Newlands Proposes Conference to Secure Fund of \$50,000,000 Yearly.

FORCE CONGRESS TO ACT

Nevada Senator Says United Delegation Can Swing Senate and Get Money for Irrigation and Navigation.

RENO, Nev., Oct. 21.—Senator Francis G. Newlands has addressed a letter to the Senators from the arid and semi-arid states calling their attention to the waterway movement for the development of navigation, which is to be emphasized by the presence of the President at the deep waterway convention at New Orleans, October 30, and to the importance of the Senators and Representatives from the arid and semi-arid states conferring together in the interest of their region. He calls attention to the importance of comprehensive plans that will cover contemporary development of the rivers in every section of the country and particularly in the arid region, where the storage of flood waters can be made useful both for irrigation and navigation in the maintenance of a steady stream-flow.

Waterway Fund \$50,000,000 Yearly.

He urges the creation of a waterway fund of \$50,000,000 annually, and shows that this amount is necessary to develop the navigable rivers in the arid region should receive about \$5,000,000 annually, which, in addition to the reclamation fund, will take care of undrained as well as contemplated irrigation projects. This movement contemplates a conference of Senators and Representatives from about 15 states west of the Mississippi at the beginning of the next session of Congress, with a view to making the arid region a factor in waterway development.

Can Swing Senate.

Mr. Newlands calls attention to the fact that the arid and semi-arid states have nearly one-third of the Senators and can shape action to the end desired. They are experts on irrigation and can shape legislation on water so that the rivers and streams can be made to serve all the several ends desired. He states that the region controlled by the rivers which flow into the Gulf and Pacific Oceans comprises two-thirds of the country and that irrigation is one of the greatest uses of water in this region. He says the reclamation fund will not be enough to do the work with the speed desired. He urges that in forming the new waterway fund, storage of water and irrigation should be an essential part of the development of streams for navigation. Thus the waterway fund should contribute to the reclamation fund.

Apportionment of Fund.

He suggests a waterway fund of \$50,000,000 a year, to be apportioned as follows:

- One-fifth for the Atlantic waterways, including the canal and necessary to connect the base and sound.
- One-tenth for the Gulf and the inland coastal waterway from the Mississippi River along the Gulf and across Florida to the Atlantic.
- One-tenth for the Great Lakes.
- One-fifth for the main Mississippi River, including a connecting canal with the Great Lakes.
- One-tenth for the western tributaries of the Mississippi.
- One-tenth for the headwaters and source streams of the western tributaries of the Mississippi River in the arid and semi-arid regions of the Pacific Coast.
- Under this plan, the arid and semi-arid region would receive about \$5,000,000 annually from the waterway fund for the storage and control of its waters, above the amount now available from the reclamation fund.

PROVED THAT FAIR PAYS

Sherman County Experiment Is Unexpected Success.

MORO, Ore., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—Warrants for premiums awarded for stock and farm produce at the Sherman County Fair, which was held in Moro, October 1 and 2, have just been issued. Aside from the premiums for stock and farm produce, the total amount of \$20,000. Of this amount, \$200 was received from the state by appropriation, and the remainder was paid out of the general fund.

This was the first county fair ever held in Sherman County. The Fair Association, which is officially known as the Sherman County Branch of the Oregon Agricultural Society, first came into existence last spring, and began with a total capital of \$250. Now, after having paid off all premiums and settled all bills, the association has a deposit in the bank of \$20,000 held for another year. In view of the fact that this fair was more or less an experiment, and the many citizens of this county were somewhat skeptical as to its success, this result is decidedly satisfactory to those who were connected with the fair, and the many directors consist of the following: President, A. H. Barnum; vice-presidents, L. L. Peet, C. A. Buckley, Chris Anderson, J. D. Pike, treasurer, W. D. Wallan, and secretary, George Mowry.

DONOVAN LOSES HIS JOB

State's Assistant Attorney Is Said to Have Been Indiscreet.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—Deputy Prosecuting Attorney William C. Donovan has been dismissed by the Prosecuting Attorney Fred C. Pugh. The release follows the conclusion of the grand jury's work, which Mr. Donovan has been connected with as special assistant.

Donovan was really dismissed September 8, following certain alleged indiscretions committed in Olympia during the Schively impeachment proceedings. He has since been retained as Assistant Prosecutor on account of the great amount of work in the Prosecuting Attorney's office.

GRAND TRUNK LACKS MEN

Canadian Road Unable to Secure Laborers to Push Extension.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, who was to retire from the presidency of the Grand Trunk Railroad

of Canada at the close of the present year, presided today for the last time at a meeting of the board of directors. In addressing the board, Sir Charles expressed a hopeful view of the business situation and said there had been a marked improvement in the commercial conditions so far during the latter half of this year. He referred to the absence of sufficient help in British Columbia, and said that he feared that the lack of laborers to be secured there would make it impossible to fulfill the promise of completing the road's extension to Prince Rupert, on the Pacific Coast, by December of 1911.

Present Wilson complained that the government authorities of British Columbia had given but little assistance in solving the problem of obtaining laborers, and had absolutely refused permission for the importation of Chinese and Japanese. He said he personally was opposed to the appointment of an advisory board in Canada, but that he would offer no strong objections to the

plan if it should be favored by a large proportion of the shareholders. It was indispensable, he added, that the financial control of the company should remain in London.

The meeting became noisy when it was proposed to grant Sir Charles an annual pension of \$7500. After the adoption of an amendment, deferring consideration of the matter for one year, the temporary chairman announced that a poll would be taken to determine whether the directors were in favor of the original motion. The poll proved an overwhelming sentiment in favor of the motion, and accordingly a pension for Sir Charles is assured.

