WIFE FORK TARGET

Portland Divorce Seeker Accuses "Hubby."

GRABBED HER BY THROAT

Mrs. Julia Fernan Alleges She Was Shamefully Treated by Spouse. Judge Bronaugh Grants Half-Dozen Separations. Mrs. Julia A. Fernan has filed a divorce suit against Daniel L. Fernan, a drayman, employed by the Oregon Transfer Company. She married him at Ketchikan, Alaska, January 14, 1907, but before a year had passed her troubles began. They moved to Seattle, and there her husband cursed and kicked her on the street one day, she alleged, compelling her to call the police. Then Fernan left her. But in a few days she received word from him that he had come to Portland. She followed him, and they went to live at 224 Fifth street. Her husband threw a heavy shoe at her July 19, she says, after having grabbed her by the throat with a threat to choke her to death. On Christ-

mas day, 1908, Mrs. Fernan says she was made the target for a fork, which imbedded itself in the dining-room door. Couple Move Often. Last April the couple had moved again, and were living at 107 North Seventeenth street. The woman says her husband wished her dead three weeks before the birth of their youngest child. On July 4 last she stepped out of the house to see the fireworks, and was given a hair-pulling by her husband in the presence of neighbors, she says. Last month her life was threatened, and last Monday, when she asked her husband to cut some wood, he threatened to throw a platter of meat at her. She alleges she tried to telephone for the police, and that her drayman-husband jerked the telephone from the wall. She wants \$250 a month alimony and \$50 attorney's fees. Eva Meyers brought a divorce suit yesterday against Charles E. Meyers, alleging non-support and desertion. They were married at Salem, July 15, 1903. Circuit Judge Bronaugh granted six divorces yesterday morning, and denied one, because of insufficient corroborating evidence. The one denied is that of L. H. Curtis against Elizabeth Curtis. They were married at Aethin, Wash., June 2, 1906. The husband accused his wife of desertion. Among the decrees granted was one to Mrs. Ella C. Garrison, wife of Lloyd A. Garrison, a tinner. Mrs. Garrison complained her husband refused to pay her doctor's bills while she was sick. Woman Gets \$50 Monthly. Mrs. Garrison was allowed \$50 a month alimony yesterday, and \$50 attorney's fees, as she testified that her husband earns \$4 and \$4.50 a day. The child will be in the present in the custody of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph T. Bissonette, of Laurelwood, its uncle and aunt. The Garrisons were married at Camden, N. J., November 23, 1904. Elizabeth Hutchinson was another who

drew a blank in the lottery of love. She was confined to her bed for ten weeks at the hospital, she said, having undergone an operation, but Robert A. Hutchinson, her husband, visited her only a few times, and then when drunk. Neither did he provide for her needs, she said. They were married November 2, 1908. Judge Bronaugh granted the divorce. Frances M. Twist secured a divorce from William Twist, whom she married at Phoenix, B. C., November 12, 1899. He failed to contribute more than \$20 for her support between August, 1907, and April, 1908, she said. Her maiden name, Shubert, was restored. Threatened with death by being riddled with bullets, Minnie F. Woehle was in the Circuit Court yesterday to tell her troubles, and succeeded in securing a divorce from G. C. Woehle. They were married at Jeffersonville, Ind., April 29, 1888. Mrs. Woehle said her husband once sat by her bedside all night with a shotgun in his hand, threatening to shoot her if she made an outcry. Desertion was the ground for the following decrees: Sadie A. Hutton from George C. Hutton, married June 3, 1903; Georgia Allen from Fred Allen, married at Grays River, Wash., November 9, 1904. Circuit Judge Gantenbein refused yesterday morning to grant a divorce to Mary Falkenberg to or Joseph B. Falkenberg, saying neither had ground for it.
