

SOCIABLE DAY IS SPENT BY RULERS

King Victor Emmanuel and Emperor Nicholas Enjoy Pheasant Shoot.

STATE DINNER IS GIVEN

Italy's Ruler Toasts Greatness of His Guest's Domain and Czar Replies With Praise of Beauty and Welcome of Country.

RACONTE. Oct. 24.—King Victor Emmanuel and his guest, the Emperor of Russia, passed most of the day together. The Emperor, after his long journey and the triumphs Saturday, retired early last night so that he might be on hand at a seasonable hour for a pheasant shoot that had been arranged for Sunday morning. Instead of shooting, however, the King and Emperor took a motor trip, unaccompanied, to the medieval castle at Polenzo, 17 miles distant.

In the afternoon the two sovereigns joined the shooting party, which was accompanied by several hundred beaters. Pheasants and hares were abundant and the bag was excellent.

State Dinner Is Given.

A state dinner in the evening was the principal event of the day. Besides the sovereigns, the guests included the Duke of the Abruzzi, the Duchess of Genoa, Princess Letitia, Prince Udine, the members of the Italian cabinet, and other high Italian and Russian officials.

King Victor Emmanuel, in toasting the Emperor, extended his heartiest greetings to the Russian sovereign, saying that his visit confirmed the close friendship and harmony uniting the houses of the two countries. He ended by drinking to the imperial family and to the greatness and prosperity of Russia.

Czar Enjoys His Visit.

Emperor Nicholas replied that he was touched by the cordiality of his reception. His visit to this beautiful country had realized a wish dear to his heart, and he only regretted that the condition of his health had prevented the Emperor from coming with him.

The Emperor expressed confidence that the Russian and Italian governments could labor effectively to cultivate a sympathetic bond that would not only lead to an agreement in their reciprocal interests, but also to a general peace.

Praises Italy's Greatness.

He said it was especially agreeable to him to be in Italy on the anniversary of the wedding of the Italian sovereigns. He ended by toasting the Italian Royal Family and the greatness of the beautiful country whose hospitality he enjoyed.

Rev. Charles F. Aked, of the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church, popularly known as "Rockefeller's Church," spoke on "The Church and Politics," saying:

JUDGE GAYNOR ON DEFENSE

Declares "White Slave" Article in Recent Magazine Is Untrue.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—W. J. Gaynor, Democratic nominee for Mayor of New York, granted an interview tonight in which he attacked the writer of an article in the current issue of McClure's Magazine who declares traffic in girls is carried on by Tammany Hall. Characterizing the article as "miserable trash," Judge Gaynor said:

"Now, none of your newspapers has my permission to use this without saying you asked for it. I am not volunteering it. You asked for it."

"This writer is a mere political and racial bigot. It sticks out in every line. He has the traits of ignorance, superficiality, recklessness and irresponsibility to falsify which are the characteristics of the Hearst writers and which people have got onto at last. What a grand article could be written on the subject of this miserable trash."

"He is just a vulgar, bigoted fellow trying to make political capital. The fact is, as everyone knows who has read or traveled, that New York is the most decorous of the large cities of the world, with the lowest percentage of this vice of any of them. And yet there are impure-minded political and race bigots, whose delight is to lie about and slander New York in this respect and in others. They are a detestable lot and I hope for an opportunity to make them shut up or go out."

"We all look with profound reverence upon the great body of our clergymen, Jewish, Protestant and Catholic, who are constantly working for the moral welfare and uplifting of our people, calling in the assistance of the Civil Government to aid them when necessary, and who steadily, gradually and consistently do so much good. But those few detestable sensationalists, notoriety-seekers and political and racial bigots are deserving only of contempt."

"This writer shows the mean bigotry that fills his soul. He does not scruple to lay the evils he mentions to the Jews as a race. I believe I am as familiar with the inbred and innate virtues of

In the absence of any word from Chief Justice Fuller, it was not announced that the Supreme Court would stand adjourned tomorrow out of respect to the memory of Justice Peckham. It is understood, however, that the court will meet at noon as usual and will immediately adjourn without touching the docket.

MANY DEBATED AS SUCCESSOR

Several Names Mentioned for Place Made Vacant on Bench.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Although none of the officials would discuss to-

day's work, the names of several men were mentioned as possible successors to Justice Peckham. The names of Frederick N. Johnson, of St. Louis, ex-Secretary of War Luke E. Wright, the present Secretary, J. M. Dickinson, Henry M. Hoyt, counsel for the State Department and Solicitor-General in the Roosevelt Administration, and Solicitor Bowers have been prominently mentioned.

Mr. Johnson is known to command the respect and friendship of President Taft, who with Judson Harmon, now Governor of Ohio, was appointed by President Roosevelt to investigate the question of the two investigations did not meet with the complete approval of President Roosevelt and they resigned.

Shortly before the opening of the campaign last year, Mr. Johnson wrote a magazine article explaining Mr. Taft's decisions in labor cases during the time Mr. Taft was on the bench. LONDON, Oct. 24.—(Special.)—J. M. Barrie, the novelist, who divorced his wife within a week, now wants her back again. He does not want to marry Pauline Chase, his beautiful young ward, he has declared.

He loves his wife; he is willing—despite proofs at court of her guilt—to have her come back to him. And he is offering her all sorts of inducements to return.

All England is literally astounded by the sudden change in the affairs of its most popular playwright and author. For days it has become known that Barrie has been writing letters to his wife (who was Mary Ansell, an actress), humbling himself, begging her pardon for having instituted the suit, forgiving her misdeeds and absolutely begging her to wed him again.

