Mexican Socialist Goes Free
in California, Followers
Rejoice.

ANARCHIST IDEAS DENIED

Cuban Doesn't Fare So Well—Native
of Southern Republic Says
He's Better Off Outside of
United States, Anyway.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—There was joy in the Socialist camp tonight when it became known that Secretary Nagel, at Washington, had ordered the release of L. Guterres de Lara, the Mexican who was arrested here shortly before President Taft's arrival because of incendiary speeches at the Plaza. De Lara was told by a reporter this evening of the order from Washington.

"Are you sure?" he asked again and again. "It seems as if some of us must be notified if it is really true. Of course I am glad, but I can hardly believe it. I am not an anarchist and had no fear of the ultimate outcome of my cause, but I did not expect it so soon. Why, I am to speak at a half dozen meetings this week—meetings of protest against my deportation. And now it is already settled that I am not to be deported. Well, that is good news."

De Lara has been out on bail for some time, but Miguel Lozano, the Cuban whom Secretary Nagel ordered deported, seems to have no friends in the Socialist crowd.

"Well, I'm glad of it," he said, when told at the jail tonight that he was to be sent back to Cuba. "I am not a dangerous citizen, but I am better in Cuba than in the United States. I don't want to stay here anyway."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Miguel Lozano, a Cuban, was ordered deported by Secretary Nagel of the Department of Commerce and Labor, today on the grounds of being an alien anarchist. Lozano confessed he was an anarchist and believed in the destruction of government.

LAND SLIDES WITH MAN

Contractor Carlson Is Carried 800
Feet, Skull Fractured.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—John J. McCann, who has returned from a trip to the lower Necanicum, reports that Ernest Carlson, a subcontractor on the construction of the Necanicum Mountain, met with a terrible accident a few days ago. While at work, he was caught by a landslide and carried down the bluff, a distance of about 800 feet. Before assistance could reach him, a boulder fell and striking him on the head, fractured his skull.

The man was carried to the P. & N. Railroad camp, and after being given stimulants was taken on horseback to the Sweeney construction camp, where a physician was secured to attend him. It is believed Carlson will recover. He is particularly unfortunate, as last week a pile of lumber fell on him in a Portland lumber yard, fracturing his skull.

JURY EXONERATES TEAM

Players Not Responsible for Death
of Man on Gridiron.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—A Coroner's jury today exonerated players of both teams of responsibility for the death of Archer Christian, who succumbed to injuries received Saturday in the football match between the University of Virginia and Georgetown University here. The verdict, however, indirectly censured the local police for their actions in rebuffing relatives and friends of the young man when he was being removed from the field.

Testimony showed that there were no visible evidences of questionable tactics in the play that cost Christian his life.

TUNNEL CONTRACT IS LET

Irrigation Company Will Bore Green
Mountain.

FORT COLLINS, Colo., Nov. 15.—Wellington Hibbard, of the Laramie-Poudre Irrigation Company, announced today that contracts had been let for boring a 12,000-foot tunnel through Green Mountain by which waters of the Laramie River will be brought into Cache Lapoudre Basin, watering 15,000 acres.

The tunnel will cost \$250,000. Work will be begun within two weeks.

WAR AEROPLANE INVENTED

German Engineer Will Use French
Motor on Airship.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—A new aeroplane adapted for military purposes and built by Engineer Hoffman under the direction of the army administration has been announced. A French motor will be used provisionally.

INDICTS NIGHT RIDERS

Tennessee Grand Jury Renews
Charges Against Two Men.

UNION CITY, Tenn., Nov. 15.—The grand jury returned individual indictments late today against Garrett Johnson and Arthur Clear, alleged night riders, charging them with the murder of Captain Quentin Rankin on October 15, 1908.

MANNING REACHES ASTORIA

Revenue Cutter Will Make Oregon
Town Headquarters.

