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Restraining Order Against Leasing Issued by Circuit Court.

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On complaint of Captain Albert Crowe, President Judge Bronaugh of the State Circuit Court, yesterday issued an order temporarily restraining the Port of Portland from entering into any contract or other agreement for leasing the city drydock to any private company. The defendant commissioners have been cited to appear before Judge Bronaugh at 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning and show cause why they should not be permanently restrained from acting in the manner alleged in the complaint to be contemplated.

Dramatic Scene in Court.

Service of copies of the restraining order on three members of the commission late yesterday afternoon proved something of a dramatic incident. W. D. Wheelwright, J. C. Almsworth and C. W. Adams, constituting the sub-committee on the part of the city, had just convened the public hearing at the City Hall for the purpose of hearing arguments for and against the proposed leasing of the municipal drydock.

Hearing Proceeds.

The interruption by the officers of the law, however, was not permitted to interfere with the hearing. For the information of the interested parties attending the hearing, Chairman Wheelwright, in the opening of the hearing, made a statement of the position of the members of the sub-committee on the leasing question, saying that the three commissioners were satisfied that the Port of Portland had the right to lease the drydock to private interests if the same conditions respecting the control and operation of the property were imposed on the lessee as the Port of Portland itself, under its charter, is required to observe. The statement of Chairman Wheelwright follows:

"We believe it would be in the spirit of the act for the Commission to give up control of the drydock, therefore it will be stipulated in the lease, if one be made, that the Commission shall always have the right to specify the rate of dockage and fix the conditions on which the dock shall be used; that the dock shall be open to all ships and craft of all descriptions, whether private, whether persons, firms or corporations, that shall wish to do any work therein, on equal terms; that the Commission shall retain the active supervision of the dock, and that it shall not be run in any private interest, to the exclusion of other private interests, or to the injury of the public welfare, and that it shall retain authority over the lessee so that any one else who shall wish to use the dock shall be able to do so without hindrance or obstruction.

Lease Calls for Publicity.

"Further, no lease will be concluded without full publicity and competition, and I might say that I have been informed by a responsible person that a syndicate is being made up of interests outside of those represented by the Oregon Drydock Company, with a view of making a competing bid.

"With this preference I have to say that the committee is in favor of leasing the drydock for the purpose of lessening the burden of the taxpayers, provided an advantageous lease can be made. The drydock accounts for the last 50 years since that it has been run at a yearly expense to the taxpayers of some \$200,000, including interest on the bonds and 5 per cent depreciation per annum. This burden will be much heavier in the future than it has been in the past, owing to the fact that the business will be divided between the two plants now existing, whereas at present the public dock has had no competition."

Labor Representative Opposes.

H. J. Parkinson, of the legislative committee representing the laboring men, was the first speaker in opposition to the proposed lease. Mr. Parkinson said that he represented about 10,000 laboring men of Portland who were opposed to the leasing of the city's drydock to a private company, for the reason that the Port of Portland did not have the legal right to transfer the management of this property, and further for the reason that whenever a public utility is placed in the hands of private interests there always is a disposition on the part of the lessee to depress labor and to increase the cost of the utility.

Mr. Wheelwright inquired if Mr. Parkinson had any knowledge of the wishes of the other 250,000 or 275,000 people of Portland regarding the question of leasing the drydock. Responding to this inquiry, Mr. Parkinson said that he believed the editorial which was published in The Sunday Oregonian against the lease correctly reflected the sentiment of the great majority of the people of this city.

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Ed Rosenberg supplemented the remarks of Mr. Parkinson in behalf of the labor unions by contending that if the drydock should be leased the Commissioners would find themselves unable to retain control and regulation of the
