

JIM HAMIL LEAVES AT HIS OLD, OLD GAME

Goes to Washington Seeking Advertising in Usual Mysterious Way.

HAD NO MISSION TO CHINA

Pink-Whiskered Lawyer Plays Gold Brick Game With Success on Correspondents—Knox Does Not Consult Him.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 22.—James Hamilton Lewis, he of the pink whiskers and the insatiable craving for notoriety, has been adorning the hotel lobbies of Washington recently, playing his old trade and getting an unusual amount of advertising out of it. To employ a phrase of which Mr. Lewis himself would never have been guilty, he has been "gold-bricking" the newspaper men of the National capital.

One balmy afternoon Jim Ham seated himself in a room at the Hamilton hotel, and after a change of raiment, let the word go forth by the patented Lewis underground system, that Mr. James Hamilton Lewis, of Chicago, was in town on an important mission. The untitled in the newspaper crowd flocked to Mr. Lewis' hotel to get at the story. And they got it, for Mr. Lewis is never rude to the newspaper profession.

Lewis' Mysterious Mission.
The story went forth that Mr. Lewis had been summoned to Washington by the Secretary of State for conference on the same mysterious matters of state that had brought Mr. Crane, the newly appointed Minister to China, post-haste across the continent. Mr. Lewis, it will be recalled, made a mysterious trip to the Orient last winter, and at the time it was represented by the press that he had gone at the behest of President Roosevelt to investigate diplomatic affairs in China, Japan, Manchuria and Siberia.

Now Mr. Lewis, in his talks with newspaper men in Washington did not deliberately say he had been summoned to Washington by Secretary Knox; he did not directly state that he was called here for conference with Messrs. Crane, Knox, et al.; he did not say in so many words that he was here to give the Secretary of State the advantage of confidential information he had gathered while in the Orient. But by shrewd insinuation and innuendo, and by coyly dodging questions put to him, all the time revealing a most mysterious manner, Mr. Lewis conveyed the impression to his interrogators that he had been summoned for conference, and that his visit would have much bearing upon our future relations with the countries of the Orient. Which was exactly what Mr. Lewis undertook to accomplish.

Seeks Advertising, Gets It.
Now the fact is that Mr. Lewis did not go to the Orient for the United States Government; he was not sent by President Roosevelt; he was not sent by the State or any other department. He is the last man that the Roosevelt administration would send abroad on an official mission, unless it be one of advertising. Yet Mr. Lewis, at the time he sailed, adroitly spread the notion that he went to the East to best report on important papers from the State Department. The records of the State Department, when laid bare, disclosed the fact that the only official document Mr. Lewis carried with him was a passport, for which he paid the regulation fee of \$1.

Not having gone to the Orient on a Government mission, Mr. Lewis' visit to the Orient was purely a private one. He was not sought or desired by the present Administration. Mr. Lewis was not sent for by Mr. Knox or any other official of the State Department; he was not called here for consultation with the new Minister to China; he had nothing to do with the appointment of Mr. Crane, nor was he himself, as one story indicated, ever considered as a possible appointee to the position of Minister to China. Mr. Lewis came to Washington to make a motion before the United States Supreme Court, and he timed his trip to Washington so as to enable him to get a bunch of advertising. He was successful beyond his fondest hopes. But, while he fished a pack of newspaper men, he has not fished the Administration. President Taft and Mr. Knox know Mr. Lewis and, knowing him, are wary.

JEFF PINES FOR FIGHT

Well-known sporting men, headed by Bob Vernon, Billy Wright, Walter Knight and Dan McGuinness, spoke with satisfaction over the splendid condition of Jeff Pines. The first thing Jeff said today as he stepped off the Lusitania was, "I'm ready to fight Johnson tomorrow."

When Jeff walked down the gangplank of the steamship Lusitania, he looked as well as in fighting trim. His solid bulk of frame was without superfluous flesh and his complexion was clear. Sam Berger, his sparring partner, and a host of admirers at the docks appeared surprised at the physical condition of the retired champion.

"Now I'm ready to fight Johnson tomorrow," said the big fellow, "and the sooner the articles are signed the better. I'll live up to the Berger agreement, but as to details they can take care of themselves."

"What about Johnson?" was asked. "Jeff's" brown eyes snapped as he replied:

Johnson a Big Noise.

"I care not about Johnson. That negro has made more noise and done less than any man I know."

Jeff told how he had brought himself into fighting condition, but he was a little reticent about his weight. "I weighed under 230 pounds at Carlsbad," began Jeff slowly, "and the last time I jumped on the scales it was in France—I tipped the beam at 238 pounds, but you can get me on the scales now for twenty dollars."

"How did I get into shape? It seems the newspaper men always have a word to say about my body. I did not have much when I went away and I haven't any now."

And to emphasize the point, Jeff held a substantial part of his vest in his hand to show how small his waistline had grown.

Now, at Carlsbad, I did 10 miles on the road each morning; continued the former champion, "and in the afternoon I put in my time in the gymnasium. The Germans thought I was crazy when they saw me running along the highways."

France Fight Crazy.

