LIFT WHEAT PRICES

Good Demand and Small Offerings Make Strong Market.

GRAINS ARE FIRM

Reported Sale of Bluestem at \$1.17. Montana Buys Barley in Western Washington-Exporters in the Hop Market.

The milling demand for wheat was not as high as during last week, but there was anough inquiry from California and from a few exporters who still had tennage requirements to fill to keep prices up to the top level. The limits effected for himstem by North Const millers was \$1.13, but there were actual sales to other purchasers at \$1.15 and romors of business at \$1.17. The demand for rinh wheat was not broad, but was acute where it existed. The export hasts is not over \$1, but some amail lots that were badly needed changed hands at 6 or 7 cents shows this price. Buyers who have been through the Eastern Washington country say that wheat, especially bluestem, is getting decidedly scarce and only one or two crops remain is some of the large sections where wheat was plentiful at this time last year. Other desiers maintain that there are large stocks in farmers' warehouses, which will be quickly unloaded when the price reaches the growers' ideas. The tendency is upward in the oats and barier markets, Offschage of the former are comparatively small and the demand strong with the result that prices have been again advanced. Sales of oats at \$31 were reported resterday with holders now asking \$13.50. Barley was quoted firm at \$28.60 for both feed and browley. There have been some small shipments of barley from Eastern Washington points to Montans.
