

PERSONAL LIBERTY IS GAYNOR'S PLEA

German-Americans Put Stamp of Approval on Tiger's Candidate.

BANNARD'S CRY IS GRAFT

Republican Nominee Warns Voters Against Man Who Will Not Enforce Laws—Hearst's Slogan Is "Down With Bosses."

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—With New York's municipal election only three working days distant, there was a general summing up of issues tonight by the 500 speakers who presented the causes of Gaynor, Bannard and Hearst to audiences in every corner of Greater New York.

Gaynor, speaking four times to audiences in Brooklyn, Manhattan and Bronx, returned to his plea for greater personal liberty, the abolition of police "corruption" and liberalism in the enforcement of minor laws.

Bannard, the Republican candidate, told seven mass meetings that he stood "first, last and all the time for a business administration in a Tammany-free city."

Incidentally he attacked Mr. Gaynor's stand on the personal liberty question.

Bannard Fears Graft.

"Beware of the candidate who tells you he will not enforce the laws," said Mr. Bannard. "He is a dangerous demagogue and his position in this matter is bound to lead to graft of the most widespread character."

Hearst was silent tonight, but his followers in ten mass meetings kept the theme burning. At each meeting a long banner which hung above the stage, bearing the words "Down with the bosses of both parties," furnished the text for the speakers.

German-Americans Indorse Gaynor.

Gaynor's plea for personal liberty received an enthusiastic indorsement at a meeting of the German-American citizens in Cooper Union. At the conclusion of his address resolutions were adopted declaring that of the three candidates in the field Gaynor was the "most implacable foe of bosses and the most insistent champion of the people's rights."

The resolutions offered the loyal support of the meeting to the Democratic ticket, after declaring that German-Americans were "unanimously opposed to the Puritanical Sunday, as well as to local option and prohibition agitation, as un-American and un-democratic."

Managers Claim Confidence.

The campaign managers for all three candidates again expressed their confidence today in the result of the election. There was evidence, however, that the leaders believe the race is closer than their forecasts would indicate. In all three camps, it was announced, the speechmaking and campaigning on the campaign trail, although the opening of the polls at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning. Usually the pace slackens with the Saturday night preceding election day.

BATTLESHIP PLANS STOLEN

England Loses Sketches of Dreadnought Indomitable.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Discussing a recent rumor in the House of Commons today, Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, admitted that confidential drawings having to do with the construction of the Dreadnought cruiser Indomitable had disappeared. He added, however, that as the British battleship had been in commission for some time the missing plans had lost much of their value.

The loss of the sketches has resulted in the usual suggestion that they have found their way into the hands of the German government, but so far as known this is but a surmise.

INDEFATIGABLE IS LAUNCHED

England's Fourth New Battleship Cruiser Takes Ways.

DEVONPORT, England, Oct. 28.—The new Indefatigable, a larger and improved battleship-cruiser of the Invincible class, was launched today.

This vessel will complete the quartet of battleship-cruisers of this type designed for the British navy. The Indefatigable has a displacement of 23,000 tons, 45,000 horsepower and a planned speed of 25 knots an hour. Her length is 520 feet. She was laid down in January.

DE LARA OUT ON BONDS

Mexican Attorney's \$3000 Bail Signed by Business Men.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28.—L. Gutierrez de Lara, the Mexican attorney held by the United States Immigration authorities on charges of being an anarchist and illegally in this country, was released from jail today on \$3000 bond pending his hearing before Chief Inspector Ridgway, of the Immigration Service.

De Lara's bond was signed by C. C. Reynolds, a prominent and wealthy hardware merchant, and Alfred M. Sawyer, a well-known local business man.

The date of the hearing has not yet been fixed.

REWARD FOR DYNAMITERS

Indianapolis Mayor Asks Contributions to Catch Culprits.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 28.—Mayor Book-walter today issued a general call for a meeting of manufacturers, merchants and insurance writers tomorrow for the purpose of assembling a large fund to be offered as a reward for the arrest and conviction of the co-conspirators that wrecked buildings in different parts of the city last Sunday night by exploding dynamite.

The Mayor has also asked the Common Council to appropriate \$1000 as the city's contribution to the reward.

a director in the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company to succeed the late H. H. Rogers, at the meeting of the stockholders today. Paul Morton, of New York, and Benjamin P. Cheney, of Boston, were re-elected on the directorate. President Ripley said that the condition of the company is highly satisfactory to the stockholders.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—John R. Walsh, whose conviction of misuse of funds of the Chicago National Bank, was affirmed recently by the United States Appellate Court, may remain at liberty under bonds pending an appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States.

The decision making this possible was rendered in the Appellate Court today, when Judge Grosscup denied the petition of the Government to have the Walsh bond of \$50,000 canceled.

Walsh, who was hitherto allowed to travel about the country, must remain henceforth in Chicago. In his decision, Judge Grosscup said that for the court to sustain the Government's petition "would be to say that no convicted man, whose conviction has been affirmed, shall be allowed to be out on bail pending a petition for rehearing or application to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari."

After the Court of Appeals had announced its decision, the attorneys representing the Walsh holdings, although guaranteeing on the note of \$7,000,000 now outstanding, interest on which is due today, to prevent foreclosure proceedings against the deposited collateral, held a conference.

