DRAINAGE OF APPLE ORCHARDS .- "The DRAINAGE OF APPLE ORCHARDS.-"The question of drainage is a serious one, con-fronting a large number of the growers at the present time," said Messrs, C. I. Lewis, S. L. Bennett and C. C. Vincent, Isading horticulturists of the Oregon Ex-periment Station at Corvallis. "The soils producing the largest yields are those having good drainage. Young trees will die or show a stunted, unhealthy growth if the soil is not properly drained. Drain-age removes the surplus water, that if allowed to remain, would be very injurious to the trees; it makes the soil cold and to the trees; it makes the soil cold and excludes the air, which contains oxygen, an element, which helps to make plantfood available. Drainage also removes food available. Drainage also lenoves the injurious saits which, if allowed to accumulate, often make land unproduc-tive." 


