

TAFT WELCOMED BY CHARLESTON

Heads Automobile Parade Through City—Speaks at Banquet.

SEES CANNON BLOW UP

Two Men Firing Salute Tossed in Air—Encourages Boys to Hope to Become President—Is Proud of Dickinson.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 5.—President Taft headed a procession of automobiles through the principal business streets tonight after his arrival. He was cheered by immense crowds while on his way to the home of Mayor Rhett, where he passed the night.

Mr. Taft is no stranger in Charleston. He has been here five times in the past years and said today in Savannah that he was "going home to Charleston."

The President was the guest of honor at a banquet tendered to him by the City of Charleston. It was arranged with special regard to the President's comfort and the only set speeches were the introduction of the President by Mayor Rhett and the response by Mr. Taft. The President leaves tomorrow morning at 3 o'clock for Columbia, S. C.

Sees Cannon Blow Up Men.

Mr. Taft had a busy day in Savannah. During a sail down the river to Fort Screven he witnessed an accident in which it was believed that two men had been killed. As matters turned out, one man, a negro, lost his arm and another his eye. The two men were firing a salute to the President from a small cannon drawn up at the waterfront. A premature explosion occurred as the negro was ramming home a charge of powder and in the cloud of smoke which followed the report the President saw a man flying through the air. The man fell into the river.

The ramrod which he had held shot across the bow of the revenue cutter, near the deck on which Mr. Taft was standing. The man struggling in the water was rescued, however, and when the President landed and made inquiries as to the accident, he was relieved to find there had been no loss of life.

Scorches in Automobile.

The President participated in a parade through the streets and parks of Savannah. He then went for a fast spin over the automobile course, at one time running 32 miles an hour.

The automobile ride was interrupted to permit the President to stop for a few minutes at the Bethesda Orphan Home, where he made a little speech to the boys, telling them that he had no reason why any of them should not become President of the United States. The President stopped once, too, to address a body of students from a negro school, and, returning to the city, he passed in review all the public school children of the city.

EX-LOVER SUES FOR RING

Possession of Diamond Was Decided by Jury of Six Men.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Henry Scheel and Miss Augusta Rutz were sweethearts not long ago, but yesterday at Riverview, they met in the court of Justice L. A. Womack, pitted against each other in a replevin suit brought by Scheel, wherein he sought to take from Miss Rutz the token of his former affection, a fine diamond ring valued at \$100.

The action started within a few days of the marriage of Miss Rutz to Mr. Blasie, and that fact no doubt had much to do with the contention of the plaintiff that he did not give the ring to Miss Rutz, but permitted her to keep it during his pleasure.

The question was left to a jury of six men who decided that the ring was the property of the lady.

MUTINEERS TO GET LIMIT

Officers Demand Extreme Penalty for Greek Traitors.

ATHENS, Nov. 5.—The government will not be permitted to treat Lieutenant Tibilados and the men under him in the recent mutiny as political prisoners. Tibilados and his followers were arrested yesterday and it was semi-officially stated that they were to be charged only with political crimes.

Today, however, a deputation of senior naval officers arrived at an agreement with the Military League that they should insist upon the mutineers being maintained in discipline in the navy and demand that the extreme penalty of the law be meted out to the mutineers.

SUSPENDERS SNAP IN FRAY

Man Who Battles With Officer Is Forced to Retire.

WALLACE, Idaho, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—The determined resistance which John Quincy Adams offered when Street Commissioner Lynch attempted to remove from Placer Creek a log placed in the stream by Adams to divert a portion of the water to his property resulted in a knockdown argument, followed by the Commissioner's swearing out a warrant for the arrest of Adams, charging resistance of an officer.

Lynch secured a firm hold on Adams' suspenders and yanked so hard Adams retired to his domicile to rearrange his toilet.

SHORTAGE STILL GROWING

Warriner May Have Stolen \$175,000, but Is Not Arrested.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—Although C. F. Warriner, the deposed local treasurer of the Big Four Railroad, remains under surveillance, no warrant for his arrest has been issued, nor has any authoritative statement been issued as to the amount of his shortage. The alleged shortage, it was reported today, is now placed at from \$150,000 to \$175,000.

THEY FIGHT BY NOISES

MRS. PANKHURST DEFENDS ACTION OF SUFFRAGETTES.

