Yamhill county, reported a great scarcity of birds in that region. Many hunters had met but not succeeded in bagging a bird, and he himself had just one lone success to show for his day's effort. From other parts of the Willamette valley there were better reports.

JEFF DISPARAGES KETCHEL

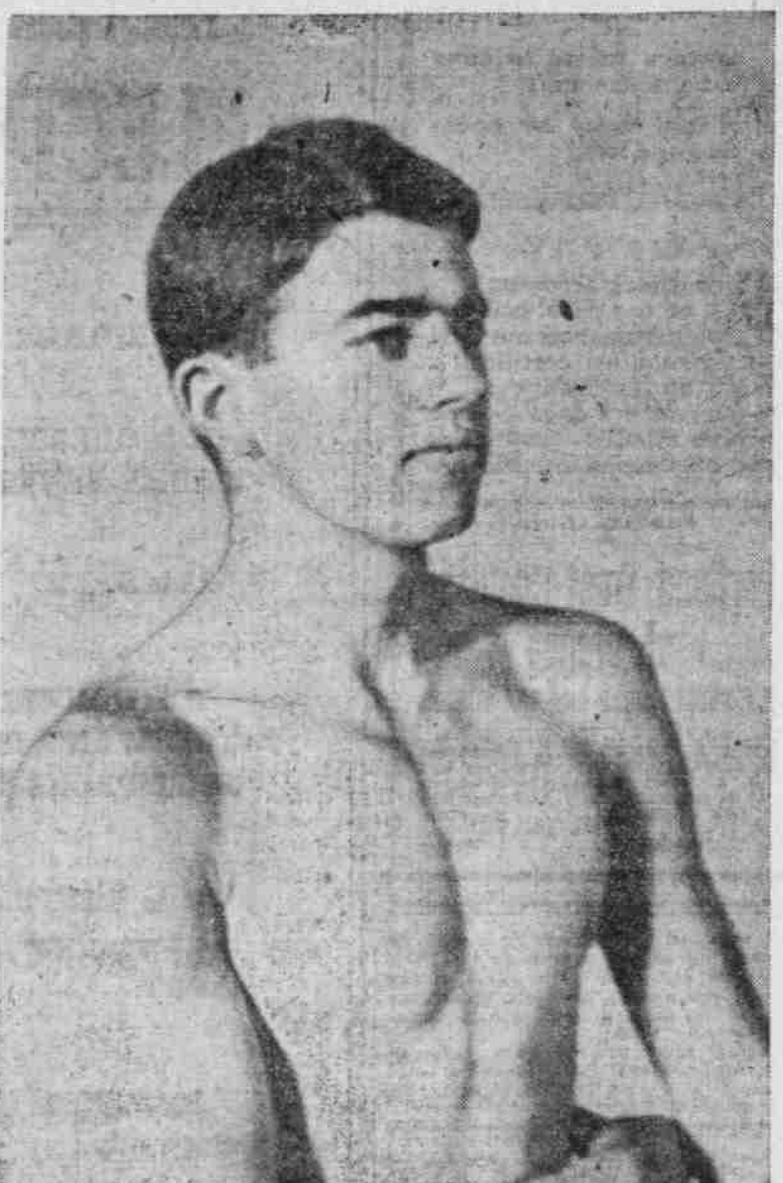
Big One Says He Is Only Middle-
weight and Johnson Poor Fighter.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—When J. J. Jeffries heard of Jack Johnson's victory over Stanley Ketchel at San Francisco, he said this in no way would affect his plans. Ketchel, he added, was only a middleweight, and not by any means the best of the middleweights.

"Ketchel," continued Jeffries, "is trying to feed himself up to make the heavy-weight class, but it will only weaken him. Johnson is not much of a fighter and he never made a good man. His fight with Burns was no test. Burns is a newspaper fighter. I can only hope that Johnson will cover my money. I would not fight him if I did not think I could beat him."

NASTY TASTE LEFT

Much Discussion Is Held Over
Johnson-Ketchel Bout.

THOUGHT NEGRO LOAFED

Sporting Writers Agree White Man
Could Have Been Knocked Out
at Will of Big Black, Who
Was Posing for Pictures.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17.—(Special.)—The Johnson-Ketchel fight left something of a bitter taste in the mouths of the 20,000 fight fans who crowded into the arena, and today there are any number of people who voice the suspicion that the peculiar lack of Johnson and even the knockout of Ketchel might have been rehearsed.

This view of the match is taken by the sporting writers, for the latter are agreed that if Ketchel hit Johnson at all, it was nothing more than a glancing blow and could have had little force. They figure on the opinion that Johnson deliberately loafed along with Ketchel in order to make the moving pictures of sufficient length, and think it quite likely that he dropped to the mat just to make his 40 per cent interest in the game of more value to him. Ketchel absolutely had no chance with the big black, who could have knocked him out in any round that he so wished.

Ketchel was around the streets today. His face is considerably bruised and he has a gap in his mouth where Johnson knocked out three of his front teeth. The talk now is for a return match between Johnson and Ketchel, Croftroth urging this as a good move and Willis Britt seconding him.

"Ketchel is just daffy for another chance at the negro," said Britt. "If he can't get Johnson he will fight Langford or any one else on Thanksgiving Day." "How about Papke?" he was asked. "What's the use?" replied the boy manager. "We have licked Papke a couple of times. Every time he fights Papke just covers up."

