

CHINESE MISSIONS STIR UP MINISTERS

Session of Association Livened
by Tilts Over Their Success
or Failure Here.

AUDITORIUM IS DESIRED

After Mission Storm Passes, Clergy-
men Unite to Work for Building
Big Enough to Accommodate
Gypsy Smith if He Comes.

When Dr. L. R. Dyott, pastor of the First Congregational Church, read a paper at the meeting of the Portland Ministerial Association yesterday morning at the Y. M. C. A. on "What Shall We Emphasize in Modern Religion?" he set fire to the fuse that started a small bunch of fireworks. In his paper Dr. Dyott took occasion to criticize the press for its attitude on Chinese missions and especially for the way the Elele Sigel murder in New York was handled.

"Abominable" was the way Dr. Dyott characterized the newspaper accounts of the Sigel murder. He declared the New York police had found on further investigation that the Sigel girl had not been murdered at all, but that some other girl was the victim. However, the speaker said he was not in favor of allowing young girls to teach in Chinese missions, although he believed such missions are not failures.

That was the bomb that fell. Immediately there was a clamor for the floor. Rev. C. E. Cline was the first to be heard, and he rushed to the defense of the press. Incidentally he roundly condemned Chinese missions.

Portland Missions Failure—Cline.

"Where there is so much smoke there is sure to be fire," said Mr. Cline. "I do not think any Chinese mission ever amounted to anything, and the greatest failure I have ever known is the Chinese mission movement in Portland."

After Mr. Cline's remarks there was another stampede for the floor and Rev. E. S. Muckley rushed to the defense of the missions. Mr. Muckley believes China can be Christianized and he also believes some of the press criticisms are true. Likewise he gently opined it was as possible for Mr. Cline to draw wrong conclusions as any one else.

Charles W. Hayes waxed indignant over the subject and said if religious work among the Chinese in Portland is a failure, then the ministers are a failure. "The reason Chinese missions have failed out," he said, "is because the churches have not put enough money into them. The Presbyterian Church has put about \$500 into the work. I do not like the stand the press has taken."

When Dr. Dyott was heard again he remarked he really would have been disappointed if Mr. Cline had agreed with him. In his paper he touched on the age of transition everything is passing through. "Everything in heaven and earth is being shaken," he said, "but I mean no reference to Marshall street. Some things must go whether we wish it or not. The time is past for all fighting between men of different religious persuasions."

Auditorium Question Arises.

After the smoke of the Chinese mission battle had cleared, the ministers took up the question of an auditorium in Portland, and in this they were heartily in accord. They finally appointed a committee to take the matter up with the Commercial Club, with a view to having the latter promote the project.

The need of a large auditorium was suggested when it was said that Gypsy Smith, the evangelist, would not consent to come to this city unless he could be provided with a hall that would seat at least 5000 people.

The evangelist's attitude on the matter was presented to the association by Dr. W. H. Foulkes, who had previously been appointed a committee of one to see what could be done in the way of securing the noted preacher.

"Mr. Smith," said Dr. Foulkes, "expressed himself as exceedingly anxious to come to the Coast, and he would come next Fall if certain conditions are met. It is the plan of the committee in charge of Smith's itinerary to have him spend about four months on the Coast, beginning next September and to stay about three weeks in each of the large cities."

Hall to Seat 5000 Needed.

"The first condition to be met, if he comes to this city," said Dr. Foulkes, "is to have a hall seating about 5000 or at least 3000 people."

He then explained the other condition was to get the necessary funds to pay the fare of the evangelist from Chicago to Portland, and perhaps from Portland back to London, as well as to provide his hotel accommodations while here.

The committee appointed to confer with the Commercial Club regarding an auditorium consists of the following: Rev. W. H. Foulkes, First Presbyterian Church; Rev. J. W. Brougher, White Temple; Rev. L. R. Dyott, First Congregational Church; Rev. W. F. Reager, First Christian Church; Rev. W. T. Easter, Sunnyside Methodist Church; Rev. Earl C. DuBois, Second Baptist Church.

Miss Anna Louise Strong asked the support of the ministers in the "Know Your City" movement, to be held here November 8-12, and secured written expressions of commendation of the work from most of the clergymen present.

A. M. Griller, physical director of the Y. M. C. A., asked the ministers to organize a gymnasium class for physical culture, but most of the preachers did not endorse over the idea. During Mr. Griller's talk an echo of the fireworks of earlier in the session was heard, when Rev. C. E. Cline remarked that Dr. Brougher's exercise seemed to be taken mostly with Father O'Hara.

REPORT DENIED BY WILDE

Not Attempting to Form Association
to Control Telephone Bonds.

In a telegram from San Diego, Cal., Louis J. Wilde denies that he is attempting to form a Pacific Coast association through which to secure control of a majority of the outstanding Omaha telephone bonds. It was reported at a recent meeting of these bondholders residing in Portland that Mr. Wilde was engineering such a scheme and for that reason it was decided to proceed independently of Mr. Wilde and take such steps as might be deemed advisable to protect their own interests. The committee that was named at the Portland meeting is now securing the names of all such bondholders throughout the Pacific Northwest preliminary to inviting them to attend a mass meeting which is contemplated.

whatsoever to depositors. I did not send circulars on the other hand. I strongly opposed the Chicago proposition after I had received their circular. MAYOR SIMON THANKED

MOUNT SCOTT GRATEFUL FOR
BULL RUN WATER.