He has offered, it became known today, to settle \$200,000 on her in a lump sum if she will again be his wife.

Mrs. Barrie thus far has been altogether unresponsive.

The name of Francisco Ferrer until the window rattled their castings more enthusiastic gathering of local Socialists has never voiced their sympathy for the oppressed, and when resolutions were adopted condemning the latest execution of one of their leaders in Spain the vociferous demonstration shook the roof.

The resolutions carried unanimously, and a copy will be sent to the Spanish Minister at Washington. They follow:

Whereas, Ignorance is the greatest bar to human progress and the growth and spread of knowledge is the only hope of future humanity and that those who devote their lives to the spread of knowledge should be honored as social benefactors and their memories cherished in the hearts of all mankind; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we regard the murder of Professor Francisco Ferrer, the great Spanish educator and founder of the modern school in Spain, as the most deplorable crime of modern times and a reversion to the darkest days of the dark ages. We regard it as a crime unparalleled since the burning of Giordano Bruno, and future generations will so regard it and venerate Ferrer's name, while the name of his bloody murderers will be a mockery and a byword to the end of history; and be it

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions will be sent to the Spanish Minister at Washington, D. C.

An amendment to the resolutions presented by C. E. S. Wood regretting the apparent indifference of the United States Government and leading newspapers of the country in the Ferrer affair was passed also.

Money For Defense.

In the early part of the meeting a collection was taken up for the purpose of contributing to the defense fund for Gutierrez de Lara, the Mexican, who will be tried in Los Angeles as an anarchist and whom the Mexican government wishes imported back to his country.

Addresses were given by C. E. S. Wood and Hubert Langerock on the subject, "Francisco Ferrer, Martyr for the Truth." Each spoke at some length concerning the manner in which Ferrer was executed.

Colonel Wood proclaimed with great eloquence that Ferrer was murdered because his teachings and influence in Spain meant the death of absolutism.

Ferrer Trial Sham.

"Ferrer was killed," said Colonel Wood, "because he believed that government best governs least, and that the inequality of this world is due to the kind of government that is maintained. He assailed the right of nobles to ride on the backs of private citizens, and was slain for it."

Hubert Langerock told of the sham manner in which Ferrer's trial was carried on. "Affidavits," he said, "of all sorts of imaginary crimes were brought up against him in the trial. The Spanish government could not convict Ferrer by fair means, so foul means were used. The man was killed because he stood for enlightenment and education, and not on account of any participation in riots. Ferrer's crime was in fighting the convent school system in Spain, which held students in slavery."

PORTLAND SPEEDS HONEYMOON MISSIONERS.

Farewell Services Held at First Congregational Church for Rev. and Mrs. E. D. Kellogg.

Yesterday was a red letter day in the history of the First Congregational Church of this city. The usual morning service was dispensed with, and instead a special service was conducted for the purpose of commissioning Rev. Edward Kellogg and Mrs. Alice Rope Kellogg to the foreign missionary service in Foochow, China. The Kelloggs were recently married. Mr. Kellogg is a native of Orange, Mass., and was graduated a few months ago by the Bangor (Me.) Theological Seminary. Mrs. Kellogg is a native of Bangor, and a graduate of Bryn Mawr College, of Philadelphia.

The formal service in receiving these young people began at 11 A. M. On the platform were seated Miss Alice P. Adams, who has charge of the Christian Social Settlement work in Okayama, Japan, first established on December 25, 1892, of which the Japanese in America are liberal supporters; Mrs. E. C. Lumm, a missionary in India many years ago; Rev. and Mrs. George W. Hinman, for a number of years the special missionaries in Foochow, but who had to resign on account of ill health; W. D. Drill, a missionary from East Africa, recently returned on a furlough; Rev. H. M. Tenney, D. D., district secretary of the American Board on the Pacific Coast, San Francisco; Rev. Luther R. Dyott, and Rev. Guy L. Dick, pastor and assistant pastor of the church.

An impressive dedicatory sermon was made by P. S. C. E. on the topic, "How Can Our Christian Endeavorers Help Our Missionaries?"

Mr. and Mrs. Kellogg will leave for Vancouver, B. C., this morning at 10 o'clock. There they will take the ocean steamer, and it is expected that they will arrive at their destination some time in December.

SPAIN IN FERMENT

Demonstrations of Protestation Held in Cities.

MAURA'S POLICY DEcriED

Troops Preserve Order and Prevent Anti-Clerical Outbursts From Doing Damage—Bomb Found Placed in London Church.

MADRID, Oct. 24.—Several thousand Republicans and Socialists, headed by Deputy Alejandro Leroux, chief of the Republicans in Barcelona, paraded the principal streets of Madrid today in protest against ex-Premier Maura's policy.

A similar demonstration occurred at Saragosa, but there were no disorders in either place.

FIND BOMB IN LONDON CHURCH

Sacristan Extinguishes Fuse and Two Suspects Arrested.

LONDON, Oct. 24.—A bomb was found today in the church of the Irish Dominicans here. The sacristan extinguished the fuse.

Two persons were arrested on suspicion of having carried the bomb into the edifice.

TROOPS DRAFTED TO STOP MOB

Anti-Clerical Outbursts Occur in Spanish City.

BILBAO, Spain, Oct. 24.—Ten thousand persons took part here today in an anti-clerical demonstration and extra troops were drafted into service.

The religious establishments have been heavily guarded.

Catholics Urged to Protest.

PARIS, Oct. 24.—M. Florens, ex-minister of foreign affairs, is circulating an address among the Catholics, which later will be presented to King Alfonso, denouncing the Ferrer demonstrations in France as an insult to the chivalry of the French people and the Catholic religion.