The Chicago Clearing House Association, which holds the note, has received no intimation of any payment of interest to be made today. The position of the Clearing House banks, as outlined by its spokesman, is that no attempt will be made to embarrass the guarantors and that if satisfactory assurance that the interest and note will be paid is forthcoming, an extension of a few days will probably be granted.

Practical and legal circles have buzzed through the morning with the different rumors concerning the probable purchasers of the Walsh railroad bonds, but none of the parties directly interested would make any positive declaration.

The Record Herald today prints a story asserting that Mr. Walsh will be permitted to return to his home in Chicago quarterly interest on the \$7,121,887 Chicago National Bank loan, with funds advanced by the United States Steel Corporation in return for the steel corporation had obtained an option from John R. Walsh, the former banker, for the purchase of the Walsh railroad for the sum of \$7,000,000.

The following statement was made by Judge Grosscup: "As far as the U. S. Steel Corporation is concerned, there is absolutely no truth in the story. As to whether anyone else has secured the bonds, I have no idea."

Wall street was much interested today to learn what disposition had been made by Walsh of his railroads. Two days ago it was stated at the office of J. P. Morgan & Co. that they were not interested in the properties and knew nothing about them. It is suggested in financial quarters that Mr. Walsh has probably turned over his railroads to those who are friendly to the steel corporation.

COREANS ARE GLAD

Assassination of Ito Gains Their Approval.

JAPAN SEEKS INSTIGATORS

Resident's Palace Under Strong Guard and General Uprising in Korea Feared—Secret Propaganda Against Ito.

SEOUL, Oct. 28.—It is evident from the attitude of a considerable section of the Korean population that the assassination of Prince Ito was not unpleasant. Those comprising this element, which is now deprived of opportunities formerly offered here, are agitating for further violence.

The Japanese resident-general is much disturbed by the reports coming regarding the attitude of some officials and others who formerly were closely connected with the Emperor's court.

Plot Hatched in Seoul.

It is now believed the entire plot was hatched in Seoul and the closest investigation is proceeding to discover the instigators of Prince Ito's murder. It is said several prominent Koreans lent themselves to a secret agitation and encouraged the people in general in the opinion that the sympathy of foreign countries would be extended to them if

the situation were brought forcibly to their attention. It is now known that secret societies existed to spread the propaganda that Prince Ito's outward friendship for Korea was merely a blind. The report also was widely circulated that Japan proposed to confiscate the property of all Koreans, depose the Emperor and drive the people into the sea.

Fear General Uprising.

The palace of the resident-general is strongly guarded day and night. A feeling of unrest pervades Korea and it is feared the assassination will be followed by an active movement looking to a general uprising in the hope of intervention by the United States or some other power to prevent the further absorption of Korea's sovereignty by Japan.

The ten Koreans arrested at Harbin will be rigorously examined with a view to discovering the instigators of the plot. It can be confidently stated that the best element among the Koreans are still loyal to the memory of Prince Ito and it is not considered probable that the agitation will be successful in unsettling the country to any great extent, especially in view of Japan's announced intention not to change the policies promulgated by Ito.

ASSASSIN WAS SEOUL EDITOR

One of 20 Koreans Sworn to Kill Prince Ito.

HARBIN, Manchuria, Oct. 28.—The assassin of Prince Ito was identified today as Imhoun Angan, a former editor of a newspaper at Seoul.

He said that he was one of an organization of 20 Koreans who had taken an oath that they would kill the Japanese resident-general.

The assassin used dum-dum bullets, poisoned with cyanide.

CHURCHENTERS POLITICS

FRENCH EPISCOPATE TO WAGE WAR ON SCHOOLS.

Catholics Demand Re-establishment of Complete Liberty in Education—Voters Unite.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—A new and interesting situation has been created by the French episcopate's declaration of war against the public schools of France, and the open attempt initiated by Archbishop Germain of Toulouse, to rally the Catholic voters at the general election of 1910 in support of candidates committed to the defense of church interests.

"We demand the re-establishment of religious peace, first, by a direct entente between the Sovereign and the Pontiff, or by new legislation acceptable to the latter, and assuring full liberty to the church; and, second, the re-establishment of complete liberty of education."

The archbishop says the situation of French Catholics is intolerable and that they must adopt the attitude of their Irish brethren in the days of Daniel O'Connell and their German brethren in the days of Bismarck's "kulturkampf."

M. Doumergue, Minister of Education, this afternoon issued a circular to school teachers, instructing them to disregard the demand of the clergy and Catholic parents for the withdrawal of textbooks placed under the ban by the Episcopate. The circular further announces that children who systematically refuse to attend the classes and to use textbooks regularly

approved by the government will be subjected to discipline. Although the extreme anti-clerical radicals of the type of former Premier Emile Combes urge that the time has come for the state to suppress completely the private and religious schools and assume a monopoly of education, the general disposition of the Republican groups which accomplished the separation of church and state has been to ignore the Catholic campaign in the belief that the country was in no danger of reversing its adopted policy. Nevertheless, the government is preparing a bill for the protection of teachers who are subjected to persecution by Catholic parents and religious committees which are forming throughout the republic.

Premier Briand, it is expected, will set forth the views of the government in the matter during a speech on public education which he is to deliver next Saturday.
