

TAMMANY GAINS BUT HALF VICTORY

Elects Gaynor, but Loses Control of Funds to Republicans.

WHITMAN BEATS BATTLE

New York Gives Tammany Mayor Over 70,000 Plurality, but Keeps Spoils From Tiger's Clutches. Town to Be Wide Open.

The "less personal attacks of Bannard. His enemies sought to show that in his capacity as Justice of the Supreme Court he had tried to defeat the purpose of anti-betting legislation in this state, but the candidate, while denying the charges briefly, declined to answer at length what he branded as lies.

During the campaign, William M. Ivins, Republican candidate for Mayor in 1906, publicly charged Justice Gaynor, then on the bench, with misusing his office for political purposes and challenged him to bring proceedings for disbarment.

District Attorney Jerome called him a "political charlatan, shown in the past to be totally destitute of political courage and whose erratic ability is tinged with a morbidness which is almost akin to insanity—a combination of a demagogue and fanatic."

Broke Power of McKane.

To these charges Justice Gaynor's friends replied that he believes in the old-time Democratic axiom: If it be possible "that government is best which governs least" his decisions and his political life will be found alike consistent.

Justice Gaynor, who is 54 years old, married and the father of eight children, first attained prominence in connection with a taxpayer's suit, which he caused to be brought against Hugh McLaughlin, one time Democratic boss of Brooklyn. In the course of which he saved the city \$1,000,000. In a similar suit against the Brooklyn Elevated Railways he collected another million for the city in back taxes. In 1898 he was elected to the State Supreme Court and, while a member of the court, he broke the power of John J. McKane, boss of Coney Island, and sent him to Sing Sing for election frauds. McKane's downfall was directly the result of his defiance of watchers at the polls appointed by Justice Gaynor, coupled with his announcement, "Injunctions got here."

Got Bingham's Scalp.

He supported Bryan in his first campaign and Hearst for Governor in 1906. His pressing of the charges against Police Commissioner Bingham, growing out of the Duffy case, involving the right of police to hold the picture of an unconvicted person in the rogues' gallery, led directly to the removal of General Bingham and brought Gaynor into renewed public attention just before the Fall campaign opened.

In his speech of acceptance, Gaynor said:

"I shall not take a nomination to which is annexed any pledge, promise or condition whatsoever, other than to be Mayor in fact."

Few Repeaters in Evidence.

Although many arrests were made for violation of the election law, the greater part of these were found to be due to clerical errors or misunderstandings. The professional repeater and guerrilla were chiefly notable by their absence. Credit for this satisfactory state of affairs was given largely to the new election law, put into practice for the first time in a New York municipal election. Under this law every voter after receiving his ballot is compelled to write his name and have it compared with the signature which he made at the time of registration.

Every polling place has its quota of watchers, including nearly 2000 college students from Columbia, Yale and Princeton and other nearby institutions, who were distributed throughout the greater city. The entire police force of 10,100 was on duty before daylight, the majority of them in the polling places, with squads of "plain clothes" scouts and detectives ready for any emergency.

Young Taft Is Scout.

Robert A. Taft, the President's son, who was among the earliest college men to volunteer as a watcher, was stationed early in the day at a Third Avenue polling place. His presence, however, proved such an attraction that the police were compelled to disperse the spectators by halting the polling place, with squads of "plain clothes" scouts and detectives ready for any emergency.

Much Tammany Crookedness. "It is true that this has been a quiet election," he said, "but there has been much crookedness, and I think we shall hear more of this later. Our watchers reported all day long that ballots had been found already marked with a cross in the Democratic column before being handed to the voter. There were other peculiar things going on, too, but generally I cannot say at this time."

CROKER MAKES NO COMMENT

Out of Politics and Will Not Advise Tammany Leaders.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Richard Croker, Tammany's old chief, heard the returns tonight at the Democratic Club. It was the first time he had been there on an election night since Seth Low defeated Van Wyck.

"What do you think of it?" he was asked. "I'm not thinking," said Croker with a smile. "I'm out of it. I don't know. I've not mixed in it and I don't want to. I shall stay in New York five days more, but I will not advise with the leaders of Tammany Hall. I am going to Florida. I intend to stay in the country about six months and I shall come back here every year."

AGAIN STANDS BY HUGHES

Orleans County Rejects Man Who Opposed Direct Primary.

