

## OREGON GETS ONE MORE CHICAGOAN

Billy Sullivan, of White Sox  
Fame, to Quit Baseball for  
Apple Culture.

WILL PLAY ONE SEASON

Noted ex-Leader of Chicago Americans  
Converted by Fledler Jones,  
Thinks No Place Looks So  
Good as This State.

It's about one more year in baseball for Billy Sullivan, the crack catcher and ex-manager of the Chicago American League club, for the ex-leader of the White Sox is now vice-president of the White Sox Fruit Land Company, of Oregon, and in another year his attention will be entirely required in this state. At least that is the way Billy looks at the situation at present, and this morning he leaves to spend the rest of the winter in the East.

When he returns to Portland next fall it will be William J. Sullivan, horticulturist, and baseball will be a thing of the past. He has been converted by his old friend, Fledler Jones.

Incidentally, Mrs. Billy Sullivan and her mother, who have been staying here with the ex-manager, are also delighted with Oregon and will not object to moving the Sullivan household, bag and baggage, to Portland at the end of the next baseball period.

The Sullivans want to spend a last Thanksgiving day at their old home, and they are willing to tell their Eastern relatives of their successes in Oregon. While "Sully" will not admit it, it is believed he would return to Portland immediately if it were not for his desire to treat Charles Comiskey fairly, and he thinks that by playing one more season for Comiskey he will have done the right thing.

To quit the "Old Roman" now would make it appear as though Sullivan were sore at being dropped as manager. He vigorously denies that he cherishes any ill feeling because Hugh Duffy succeeded him, for he says he did not want the job in the first place and was delighted when Comiskey shifted the burden of management to other shoulders next season.

During the past few weeks, Sullivan has been deluged with letters from Eastern fans who learned of his investment in Oregon fruit lands from the Chicago papers, and each one wanted Sullivan to tell him just what the advantages are. "Wait till I get back there," says Sullivan, "and I'll tell some of those people a few things that ought to wake them up."

Sullivan's holdings in Oregon are widely scattered, but he is more especially interested in fruit lands in the Chehalis Valley and in the vicinity of Newberg, Or.

"I will demand a finish fight with Nelson," he added. "I didn't expect any soft snap in Piet, the Frenchman, and trained hard to beat him. I was feeling him out in the first round. His face is the weak spot and I found that open in the second. That's about all here is to it."

California Association Admitted to

## CANADIANS ARE COMING

WILL MEET MULTNOMAH CLUB  
FOR FIRST TIME.

Fast Matches Expected in Intercity  
Tournament at Club Gymnasium  
Friday Night.

Multnomah is preparing to entertain a big crowd in the club's gymnasium Friday night, when the boxers and wrestlers of the Vancouver, B. C. Athletic Association appear in Portland for the first time.

The British Columbia Association was only recently admitted to the intercity tournament series, previously confined to Multnomah, Seattle and Spokane.

Vancouver has frequently engaged in boxing tournaments with the Seattle Athletic Club, but this is the first time the Canucks have appeared against the Multnomah Club in Portland. Vancouver is said to be especially desirous of winning the 125-pound boxing event, for the Canucks say they have a man who can beat Omar Dranga, the present Northwestern and Pacific Coast champion. Another match of more than passing interest is the return bout scheduled between Young McCarl and Richie Hewitt.

Freddie Couture represented the Reliance Club, of Oakland, at the Pacific Coast championships held here about a year ago, and Gene Sullivan is a pupil of Tommy Tracy. All of the boys appeared in line condition, yet they will lose no time in securing training quarters and get themselves in the best of shape for the exhibition.

## GOTCH AGAIN BEATS ROLLER

Iowan Wins Hard Match, Getting  
Two Straight Falls.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 15.—After an hour and 14 minutes' hard wrestling, in which both men appeared to be doing their utmost, Frank Gotch, of Humboldt, Ia., tonight remains the champion wrestler of the world, having defeated Dr. B. F. Roller, of Seattle, in straight falls.