ASTORIA, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The revenue cutter Manning, which arrived from Port Angeles yesterday, is one of the best and most modern vessels of her class on the Pacific Coast, and carries a

crew of 65 men. She is under the command of Captain William V. E. Jacobs and her other officers are as follows: Executive officer, First Lieutenant W. A. O'Malley; navigating officer, Second Lieutenant M. J. Ryan; watch officer, Third Lieutenant William Williams. First Lieutenant of Engineers, C. G. Forcher is in charge of the engine-room and the watch officers of that department are Third Lieutenant of Engineers H. U. Robinson and T. B. Fitch. The warrant officers of the vessel are: Boatwain, Michael McGraw; gunner, William J. Kendrick; machinist, A. Heckelberg. Captain Jacobs has been on the Manning during the past three years. He took her to Alaska for her regular cruise last Spring, but on arriving there was detached for shore duty at Unalakleet during the summer and First Lieutenant O'Malley was in command while cruising in Alaskan waters.

Captain Jacobs stated today that the headquarters of his vessel for the coming winter will be at Astoria, but his jurisdiction extends from Cape Flattery to Cape Blanco, and this will necessitate occasional cruises. The work of the cutter will be to safeguard shipping in

interests so far as possible, assist in the enforcement of the customs regulations, and render aid to vessels in distress.

LOVER OF 77 IS SANE

W. A. PAUL OF SOUND MIND, AS
HE GAVE AWAY LANDS.

Because He Was Duped by Young
"Widow," Supreme Court Finds
He Was Mentally Responsible.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Just because W. A. Paul, when 77 years old, married a young "widow," whose husband it later developed was still living, sold his Linn County farm to one of his sons, W. S. Paul, the Supreme Court decided today there was no evidence that the old man was mentally incompetent when he made the land sale. G. M. Paul, another son, had brought suit against his brother, W. S. Paul, to have the land sale declared invalid. The plaintiff won when the case was heard before Judge Galloway, but in a decision by Justice McBride the case was reversed today.

The decision reverses the case and declares that Mrs. Bures was the "widow" whom Paul, senior, married in 1902; that he decided part of his farm to the woman, and that the children tried to defeat the will of the "step-mother" and secure the land for themselves. After selling the remainder of his farm to his son, Paul borrowed from a Salem bank \$500, which he paid to the "widow" in order to have the matter hushed up.

Chief Justice Moore announced from the Supreme Bench this afternoon that owing to the meeting of the Oregon Bar Association tomorrow, the court will suspend business until Thursday. Tuesday is the regular day for handling down opinions, but owing to the Bar Association meeting, the opinions of the week were announced this afternoon.

Other cases decided: *Timmon Ford* as executor of the last will and testament of Copperopolis Copper Co., deceased, plaintiff, vs. A. T. Gilbert, Mary E. Gilbert, his wife, F. N. Gilbert and C. A. Gilbert, his wife, defendants. Petition for rehearing denied.

In an opinion by Chief Justice Moore the case of the State of Oregon vs. Al Emmons, appealed from Wallawa County, is reversed.

In the case of the State of Oregon vs. Ira Brinkley, charged with stealing a calf, Justice Eakin, for the court, wrote an opinion affirming the trial court. The case was appealed from Baker County. William Smith, Judge.

J. A. Hawks vs. A. W. Slusher, appealed from Unalakleet County, is affirmed in an opinion by Justice Slater.

N. C. Longfellow vs. John W. Huffman et al., appealed from Wallawa County, reversed in an opinion by Chief Justice Moore.

State of Oregon Plaintiff and respondent vs. P. A. McDonald and others, including the State Land Board, appeal from Union County, reversed in an opinion by Justice Slater.

POOL CAUSES DOWNFALL

Penitent Youth Blames Game for 5-
Year Prison Term.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 15.—Five years in San Quentin was the sentence imposed today by Judge Davis upon Robert Perry, the penitent youth of Christian pretensions who lately confessed to the police to stealing 11 horses, a motor cycle and other property. Perry said the poolrooms caused his downfall.

BOY FINISHES LONG TRAMP

Toledo Youth Walks 12,820 Miles
Around Country's Borders.

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 15.—Karl Cronley, a Toledo youth, who started October 25, 1907, to walk around the border of the United States, arrived home today.

He says he walked 12,820 miles and shows the signatures of more than 1200 postmasters.

