It is said that the African specimen is the largest in existence

The expedition was sent by the gov ernment to investigate the remains of antedeluvian animals discovered by Professor Frans, of Stuggart, In 1907, in the southern part of German East Africa.

Buckley, Superintendent L. R. Fields, Chief Engineer G. W. Boschke, Assistant Engineer Russell Chase, Superintendent J. T. Walsh, of the Corvailis & Eastern division, and Superintendent of Bridges J. H. Stev-eng took lunch here today on their re-turn from a tour of inspection over the proposed extension between Ya-guina City and Newport. None of the officials would give it out as a statement that work on the extension would be started at once, but it was intimated that an effort will be made to carry a part, at least, of the coming Summer excursion traffic all the way to New-
