

Y. M. C. A. HELPS OPEN HOUSE THIS WEEK

Completion of Handsome New Home Is Cause for Celebration.

GROWTH HAS BEEN RAPID

First President of Portland Association Presides at Sunday Meeting, Opening Week's Services and Entertainment of Guests.

The Y. M. C. A. will keep open house every day this week, for the new building has been completed, and the members are celebrating yesterday as "Old Members' day." Edward Quackenbush, the first president of the Portland association, presided at the first meeting yesterday afternoon, when William M. Ladd, the acting president, closed the service with an invocation for continued prosperity and "blessing upon the old guard and the new."

History of Association Heard.

Mr. Warren, four times president of the association, the first time in 1870, gave a short history of the association's activities.

An effort is now being made to establish a Y. M. C. A. in the city. Its object will be to promote Christian sympathy and fellowship and to encourage and give direction to all the evangelical churches in the city is desired, and earnestly solicited.

"The association was organized March 21, 1868," said the speaker, "and the following officers elected: President, E. Quackenbush; vice-president, W. Lair Hill; corresponding secretary, James Steele; recording secretary, R. S. Alken; treasurer and librarian, R. Weeks.

"In 1869 a reading-room was established and a course of lectures given during the winter. Women were admitted in November of the following year."

Evangelist Aids Association. "The association moved to First and Alder streets in September, 1871. It was in this year that the Hammond evangelistic services were held in Portland, and the older members say it was here that the association first met in earnest."

Repeated efforts to secure funds for a building in the city have failed, and the association the quarter block at Fifth and Washington streets, now occupied by Olds, Wortman & King's department store, was purchased and raised for the building. But only \$50,000 was raised, although a heroic effort was made. It was the last attempt to secure a building, and the association went into possession of the building at Fourth and Yamhill streets, just yesterday.

The Y. M. C. A. building will be open to the public for inspection at 10 o'clock this morning, and every morning this week. Committees to stand committees will be served at noon and supper at 6:15 o'clock to the citizens' committee. "Everybody Give" committees, board of directors, department committees, standing committees and leaders' clubs. The annual budget meeting will follow at 8 o'clock tonight.

Oregon Suffragist Interrupts Session to Claim for This Principle Benefits Accruing to New Zealand Told by Dr. Buchanan.