REBUKE IS GIVEN TO MRS. STETSON

Majority of Her Church Is
Loyal to Mrs. Eddy and
Takes Her Advice.

STRICKLER CHARGES FAIL

Meeting Called to Depose First Reader
Adjourns Without Taking
Action After Letter From
Head of Church Is Read.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Mary Baker G. Eddy's influence swayed 2000 of her followers at a special mass meeting at the First Church of Christ, Scientist, here today and the trustees, called to consider charges against Virgil O. Strickler, present first reader and opponent of Mrs. August E. Stetson, depose from that position, adjourned without taking action.

This is tantamount to an endorsement of Strickler and a negative rebuke to Mrs. Stetson, who was cloistered for six hours with the trustees of the Mother Church in Boston today on charges of "mental malpractice."

Whatever may be the outcome of the Boston hearing, leaders here say the Strickler incident is closed. Mr. Strickler presided and a clash between the Stetson and anti-Stetson factions was expected until a letter from Mrs. Eddy to the board of trustees was read. It said:

"Brookline, Mass., Nov. 13.—In consideration of the present momentous question at issue in the First Church of Christ, Scientist, New York City, I am constrained to say if I can settle this church difficulty amicably by a few words, as many students think I can, I herewith cheerfully subscribe these words of love. I advise you with all my soul to support the directors of the Mother Church and unite with those in your church who are supporting the Mother Church directors."

Mrs. Eddy's own signature was affixed to the letter.

After it had been read, Edwin F. Hatfield, chairman of the board of trustees said, "Mrs. Eddy's word is law with us," and the meeting adjourned.

MRS. STETSON HAS LONG SIEGE

Puts in Ten-Hour Session With Di-
rectors of Mother Church.

BOSTON, Nov. 15.—Apparently fatigued, Mrs. August E. Stetson, of New York, left the directors' room of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, and went to her hotel shortly before midnight tonight, following a ten-hour session of the directors of the Mother Church this afternoon and tonight.

While it is believed her attendance at the hearing had to do with an investigation into charges of "mental malpractice," of which Mrs. Stetson was accused and for which she has been suspended as a healer, directors of the Mother Church would make no statement. Mrs. Stetson refused to talk.

COMMISSIONS IN REVOLT

POWERS OF INTERSTATE COM-
MERCE CONTESTED.

Railroad Commissioners Object to
Federal Car Service, on Grounds
of Alleged Despotism.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Revolt against extension of the powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission threatens to break out in the convention of the National Association of Railroad Commissioners, which began its sessions here today. Opinion is divided and a reflection of the impending clash was shown in the meeting tonight of the committee on car service and demurrage.

The meeting is said to have been stormy, many members expressing the feeling that the Federal car service law would give the Interstate Commerce Commission almost despotic power.

Another fight is to be made against the proposition that the commission be given power to take up investigation of purely local railroad matters.

Delegates from every state having railroad commissions are here. The feeling among many is that further power to the Interstate Commerce Commission will render state commissions practically useless.

REFORM BEGINS IN INDIA

NATIVES ADMITTED TO SHARE
IN GOVERNMENT.

Embryo Constitution, Outlined by
Lord Morley, Marks Epoch in
British Rule of Colony.

SIMLA, British India, Nov. 15.—The plan for the reform of the British administration of India, which was outlined by Lord Morley, Secretary of State for India, in the House of Lords last December, designed to give India an embryo constitution admitting the natives to an important share in the legislation of the country, went into effect today.

Thus begins a new and striking epoch in the history of British rule in India. Under the programme, all religious and special interests may elect representatives to the viceroys and provincial councils, but, in view of recent anarchistic outbreaks, a safeguard is provided in a qualification which empowers the Imperial and provincial governments to declare ineligible those persons whose election is considered contrary to public interests.

The viceroy's council will have 270 members, instead of 128 as formerly, of whom 155 will be elected, as against 39 elected heretofore. The functions of the council will be considerably enlarged, and it will be enabled to take an active part in the making of the budget and all legislation.

Marysville Badly Scorched.

