JOHNSON CASE HANGS FIRE IN POLICE COURT.

Kienlin Complains of Repeated Extensions Granted Offender

Under Liquor Laws.

Police Sergeant Klenlen, who has made repeated raids on the Delmdnico Restaurant, conducted by Edward Johnson on Seventh street between Alder and Morrison, complained to Chief of Police Cox yesterday of the numerous times he was forced to forego his sleep in order to attend court only to find that for some unexplained reason the case had been post-

Yesterday morning Johnson's case, again continued, this time until December again continued, this time until December 14. At the time of the last raid by the police, on November 19, Johnson was charged with the double offense of selling liquor after 1 A. M. and selling liquor without a license. The case was put off until November 30, in spite of the rule usually adopted of allowing only one day's continuence and on November 30. one day's continuance, and on November 30 it was continued again until December 7. Yesterday it was again continued until December 14.

These continuances were permitted by Deputy District Attorney Sullivan and Deputy District Attorney Sullivan and allowed by Judge Bennett despits the fact that on several different occasions. Chief of Police Cox had either sent Sergeant Kienlen or gone himself to the office of City Attorney Kavanaugh and urged action against Johnson.

Johnson's license was recently taken away from him for conducting an undestrable resort. His record with the police shows that on March 8, 1999, he was arrested for selling liquor on Sunday and

rested for selling liquor on Sunday and the case was dismissed on the motion of the District Attorney. On May 15, after having escaped the first conflict with the law, he was arrested again for selling iquor after 1 A. M. and was fined \$100 in the Municipal Court. On August 25 he was again arrested, this time after his license had been taken away by the Council, and he was again fined \$100 in the Municipal Court.

the Municipal Court.

Three days after this Johnson was caught on August 28 for selling liquor without a license and was sentenced to 60 days on the rockpile and to pay a fine of \$100. The last case was appealed, and both the former cases, it is said, are still pending on appeal in the Circuit Court. In all instances Johnson has managed to delay the penalties in his cases. Several times he has assured the police that he delay the penalties in his cases. Several times he has assured the police that he would sell out, but still he continues to do business. Chief of Police Cox made a demand upon the City Attorney's office yesterday that some interest be shown in the prosecution of Johnson and intimated that if he were left to fight the battle alone he would sir things up.