The first was gained in 46 minutes and 20 seconds, the champion using a half Nelson hold. The second he won with the punishing toe hold, 27 minutes and 30 seconds. In the second fall, after 15 minutes of fast work, Roller got Gotch in a trying position, and for a time it appeared almost certain that the Iowan's shoulders would touch the mat.

made a proposition to Frank M. Ish, of the San Francisco club, that was turned down. McCredie wanted Ish to accept the presidency without salary and to name Will G. Mac Rae, of Portland, an executive officer of the league with power to appoint the umpires and attend to the duties of the presidency. This was turned down without a hearing.

## New Man Is Well Fitted.

Then came the compromise that resulted in the election of Judge Graham. The new president is a man well fitted for the position. The decisions that he may be called upon to render will be above reproach and his knowledge of the game is beyond question. For years Judge Graham has never missed a game except when his duties on the bench have kept him away. He is thoroughly familiar with baseball law as well as with the technique of the game and can be depended upon to give every club, every owner and every player a fair and square deal.

The election of the other officers, including a secretary, the vice-presidents and directors, was postponed temporarily in order to talk over business matters with L. A. Wolff, the representative of Spalding & Co., but it is understood that D. W. Long will be re-elected to the secretaryship and that the same directors will be named. There are indications that there will be a bitter fight over the proposition to allow the Northwestern League to maintain a team in Portland, the same as last year. Several of the directors, and it is whispered, a majority of them, are opposed to granting such permission and they may turn down the request made by Judge McCredie.

It was unanimously agreed to hold the same circuit for 1910. It, therefore, will be made up of San Francisco, Portland, Los Angeles, Oakland, Vernon and Sacramento. As was the case last year, games will be played in Oakland and Vernon on Tuesday afternoons and Sunday mornings, and the balance of the week in San Francisco and Los Angeles, respectively. The pennant was formally awarded to the San Francisco club.

## Northwestern Offer Refused.

Through Judge McCredie an offer was received from the Northwestern League to give \$10,000 for the Portland territory. The directors were inclined to treat the offer as a joke, but finally passed a resolution to the effect that the Portland territory was not for sale at any price.

Those present at the meeting were: Secretary, Judge W. W. McCredie, of Portland; Frank M. Ish, of San Francisco; E. M. Walter, of Oakland; Charles Graham, of Sacramento; Henry Berry and Thomas J. Stephens, of Los Angeles; Wallace Hogan, of Vernon. A schedule committee was appointed consisting of Judge W. W. McCredie, Ed M. Walter and T. J. Stephens, who will act for Henry Berry, of the Los Angeles Club.

Portland Opens at San Francisco. It was decided that for the coming season Oakland will open at Sacramento, Vernon at Los Angeles and Portland at San Francisco.

While not entirely decided upon, it is probable the season will start on a Wednesday instead of Tuesday, which means chiefly that Oakland and Vernon will lose the opening dates.

## NORTH STANDS FOR RAW DEAL

Portland Expects and Gets Worst of  
Argument in Baseball.

Rebutted at practically every point by the Ewing-Long-Berry clique at the annual meeting of the Pacific Coast League yesterday, Judge W. W. McCredie, representing the Portland baseball club, might seem just as well have remained at home. Portland cannot expect to get a square deal from the Californians as long as they insist on giving a town like Vernon equal privileges with a city of Portland's size and growth, and just as long as Portland stands for it, just so long will the same conditions prevail.

The election of Judge Thomas A. Graham to the presidency of the league is of little benefit to Portland, for Judge Graham, so he is honest as the day is long, and every one believes that he is, cannot help Portland in the least as long as the Californians are in the saddle. Long, manager of the San Francisco club, retaining the secretaryship, for on Long's shoulders will fall the selecting and ordering about of the umpires.

