Grays Harbor Points Will Be Reached at Same Hour as From Seattle.

SERVICE BEGINS SATURDAY

Northern Pacific Will Operate Two Trains Daily Between This City and Aberdeen-Trin Can Be Made in a Day.

Beginning January 1, Portland business men will be placed on an equal footing with the merchants of Puget Sound points in competing for the business of Grays Harbor. This is made possible by a revision of the schedule of Northern Pacific trains announced yesterday by A. D. Chariton, assistant passenger agent, to become effective next Saturday.

Under the present schedule Portland people cannot reach Aberdeen until 4:30

Under the present schedule Portland people cannot reach Aberdeen until 4:30 P. M., or three hours later than passengers from Seattle. Beginning Saturday the morning train from this city will connect with the fast train from Seattle and Puget Sound points at Gate Junction, the combined train reaching Aberdeen at 12:40 P. M., or nearly four hours earlier. The time of the afterneon train, leaving this city, has been changed from 3 to 2:30 P. M., with a through service to Aberdeen, giving Portland two through trains daily to points on Grays Harbor. Connections will also be made by both trains at Chehalis for South Bend branch points. By these changes in the schedule it will be convenient for the Portland business man to visit Aberdeen and other points on the harbor and return the same day. Chamber of Commerce Appeals.