English Leader Says They Fight With Feminine Weapons and Are Winning.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—"Man never will be able to solve satisfactorily the great problems of civilization without the co-operation of women through the exercise of the elective franchise," declared Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, English suffragette leader, in an address here tonight.

Mrs. Pankhurst then submitted to a rapid fire of interruptions by men and women on various phases of the suffrage "cause."

"Do you think that an American woman ever will be President?" asked a woman.

"That is the most extraordinary question that I have ever had put to me," replied Mrs. Pankhurst, who paused for some time before answering. "This is a question which you American women will have to decide for yourselves."

Mrs. Pankhurst declared that American women would have to admit, whatever they thought of the campaign of their sisters in England, that they had succeeded in pressing this question to the very forefront of British politics.

"We who are responsible," she said, "are just as much in earnest about our political freedom as were your forefathers when you fought your revolution. It is a civil war that we are carrying on with feminine weapons. We cannot fight with guns, but we can by injudicious noises."

NORWEGIAN WOMEN AT POLLS

They Vote in Thousands, Aiding Defeat of Liberal Government.

CHRISTIANIA, Nov. 5.—In the general election through which the Liberal government was first time to get the right of suffrage. They voted heavily in the towns but lightly in the country districts.

Sufficient returns have been received to show that the Radical government is defeated.

1000 MEN TO BE EMPLOYED

Work on Slate Factory at Othello Will Begin Next Month.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 5.—(Special.)—George E. Canning and J. J. Driscoll, of the R. S. King Company, are in Riverview arranging for their manufacturing plant at Othello. In the western part of Adams County, on the main line of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound Railway, work will begin next month. When completed the plant will employ 1000 men.

The product will be a slate or marble material made principally of granite and cement for roofing, flooring and finishing material. The output will be six to 10 cars a day. The company is capitalized at \$5,000,000.

GERMANS CONSIDER TERMS

King Edward May Reach Understanding With Neighbors.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—The possibility of an Anglo-German understanding appears to be under consideration in high German circles. Failure to reach such an understanding heretofore is attributed to the method adopted by Great Britain.

After Charles Hardinge, under secretary of the British foreign office, failed to obtain a satisfactory reply to his suggestion, made at the meeting between King Edward and Emperor William at Kronberg, King Edward is understood to have tried to persuade the Emperor of Austria, whom he met at Ischl, to make friendly representations to Germany.

STEAMER BREAKS BLADE

French Liner Delayed by Accident to Propeller in Atlantic.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—News of the disablement of the French liner steamer La Savoye by the breaking of a propeller blade was received here today by wireless from Cape Race.

The injury in no way imperils the safety of the passengers and will only delay the arrival of the steamer here a day.

LAW CHEATS MOB

Blacks Spirited Away to Prevent Lynching.

GASSAWAY WHITES BOIL

West Virginians Stirred to Bottom at Crime by Negroes—Armed Men Gather Outside Town to Intercept Prisoners.

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This is the latest development of a case which has puzzled the Coroner and police for weeks and was brought to a climax today by the positive identification of the dead man as R. J. Madden, of Butte, Mont. Through the Butte Lodge of Elks Coroner Shaver received a photograph of Madden today which bore a strong resemblance to the dead man, but to clinch the matter the number of Madden's watch, obtained through a Butte jeweler, was found to correspond with that of the timepiece found on the suicide.

According to the Coroner, Martin's attempt to identify the suicide as his father, who, he said, was Robert James Martin, was legitimate until last Saturday afternoon. At that time, according to the Coroner, young Martin went to Point Defiance with two friends and, while looking over the ground at the scene of the suicide, one of his companions picked up a post card bearing Martin's picture. The card bore the words "R. J. Martin, from Theodore." Coroner Shaver said today that he felt certain the card had been placed at the scene of the suicide in order to strengthen Martin's case.

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SUTTON, W. Va., Nov. 5.—The special train bearing the two negroes and their guards arrived here today without incident. The prisoners were locked up in the County Jail.

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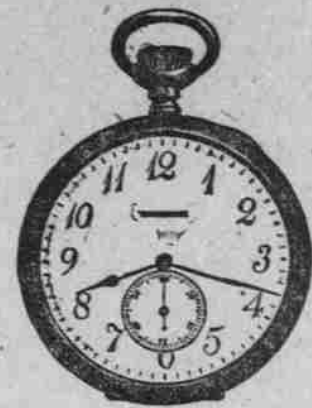