The secretaryship of a league of the class and pretensions of the Pacific Coast organization should be in the hands of an absolutely impartial outsider, and a man whose ability should be taken into consideration above all things. Danny Long is not the man for the place. His position as manager of the San Francisco club disqualifies him even if there be no other reason.

However, the best Portland can expect from the hogfish Californians with their continuous baseball ideas, is also good. The line-up follows:

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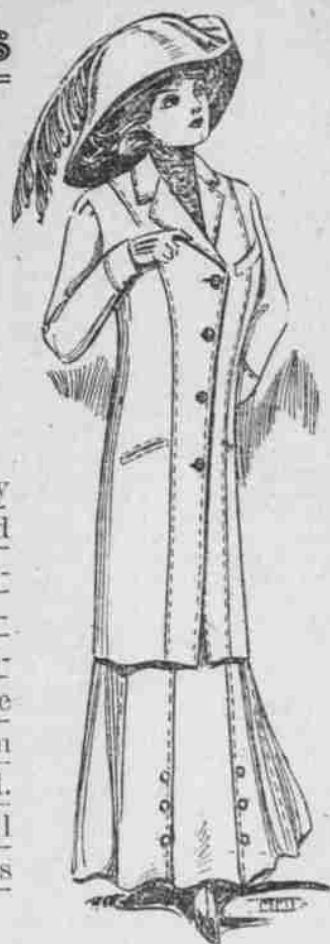

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## 'Sissy' Parsons Are Hit

BISHOP BELL FOR POLITICS IN ALL PULPITS.

Following Prelate's Address Before Association, Clergymen Decide to Organize for Action.

That clergymen ought to federate on public questions, take part in politics for the moral good of the country, and not be mere "sissies," going about with white neckties, preaching little sermons and having no influence, was the declaration of Bishop William Bell, D. D., of Los Angeles, Cal., in his address yesterday morning before the Evangelical-United Brethren Ministerial Association.

One result of the prelate's talk along this line will be a movement to form a State Ministerial Association to deal with state questions. A four days' convention of Oregon ministers will be called in Portland to discuss federation and other questions brought out by Bishop Bell. Bishop Bell was introduced by Rev. H. C. Shaffer, president of the association. The bishop asked each pastor to state what he had undertaken in his sermons to do in all great moral and educational questions and to do this they should co-operate with the great newspapers of the country. The press and the pulpit ought to stand together, said he, on all great public questions.

## Press Is a Power.

"No one can estimate the power of the daily papers of this country," declared Bishop Bell, "either for right or for wrong. A great paper can make a bad cause popular and make it succeed. But publicity is a mighty power, and it ought to be used for the promotion of the educational and moral forces of this country. It is one of the great problems to unite the press and the pulpit that they may work together."

"Ministers and churches ought to stand together. They ought to federate on public questions. Politicians count on

the dissipation of church forces. They know that the churches do not stand together. In California, a great convention has been called for next Wednesday week to consider the question of a state federation. Every state ought to take such action. Here in Oregon you should call a four days' convention as soon as it can be done to consider public questions. I should be glad to address such a gathering. The religious forces of the country ought to take a stand on all public questions. The ministry ought to be something more than mere white necktie "sissies" whose opinions have no weight and who have no influence."

Federation Is Favored.

After Bishop Bell's address the association voted in favor of a state federation of ministers to discuss public questions and politics. At the next meeting of the association in December action will be taken toward holding such a convention in

Portland. Rev. C. C. Poling, superintendent of Portland district, strongly favored the federation plan.

Bishop Bell delivered an address last night in the First United Brethren Church. Tonight he will speak in the Second Church, Vernon, and Wednesday night he will be heard in the Third Church, at South Mount Taber.

Eugene Joins With Cottage Grove.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—A

delegation of Cottage Grove business men from the Merchants' Protective Association met with the Eugene association here this evening. Experiences and methods of the two associations and plans for closer co-operation were discussed. The visitors returned to Cottage Grove tonight.

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