Britt was also asked if Ketchel would make weight for Papke, and replied that he would not, corroborating the story that the Michigan lion cannot get back to the middleweight limit.

Ketchel will remain here several days and will probably then go to the mountains. Johnson has not decided what he will do. He has a chance to meet the winner of the Jack Burns-Tim Flynn fight in Los Angeles, and also has a number of good theatrical engagements open to him.

WONDERWILDS WEAPON

A. H. HARDY CRACKS TARGETS
WITHOUT MISS.Puts Bullets Into 300 Flying Balls
At Distance of 30 Feet.

Two hundred interested spectators, including many women, witnessed the shooting exhibition given by A. H. Hardy at the Portland Revolver and Rifle Range yesterday afternoon. Practically all of the shooting experts and enthusiasts in Portland were on hand and all pronounced the work of Captain Hardy the best they had seen in this city for some time.

Hardy's most wonderful feat was that of hitting with a .22 rifle 300 balls thrown into the air at a distance of 30 feet. In 300 tries there was not a miss. The balls were 2 1/2 inches in diameter and were tossed up at the rate of ten a minute. Only one gun was used, and it was not cleaned at any time during the performance.

Another of Hardy's feats was to throw five targets into the air himself and shoot them with a shotgun. A reporter was used and the targets were thrown up in rapid succession.

An exhibition was given of hitting two objects at the same time with two revolvers, each held in each hand. At a distance of 50 yards Hardy placed five bullets fired from a revolver in an eight-inch bullseye in five seconds. Hardy shot without a bobble.

The Beavers left a good impression in the minds of the Portland fans yesterday afternoon when they triumphed over the Vernons in the last game of the season on the home grounds, with the score at Portland 2, Vernon 1. The game was clean, as a whole, but rather uninteresting. However, the crowd of 400 fans on hand to witness the final game of the season of the home representatives was well satisfied.

The work of neither pitcher was up to standard. Carson, the Vernons' star, pitched for nine clean singles and one four-sacker. The bingles, however, were well scattered and no runs resulted, except in the case of the homer over the fence. At that time there were no men on bases, so Martinke had the pleasure of making the circuit unaccompanied.

Hitt's hits allowed Carson to pitch only eight, but six of them were bunched in the second and third innings, so the Beavers were able to negotiate the runs necessary to win the contest. With the exception of these two disastrous innings, however, Hitt was a hard man to discover and he sent ten of McCredie's pets to the cellar.

The feature of the game was Martinke's homer over the right-field fence. He was the first man up in that inning and took Carson's first offer, putting the ball high over the fence and taking a Sunday afternoon stroll around the circuit. The next two up in that inning went out on flies and Coy went out on a fielder's choice hit by Devereaux.

Portland pulled off a pretty double in the first half of the first inning, when, on a fielder's choice hit by Martinke, Stovall came to bat and took a home run from Carson and McCay was nabbed at second. Another double was negotiated in the seventh by Portland when Coyney took Stovall's pop-up and caught Hitt off first.

Portland went out in one-two-three order in the first inning. In the second, one run resulted from three hits, one of which was a long fly which hit the right-field fence. In the third Graney came in on an error by Brown after Johnson had fished a hit to center field.

McCredie took his bunch to San Francisco last night. They will play this week's series there during Portola week. The following week's series with Los Angeles will finish the season.

ST. YVES CLIPS RECORD

CHAMPION RUNNER WINS MAR-
ATHON AT SEATTLE.

Time on Baseball Grounds, 2:32:39.
Harry McLean, Noted Indian,
Racer, Collapses Completely.

SEATTLE, Oct. 17.—Henri St. Yves won the marathon derby at the baseball grounds this afternoon in 2:32:39, breaking his own world record of 2:40:50-5-5 made at the New York marathon derby. John Marsh, the Englishman, was second, several laps behind. Johnny Hayes, of New York, was third and J. P. Fitzgerald fourth.

Harry McLean, the Hopi Indian, from Phoenix, Ariz., from whom much was expected, ran beautifully for the first 15 miles, then began to lose steam, and collapsed completely in the 23d mile, and was carried from the field in the arms of his Indian trainer. Thirteen men started. Besides finishing second, Marsh has the honor of breaking the ten-mile record of 7 minutes 45 seconds made by St. Yves last April. Marsh's time for the ten miles was 54 minutes 50 seconds flat.

At this time Marsh was running a yard ahead of St. Yves, who soon passed him.

GREAT SOCCER TEAM ARRIVES

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17.—The most representative soccer football team ever sent out of British Columbia arrived today and will meet the all-California team next Saturday as a part of the Portola celebration. The northerners arrived on the steamer President and will begin training tomorrow.

The Canadian team consists of Lorimer and Hewitt, of Nanaimo; Rogers, McKinley and McLeod, of Ladysmith; Graham, of Victoria; Crickshank, Hooper, Robertson and Hurren, of Vancouver; Locke, of New Westminster, and Thomas and Beany, of Victoria. DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 17.—According to the unofficial figures of the world's championship series, the defeated Detroit team outbatted Pittsburgh, but the National League's fielders, Detroit, Detroit batted .246 and Pittsburgh .231. The new world's champions fielded .358, while Detroit averaged .364.

Hans Wagner did the hardest hitting of the series, getting nine hits out of 23 times at bat, for an average of .375. Those who bet that Wagner would outbat Cobb win by a large margin, as his leading hitter of the American League had only .231. Deleahanty was the star American League batter with .346.