RUSSIANS REACH HAWAII

First Cargo of Plantation Laborers to Replace Japs.

HONOLULU, Oct. 21.—The steamer Siberia brought here today a Russian families composed of 214 members to relieve the scarcity of sugar plantation laborers which has existed on the islands since the Japanese employees went on strike.

The importation of the Russians was due to a trip made to Harbin by Immigration Commissioner Atkinson, who reports that thousands of Russians are anxious to come to the islands and it is believed that today's arrivals will serve as the start for a heavy Russian immigration to Hawaii.

CRIME PLACED AT ICE TRUST'S DOOR

Morse Corporation Accused of Crookedness in Creating Monopoly.

WINTER HARVEST SCORNE

Corporation Charged With Shunning Maine Field to Create Scarcity and Raise Prices—Attorney Admits Stock Juggled.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Prosecution of the American Ice Company, the largest dealer in ice in the world, for alleged violation of the state anti-monopoly law, was begun in the criminal branch of the Supreme Court today. Deputy Attorney-General Roger Clarke declared that "everything short of physical violence which the diabolical ingenuity of man could invent was employed by this corporation to build up a monopoly of the ice business."

He said the American Ice Company had repeatedly refused to harvest ice in its Maine fields, in order to create a scarcity of ice and to raise prices.

The idea of the organization of the combine, he continued, originated with Charles W. Morse, Deputy Attorney-General Osborne read to the jury the certificate of incorporation of a company in New Jersey wherein the capitalization was fixed at \$60,000,000, each of the five incorporators subscribing for only five shares. The capitalization was later reduced to \$40,000,000.

John R. Bennett, one of the incorporators, was called as the first witness. He admitted that out of the \$40,000,000 capitalization of the American Ice Company, \$20,000,000 had been exchanged for shares for stock in the Knickerbocker and Consolidated Ice companies' properties.

KNIGHTS ARE HONORED

MANY MASONS ADVANCED STEP NEARER 33D DEGREE.

Vacancies in Supreme Council to Be Filled—Pike's Birth to Be Celebrated.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—At the fourth day's session of the Supreme Council of Scottish Rite Masons for the Southern Jurisdiction, which convened today in executive session, nominations for knights commander of the court of honor were considered. About 300 32d degree Masons were advanced to the highest degree, a steppingstone to the 33d degree.

There are 11 vacancies in the Supreme Council and it is expected that at least two active members, possibly three, will be elected.

A resolution was adopted providing for memorial services in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Albert Pike, the Scottish Rite's patron saint, on December 23 next. On that day celebrations will be held by fraternities in all parts of the world.

Native Sons See 20,000 March in Portola Pageant.

CROWDS THROG STREETS

Ferry Boats Unable to Take Care of Hordes Hurrying to San Francisco—Orientals Form Striking Feature of Parade.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21.—San Francisco and all of her guests went crazy mad today and crowds still surged up and down the streets after the decorative illuminations were extinguished tonight. Never before has this city entertained such a huge crowd as gathered to see the big civic and industrial parade, the leading feature of the day. Long before the hour set for the forming of the parade the ferry officials announced that the boats could not handle the crowds that were seeking entrance into San Francisco from the trans-bay cities.

More than 20,000 persons marched for three hours in the big morning parade and it was late in the afternoon before the last of the floats disappeared from the streets. For a time gloom spread over the merry-makers when it was reported that Don Gaspar de Portola had been thrown from his horse and injured.

When it was learned that the superb horsemanship of the courtly Spaniard had enabled him to escape without serious injury.

The international division of the procession provided a spectacle never equaled before. The most gorgeous part of this section was devoted to Japan and China. The most attractive float in the parade was the one in the Japanese section. This float was surmounted by cherry trees laden with blossoms shading Japanese maidens dressed in the most striking silk garments.

True to their love for pageants, the Chinese made the most of today's parade and 2000 of them, dressed in garments which only an Oriental imagination could design, provided a section of the parade unparalleled in lavishing coloring and picturesque.

In the section of the parade devoted to the historical floats, Spanish dragons of the time of the real Don Gaspar marched side by side with the veterans who fought in the late Spanish-American War.

Chief of Police Cook and his officers handled the mass of humanity admirably and few serious accidents marred the day.

LONDON RAISES DISCOUNT

Bank of England Increases Rate to 5 Per Cent.

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The international monetary position shows no material improvement during the week and the bank's reserve, which is now nearing \$111,000,000, was threatened with further depletion this week by the South American and Egyptian requirements, estimated at \$7,000,000.

Foreign exchanges have been steadily against London, particularly Berlin, where gold is badly needed and where the next arrival of the metal probably would have gone before the imposition of the 5 per cent rate. It is known that requirements from other centers will soon reduce the reserve to below \$100,000,000 unless the new rate attracts gold.

The market sees in today's movement a general warning against speculative operations and the announcement was followed by a dropping in prices of British securities. Kaffirs recovered almost immediately, but Americans which earlier in the day were above parity, fell away. U. S. Steel and Union Pacific dropping 3 1/2 and several others 1/2. The tone was generally weak.

AMERICANS ARE GIVEN BLAME

Speculation Causes Demand for Money, Say Germans.

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A steady rise in the English check rate in the last few days has already raised the fear that the gold export point will be reached soon. In that event an advance by the Imperial German Bank is regarded as certain. In the meantime it is understood that in the opinion of the managers of the Imperial German Bank no occasion exists for a further advance now.