MARYSVILLE, Cal., Nov. 15.—Fire in the heart of the retail district of this city last night caused losses amounting to \$100,000. Much of the store and the confectionery establishment of H. D. King were gutted.



WEDDING IS CHEAP

Edward J. Bowes Married to
Actress for \$5.

JUSTICE PLODS IN SNOW

After Becoming Miss Illington's New
Husband Groom Asks Fee and
Hands Out Small Gold
Piece as Largess to Squire.

RENO, Nev., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—

After Judge Pike, who granted a decree of divorce to Margaret Illington, refused to marry her to Bowes, she applied to Justice of the Peace Soucroun, of Verdi, a small town 12 miles from Reno. The judge agreed and trudged through a blinding snow storm more than a mile in the outskirts of the city, and found the couple with Mr. and Mrs. I. H. Lige in the parlor of the actress, and Miss Ehling, her maid. The ceremony was performed. In speaking of the event, Judge Soucroun said:

"At its conclusion, Mr. Bowes asked me what the usual fee was for the Justice of the Peace to perform such a service, and I replied \$5. He put his hand in his pocket and took therefrom a \$5 gold piece and handed it to me, saying 'thank you.' I then departed from the house and trudged back through the snow storm down town. I am making no comment upon it; it speaks for itself."

Bowes' action was a surprise. Some one remarked here today, "If that's the way he hangs on to his money as an evidence of his generosity, there may be another divorce for Margaret Illington some day."

The actress purchased her wedding trousseau from Mrs. J. W. Smith, wife of a United States Army officer stationed in the Philippines, and who recently, in bringing in a large quantity of gorgeous Japanese silk goods to this country without paying the duty, became involved seriously with the United States customs officials at San Francisco, previous to her coming to Reno last month. The \$1000 horse of the actress, brought here from New York, was shipped in a special car attached to the regular passenger train on which she left the city.

TACOMA SOCIETY IS ALL AGOG

Ready to Receive Bowes' Bride With
Great Enthusiasm.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—A score of workmen and servants were engaged at the recently acquired mansion of Edward Bowes today putting on the finishing touches preparatory to the coming of Mr. Bowes and his bride, formerly Miss Illington, who are expected to arrive here early in the morning. They will go directly to their

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home at Ninth and Yakima streets, which has been finished in regal style. The house has been in the hands of renovators and decorators for the past six weeks. The stables and garage have been enlarged and the interior of the home has been changed considerably.

Society and business friends are planning to give the bride and groom a reception in the near future, but their arrival in town will be marked by quietness, pursuant to Mr. Bowes' wishes. The exclusive set is looking forward expectantly while many of the younger set, who have gone in for amateur theatricals, will warmly welcome the actress-bride into their circle. There is little doubt that Mrs. Bowes will reign in Tacoma society with the same brilliancy and success she achieved on the stage, which she has given up for the home life.

Judging from her own statement, applause, adulation and fame have lost their glamor. She has reached the conclusion that after all the only leading part that counts for anything is the role of wife and mother.

BOWES AND BRIDE DISAPPEAR

Tacoma Promoter and Actress Wife
Give Friends the Slip.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Bowes, of Tacoma, lately wed at Reno, Nev., failed to reach Portland last night on the Shasta, bound for the Southern Pacific Road. An Associated Press dispatch from San Francisco stated that the former wife of Daniel Frohman and her husband had started for their Tacoma home and would arrive at 9:30 o'clock, but they probably have changed their plans in favor of a honeymoon trip.

Careful search of the train and inquiry among passengers failed to gain any information concerning them. At the Portland Hotel a luxurious suite of rooms had been reserved in anticipation of the arrival of the millionaire Tacoma promoter, but they were not required, and it is now believed that the couple will not arrive until tonight.

Margaret Illington Frohman was granted a divorce on Wednesday last, after having been a resident of the Nevada divorce colony for more than six months. Her new husband is a prominent real estate dealer of Tacoma.

Pistol-Wielding Alleged.

A large number of these divorce cases will be heard this term, but as almost all of them are not contested, they will be disposed of quickly.