ALBION, N. Y., Nov. 2.—Orleans County, which stood by Governor Hughes in the race track fight, again demonstrated its regard for him today. Colin P. Wright, direct primary nominee of the Democrats, was elected to the Assembly by 139 plurality over Frank J. Murphy, who voted

against the direct primary bill in the last Legislature.

G. O. P. GETS LOWER HOUSE

New York Assembly Will Be Republican by 38 Majority.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The election throughout the state for members of the assembly resulted in the choice of a lower branch of the Legislature having a Republican majority of about 38, as compared with a Republican majority of 48 in the last assembly.

FOOTBALL PLAYER BURIED

Cadet Byrne Mourned by Entire School—Post in Mourning.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Nov. 2.—Cadet Eugene A. Byrne, who died on Sunday as the result of injuries received in the Harvard-Army football game, was given a military burial in the academy cemetery today. The funeral was attended by the entire body of cadets, officers of the academy and the Army post, and by scores of friends of the young soldier. The parents of Cadet Byrne stood beside the grave. The post will be in mourning for 30 days.

FOOTBALL MAY BE TAMED

Colleges Plan Elimination of Dangerous Features of Game.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Football enthusiasts believe that, as a result of the death of Cadet Byrne, at West Point, and the dangerous injury of Midshipman Wilson, of Annapolis, the College Football Conference Association will eliminate certain dangerous features of the present game, which it meets in this city next month to revise the rules. While those who have advocated the adoption of soccer football in place of the American game have not received any great amount of encouragement, there seems to be, according to dispatches from the various institutions, a desire on the part of the heads of colleges, trainers and coaches, to amend the present rules so that there will be more open play in the game and absolutely no mass plays.

CARTER FAVORS BONDS

Senator Wants \$50,000,000 Issue for Irrigation Work.

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., Nov. 2.—Members of the Senate irrigation committee, accompanied by Director F. H. Newell, spent today as guests of the Grand Valley Water Users Association, inspecting the high line project. Senator Carter, acting as spokesman, tonight at an informal reception, declared in favor of action by Congress authorizing an issue of certificates of indebtedness up to \$50,000,000 for use by the reclamation bureau in completing irrigation projects now under construction.

LABORER IS FOUND DEAD

Isaiah Low Discovered in His Room When Door Is Broken In.

Isaiah Low, sometimes known as Charles Low, aged 33 years, a laborer, was found dead in his room at East Washington streets last night by Patrolman Sherwood and A. F. Countryman, a friend of the dead man, when the officer broke in the door. Low had been in the room since last Sunday morning. At that time he retired, complaining of feeling ill, and it was decided to break in his door last night, as nothing had been heard of him.

Want Books Experted.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—A petition has been filed, asking that another proposed amendment to the Seaside charter be submitted to a vote of the people at the municipal election on December 8, and making election on December 8, and making 20 in all. LOWIT WILL FIGHT TO KEEP LIBERTY

Golden Eagle Man Nominally Under Arrest in Denver, but Combative.

SAYS HE WAS CLEARED

Man Who Throve on Oregon Trust Bank's Fund Professes to Have Been Tried and Acquitted in Oregon Court.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—On instructions from Portland, Gus Lowit, who conducts a small store here, was quietly arrested Sunday night, and has since been nominally in custody, his attorneys guaranteeing to produce him whenever wanted.

Declaring he will fight extradition to the court of last resort, Lowit says he is being persecuted by enemies, and that he was acquitted a year ago in Portland after trial on the same charge on which he was arrested here. He says he voluntarily gave himself up for trial in Portland, but will not stand trial again on the same charge, having once proved his innocence.

Denies He Handled Funds.

He says he failed in business in Portland as the result of the failure of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, against the directors of which indictments were returned by a grand jury four days ago. He avers that he had nothing to do with the handling of the funds of the store of which he was manager, and that all the money he received was a month's salary. This, he reiterates, was paid at his trial a year ago last March, when it was proved that the cashier of the mercantile company deposited all funds in the bank. The books and records of the store, he says, are still in the possession of the court.

Says He Stood Trial.

After the failure of the establishment Lowit says he came here and was arrested on a charge of embezzlement, but fought extradition before Governor Buchtel, who refused to honor the Oregon requisition. Lowit says he then, to clear his name, went voluntarily to Portland to stand trial, at his own expense. After he was acquitted he says he remained in Portland three or four days and asked if he intended to file more charges against him, as he wanted to end the matter for all time. He was told that he would not be prosecuted again, and returned to Denver.