"I did some more work in France and trained at a place just out of Paris. I had to look at the address on a card every time I went out there to work. The French are crazy over fighting and I saw some bouts there. I

also took in some of the exhibitions at the National Sporting Club in London but their advertised heavyweight contests are nothing more than middle-weight affairs. I have done no boxing while abroad."

Jeffries said he would undergo an operation on his nose in a few days while in this city.

"I would have had it done in Carlsbad but they told me there that as well, doctors here could do it just as well, and again the prices they wanted were something fearful. My nose is broken and it interferes with my breathing."

Jeffries said he had talked to no one while abroad about his fight with Johnson and denied he had said that he wanted a purse of \$150,000 for the mill.

Johnson to Go East.

Mrs. Jeffries accompanied her husband on the trip and spent some time at her home in Saxe-Meinungen. Jeffries probably will meet Jack Johnson and his manager in this city early next week when the final articles for the fight will be signed.

Last August, in Chicago, Sam Berger for Jeffries signed a preliminary agreement with Johnson for a contest of ten rounds, from 20 to 100 rounds before the club offering the largest purse, which was to be divided on any terms made by Jeffries. The agreement provided that the fight should take place within six months after the signing of the articles.

The retired champion said he had heard in Paris that Sam McVey, in his contest with Joe Jeannette in that city, had really won the fight and that it had been fixed for Jeannette to win. Jeffries added that McVey was only a right-handed fighter and would have little chance with Johnson.

"You want a left hand to fight Johnson," added Jeffries, as he walked away to join an admiring crowd of friends on the pier.

Proceeding this battle was a fierce contest between Battling Johnson and Jack Geyer. Old Norval is a joke to the fans, but he took an awful beating, refusing to be knocked out or even jarred from his pins. But the police stopped it in the seventh round to save the battler.

Jim Cameron, the big local negro, made short work of Jack Smith, knocking him out in the fifth round.

Al Rogers had the better of Jake Arnold in the six and seven rounds, which went the limit. Both boys were wild and awkward.

fully a third of Hearst's Brooklyn speeches. He dwelt on the fact that Tammany Hall had not been aware of the location of the famous wigwag before that evening.

Knows Where Gaynor Stands.

"When Judge Gaynor says he did not know where Tammany Hall is," said Hearst, "he is either singularly insincere or singularly stupid. I can tell you where Tammany Hall stands, but Tammany Hall knows where Judge Gaynor stands or they would never have nominated him."

Hearst disclosed his ambition to add to his string of newspapers by establishing one in Brooklyn.

Start Paper in Brooklyn.

"Before my nomination," he said, "I was just preparing to start a newspaper in Brooklyn to grow with this great borough and fight for your own interests. If I am elected Mayor, I shall, of course, have to give up this particular plan, but I shall do all I can as Mayor to serve you. If I am not elected, I shall then go ahead with my newspaper idea and do all I can as a private citizen to serve you."

Bannard's prediction that Hearst will come in during his first reference to the editor during the campaign, although Hearst has attacked Bannard bitterly. Both are heading the same fusion ticket.

Gaynor's speeches covered ground that he has gone over heretofore, and included his compliments to Hearst.

David B. Hill, who made the famous slogan, "I am a Democrat," when he was leader in state politics, was in New York today with a word of praise for Gaynor.

"I hope Judge Gaynor will be elected; he is an able man," said the ex-Senator.

LEBANON, Or., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—The City Council, by unanimous vote, decided to proceed at once with construction of a new brick or reinforced concrete City Hall. The city owns a good lot, 60x100 feet, on Main street, in the heart of the business center, and it was decided to build the new hall on this property. It is the purpose to build a two-story building, and use the lower story for fire-fighting apparatus and city jail, with the upper story for offices for city officials and an assembly-room and Council chambers.

OLYMPIC CLUB WINS

Carries Off Athletic Honor of Portola Festival.

NO RECORDS ARE LOWERED

Edwards, of California, Equals

Smithson's Hurdle Record and

Rose and Plaw Easily Win

the Weight Events.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—The athletic track and field meet of the Portola festival was held today at the stadium before one of the largest crowds ever assembled on the big field.

Five teams of athletes competed in a programme of events that took several hours, and when the smoke of the conflict cleared away, the Olympic Club team was declared the winner. The team scores were as follows: Olympic Club 84, University of California 45, Stanford University 12, Seattle Athletic Club 8, Cogswell School 4.

The games were managed in a way that won great praise for the officials. Every event was called on schedule time and the finishes were exciting, although no records were lowered.

Equals Smithson's Record.
The most noteworthy achievement of the day was the winning of the 120-yard hurdle race by Edwards of the University of California, who defeated Smithson, winner of the same event as a member of the American team in the Olympic games at London. Edwards' time was 15-1-5 seconds, equalling the mark set by Smithson in London.

Ralph Rose, holder of several world's records in hurdlings, and Alfred Plaw, another strong man of the athletic field, participated in the games wearing the colors of the Olympic Club. They easily won their events and Plaw hurled the 16-pound hammer 160 feet, a remarkable throw, though the record set by himself. Summary:
