ENGINE-HOUSE PLANS ACCEPTED.—Plans for the Mount Tabor engine-house, to be erected at the Base Line road and Church street, prepared by Architect D. B. Fickinger, have been approved by the fire committee and the building inspector. Chief Campbell, who has examined the plans, says they are an improvement over the other firehouses in the city in many respects. Ventilation, light, economy of space and comfort for the firemen are the main features of these plans. Architect Fickinger estimates the cost of this building, which will be of frame construction, with concrete foundation and basement, at \$18,000. It is expected that the firehouse will be erected according to these plans, and Mount Tabor will get fire protection much sooner than expected.

LENTS TELEPHONE PROFITABLE.—The Lents telephone plant is proving profitable. Organized last spring, with \$3000 capital stock which was immediately sold, the capital stock was doubled last June, nearly all stock being disposed of, and started with 60 telephones, which were soon increased to 115, and there are constant calls for more. The company has eight miles of telephone lines around Lents, extending eastward to Sycamore. The expense of operating the plant so far has been \$10 a month, while the income has been about \$200. J. B. Marshall, W. L. Hetchkiss, Peter Roth, Donald Perry, A. Barick and E. S. Rayburn are the directors.

REMEDY FOR BRIDGE DELAYS.—Dr. C. H. Raftery, who recently returned from a trip in Europe, looked into the subject of bridges while there, and now offers a remedy for the delays experienced in Portland by the opening of bridge draws. He noticed in Paris that there are many bridges across the river Seine, and yet he says there are no draw bridges and no obstructions to navigation. All the bridges, he says, have their smokestacks on hinges so they may be lowered as the boat approaches a bridge. The boats do not even slack up at the approach of a bridge. Dr. Raftery said that steamers plying the Willamette River could be fitted similarly.

BICYCLIST THROWN ON CAR FENDER.—A man, who did not give his name, riding north on Sixth street on a bicycle, at 1:30 P. M. yesterday, became tangled with a streetcar going east on Washington street, and narrowly escaped being run over under the wheels. The bicyclist was riding rapidly down Sixth street and the car also approached the crossing with considerable speed. The rider started to cross the track ahead of the car, but seeing he could not make it attempted to turn and avoid a collision. The front wheel of the bicycle slipped and bicyclist and rider were thrown onto the fender of the car and carried ten feet, when they were tossed directly on the other track.

ELLIS READY FOR CAPITAL.—Accompanied by his brother, J. T. Ellis, of Guthrie County, Iowa, Representative Ellis returned to Portland yesterday from Astoria, where he conferred with the representatives of the commercial organizations of that city as to the need for Federal aid in further improvements at the mouth of the river. Mr. Ellis will return to his home at Pendleton either tonight or tomorrow night. He expects to start for Washington the first of next week. Mr. Ellis is registered at the Imperial, where he was interviewed by a number of local politicians yesterday.

STRIKING STORY OF CAUSE AND EFFECT

Remarkable Prosperity of Portland and Oregon Revealed in News Columns of The Oregonian for a Single Day—All Previous Records Are Broken.

The local news columns of The Oregonian yesterday reflected in a striking degree the remarkable prosperity which is marking the closing days of 1909. With six weeks of the year remaining, building permits issued have reached a total of nearly \$11,500,000, which is more than \$1,000,000 in excess of the total for the entire twelve months of 1908.

Real estate transfers show a corresponding gain, and the deposits of the National banks alone in this city are \$6,000,000 greater than they were twelve months ago.

Bank clearings for the week were nearly \$2,500,000 in excess of those for any corresponding week in the history of the city.

Real estate sales and building plans consummated, but not yet appearing on record, for the six days involved a valuation of more than \$1,000,000.

More than 7000 head of livestock and 500 carloads of grain, flour and hay were received during the week, and eighteen steamers and steamships cleared from Portland, carrying 6,000,000 feet of lumber and more than 500,000 bushels of grain in addition to several thousand tons of miscellaneous Oregon staples.

All of this prosperity shown in these commercial figures is an "effect." This word has been defined as "the unfailing index of the amount of the cause." It requires no tedious course of reasoning to determine where lies the cause that has produced this pleasing local scene. That is also explained in the news columns of The Oregonian from day to day. For example, there was noted in The Oregonian yesterday the sale of the Snowy Butte orchards, in Southern Oregon, for a consideration of \$165,000. This means that the productive, wealth-creating powers of a single orchard in one of the many great fruit districts tributary to Portland are so great that they will pay handsome returns on what seems an enormous investment.

Snowy Butte is said to have turned out nearly \$50,000 worth of fruit in a single year, and this money, as well as the money received for the output of hundreds of other fruit farms, finds a way into circulation and for investment in Portland and Portland territory.

There was much other industrial news showing the cause for Portland's prosperity. Pendleton announces the building of three miles of street railroad, Astoria reports funds available for work and about to commence on an electric railroad to Seaside. A similar report comes regarding a line up the Calapoopa River. Roseburg will pave one and one-half miles of streets next year. These are some of the items from yesterday's news which aid in causing prosperity in Portland.

These are of course, others, notably the employment of larger forces of railroad men engaged in more actual construction work than ever before in evidence in the State of Oregon.

Throughout all of that vast empire of more than 200,000 square miles tributary to Portland there is unprecedented activity in every hamlet, village and city. Dollar wheat, 22-cent hops, 10-cent pork and everything else that the soil produces selling at corresponding figures, are the underlying causes for that prosperity, but it is assisted by the invasion of the Pacific Northwest by thousands of new citizens, who are spending in the aggregate large sums of money for new homes and farms which year after year hence will still further increase the prosperity of the country.

Portland's real estate prices, building permits, bank clearings and all other features of our commercial life are dependent on the rich country for which this city is the entrepot and commercial clearing-house. In the figures on our own local business we can plainly see a reflection of the conditions which caused them.

FEDERAL CIVIL WAR VETERAN.—The funeral services of W. R.
