SEATTLE DEALERS LOOK FOR GOOD CHRISTMAS PRICES.

Afraid to Order in East Because of Uncertain Deliveries-Butter

SEATTLE, Wash. Dec. 14.—(Special.)—Reports received here from Portland stated that dealers were offering 26 cents for turkeys there, which led dealers here to believe that a strong market is in sight for the Christmastide. It is pretty certain that dealers will take no chances in ordering Eastern poultry with delivery as unsestisfactory as at present. Retailers are not buying ret and dressed stock is nominal at 28 cents and live at 25 cents.

The difficulty in getting butter and eggs through from the East is stiffening those commodities.

Feed dealers have decided to contest the new law effective January 1. compelling all mixed feeds to bear a state label. A test case will be brought.

Navel oranges have dropped to \$2.50, and at that price good ripe fruit moves brisk-iy. Potatoes were stiffer today, owing to light receipts. Only for an oversupply of interior potatoes, prices would advance. Twenty dollars was obtained for the best today. Florida grapefruit moves rapidly. Boat receipts from the South were below normal, and as a result stocks of green stuff are limited.