He has prospered here and believes jealousy over his prosperity caused the new accusation. He admits owing money in Portland. He thinks the new warrant was sworn out by creditors to try to force him to make a settlement.

After the failure of the Golden Eagle Dry Goods Company, following the crash of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, Gus Lowit was accused of mismanagement in connection with the department store, and had a preliminary examination before Municipal Judge Cameron, conducted by Gus Moser, then Deputy District Attorney under John Manning. All charges against Lowit were dismissed as a result of this examination. He has never had a trial before a jury.

THREE INDICTED IN EUGENE

Judge Coke, of Marshfield, Sits on Bench With Judge Harris.

An incident of the voyage was a fight in the smoking-room when Lieutenant Granville Fortescue, U. S. A., retired, a cousin of ex-President Roosevelt, detected a sharper cheating at dice and gave him a thrashing, according to an account by passengers.

FOUR CARD PLAYERS FINED

Quartette of Portland Men Plead Guilty to Gambling Charge.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—John Kennedy, John Norton, E. L. Lafferty and M. M. Tuft, four Portland commercial men, who were arrested several weeks ago on a charge of gambling, for playing "penny-ante" on an Astoria & Columbia River Railroad train, appeared in the Circuit Court by their attorney today and pleaded guilty to the charge. They were fined \$25 each, which they paid.

FISHERMAN IS RESCUED

Steamer Larline Sends Out Boat to Man Adrift in River.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—As the steamer Larline was opposite Cathlamet last night, she saw a capsized fishing boat with a man clinging to it. A small launch was lowered and the man, who proved to be John C. Peterson, a fisherman, of Cathlamet, was rescued. His boat and net were towed ashore.

Dental Rooms Robbed.

Some time last night, between 7 o'clock and 11, burglars went through the rooms of the New York Dental Parlor, Fourth and Morrison streets, and after a thorough ransacking made off with about \$200 worth of booty. The loss consists of tools, dental paraphernalia and gold fillings. A large amount of gold had been secured for small robberies have occurred here before. 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TAFT WINNING DIXIE

President Says the North and South Are Uniting.

NOT RABID SUFFRAGIST

Says He Thinks Women Will Get to Vote Just as Soon as All of Them Want the Ballot—He Advises the Schoolgirls.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 2.—President Taft's campaign for "winning the South to closer union with the states of the North" was in full swing when he reached here at 7:30 o'clock tonight. At his various stops in Mississippi, the President had called out the cheers of the people by his declaration of friendship to the South and his repeated statement that his visit was without political significance.

"It is not that we want to make you Republicans," said the President, "for we want to become Democrats. We all have our views and our tastes in that regard. It is that you shall come to believe that you are as near to the heart of the central government, as now administered, as any other people in the Union."

Rebel Yell Heard.

The old rebel yell was heard in Columbus as the President spoke. His address seemed to catch the fancy of the crowd, and nearly every sentence of his talk was greeted with cheers.

In speaking of his desire to bring the Southern people closer to their neighbors of the North and West, President Taft declared that the cordial reception he has thus far had, convinced him that the Southern people were willing to come more than half way in the encouragement of that sentiment.

Mr. Taft also had a few words to say about marriage and woman suffrage on the campus of the Mississippi Girls' Industrial Institute and College to 800 as pretty girls as could be found in all the South.

Marriage Not Important.

"I wish every woman" in the world was so situated," he said, "that she should not think it necessary for her to marry if she did not want to."

"I venture to think the best legacy that can be left to a young man is a good education and a good character by training in a family of good moral standards and nothing else."

"The same thing is true with respect to the young woman."

"I am not a rabid suffragist. The truth is, I am not in favor of suffrage for women until I can be convinced that all the women desire it and when they desire it, I am in favor of giving it to them, and when they desire it they will get it, too."

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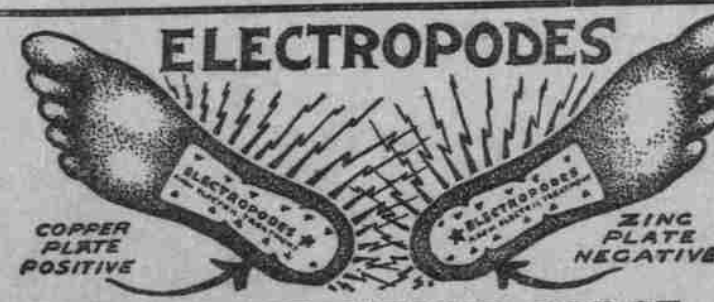