Contract With Woodmere Company
Formally Approved at Meeting of
Improvement Association.

Indorsement of the present water contract between the city and the Woodmere Water Company for the present emergency water supply for the Mount Scott district and thanks to Mayor Simon for his action in the matter were voted unanimously at the meeting of the Mount Scott Improvement Association last night. Charles Stout presided and O. N. Ford, acting as secretary, read a letter from Mayor Simon expressing regret that he could not attend the meeting. The Mayor added:

"However, I beg to assure you and those who attend the meeting, and indeed all interested that I am in sympathy with the efforts you are making to better local conditions. The water situation has not been satisfactory. I refer particularly to the laying of water mains throughout the city and taxing the cost to the abutting owners. I favor an amendment to the charter which will authorize the Water Board to lay water mains and pay for the same out of the city funds derived from the sale of bonds, water rates and other sources of income. The amendment I refer to must, of course, be sufficiently guarded so as to prevent the improper use of public moneys by speculating lot owners desiring to dispose of outside lands."

The secretary read the full text of the agreement between the city and the Woodmere Water Company. On motion it was approved as the only thing that could have been done to secure Bull Run water at once. A second motion was carried thanking Mayor Simon for his prompt action in securing water for the district.

It was announced that mail carriers had been provided for the Mount Scott district, and that free delivery would be established as soon as streets are marked and houses numbered according to the city system. Four policemen are also to be provided by January 1. Dr. L. E. Carter and W. D. Hayes were appointed to urge that the streets be marked and numbers of houses be provided, and to call on Councilman Rushlight to have the resolutions introduced in the Council.

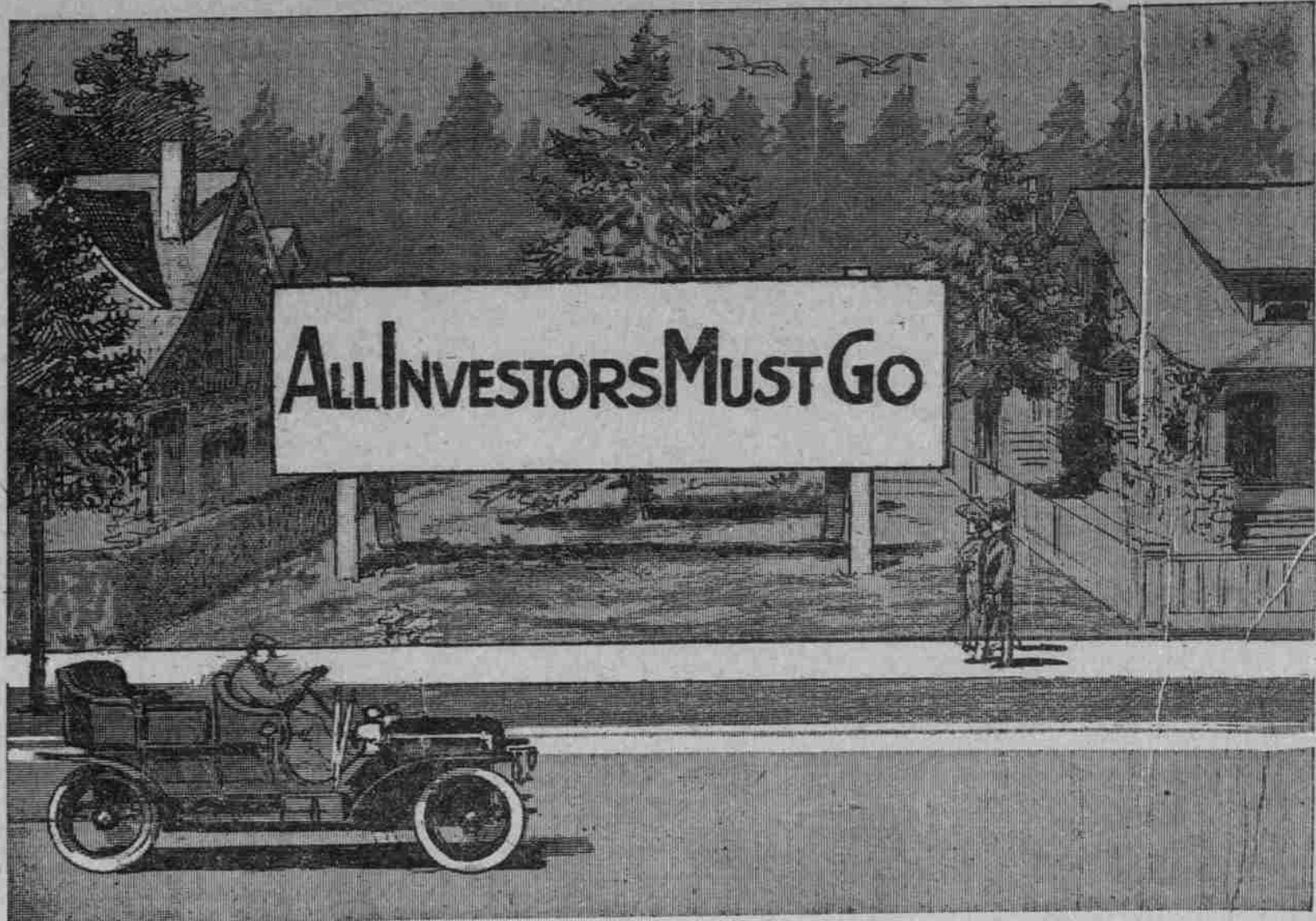
