HARMON MAY RIDE DONKEY

Democrats Grooming Ex-Governor to Head National Ticket.

BUFFALO, Oct. 26.—The National Monthly, edited by Chairman Norman E. Mack, of the Democratic National Committee, and now the official organ of the committee, gives considerable space in its November number to an article by Judson Harmon, Governor of Ohio, in which he bitterly assails the Republican administration on account of the new tariff bill and other alleged political ineptitudes.

Governor Harmon was the principal speaker on Democratic day at the Texas State Fair at Dallas on October 15, and his address there, taken in connection with his article in Chairman Mack's National Monthly, has given rise to the statement in political quarters in close relation with Mr. Mack that the chairman of the Democratic National Committee has dropped William J. Bryan as a Presidential possibility, and is now engaged in grooming Governor Harmon for the Democratic Presidential nomination in 1912.
