STREET IMPROVEMENT HURRIED—The Barber Asphalt Company, which has the contract for improving Grand avenue, had men at work yesterday laying the concrete foundation east of Grand avenue. VIEWERS ARE APPOINTED—On the widening of Sandy Drive, formerly Sandy road, between East Twenty-eighth street and city limits, T. J. Menefee, A. W. Taylor and H. J. Morrison have been appointed viewers to assess damages and benefits. Surveyors' makers have been set for the widening of the street and everything is completed except the work of the viewers. When the viewers have finished appraisement of benefits and damages proceedings will be started to improve the street with hard-surface pavement.

BIG EMBANKMENT DAMAGED—The lone embankment recently completed on East Ninth street, across Stephens Slough, has been damaged by the recent storm. A considerable section has settled 10 or 12 inches. This settling is well toward the south end of the embankment, where the ground underneath is solid. It is thought that the embankment has settled because proper drainage was not provided as the water is held in the gravel and sand of which the embankment is composed.

PORTLAND MAN 'WORKED'—O. W. DAVIDSON, VICTIM OF YOUNG BROKAW, BUNCO MAN. Representative of Insurance Firm Hears Tale of Woe and Losses \$10 to Man Under Arrest.

The operations of Fred Brokaw, the young man arrested in Los Angeles last week for alleged bunco deals, were not confined to that city, according to O. W. Davidson, a Portland representative of Seelye & Company, general insurance underwriters. He says Brokaw is able to play to perfection the role of an unsophisticated country lad 'gone broke.'

"Brokaw came to me with a tale of woe," said Mr. Davidson, yesterday. "He said he had been robbed on the train between San Francisco and Portland while on his way to his home on Puget Sound. He had been attending school in San Francisco, he said. He named over to me some of my business associates at Tacoma and Seattle, and said his father was on very close terms with them. I loaned him \$10 to enable him to reach his destination. He said his people were then camping on the beach in British Columbia."

As soon as young Brokaw left," continued Davidson, "I wrote to C. M. Seelye, of Seattle, and D. V. Caesar, of Tacoma, telling them what I had done and asking them to see the young man's parents and to secure my cash. They gave me the merry 'ha, ha,' informing me I had been 'bunked,' that H. B. Brokaw, 'Woe young man's father, disowns him. They informed me young Brokaw had victimized many people on the Sound."

"I named the young fellow worked in Tacoma was something like this: He was a member of a football team which had just left town, taking all the tickets. With this story he is said to have collected as high as \$50. I would like to know whether he has worked other people as he did me, or whether I am the only easy mark he found in Portland."
