MODERN CHURCH PROJECTED.—The Memorial Evangelical Church building and real estate, East, Tenth and Tibbets streets, will be sold and a modern church edifice will be built on East Twenty-eighth and Ellsworth streets, where a quarter of the lot was sold several months ago. Rev. Theodore Schauer, district superintendent, has announced that plans will be prepared for a modern edifice. Italiana are negotiating for the purchase of the property as a church for themselves. The foundation for the new English Evangelical Church, East Sixth and Market streets, has been completed. Concrete blocks will be used up to the floor of the auditorium and above that will be frame construction. Rev. Frank B. Coulter is pastor of this church. The completed building will cost about \$15,000.

COURTWORK DELAYED.—Although the contract between the County Commissioners and the Pacific Iron Works calls for the completion of the steel framework of the new courthouse building, on November 23, 1909, not a beam has yet been laid. The company has a few steel beams on the ground, however, and has started with the erection of a derrick for placing them. The County Commissioners have not yet granted the extension of time which the company is in place, which now promises to be about March 15. In that case the company will lose upwards of \$5000. About 40 carloads of steel will be used in the construction of the east wing.

ALBANY ELECT OFFICERS.—At the meeting of the Albany Athletic Association Tuesday evening, in the Montavilla schoolhouse the following officers were elected: President, N. W. Johnson; first vice-president, Albro Ehlers; second vice-president, Ethel Dickinson; secretary, Helen Sullivan; treasurer, Arthur Small; sergeant-at-arms, John Nettleson; reporter, May Cousins. The February class was received into the association. It was decided to have a boating party at the close of the school year, or the graduating classes of the year. An entertainment will be given in the near future to replenish the treasury.

SEWERAGE WORK DELAYED.—Petitions are being circulated in Sellwood asking for more fire hydrants. E. W. Edwards, secretary of the Sellwood Commercial Club, said that fire hydrants were needed all through that district, especially in City View Park Addition, where the best residences have been built. "There are sections all through Sellwood," said Mr. Edwards, "where there is no fire protection and cannot be any until we can secure fire hydrants. We are soon to have a fire engine, but fire hydrants must be placed all through this suburb."

BUTCHER CHARGED WITH ASSAULT.—D. T. McCartney, a butcher, was arrested in Linton yesterday morning by Deputy Constable Kiernan, charged with assault and battery. A warrant for his arrest having been issued upon the complaint of M. E. Rutherford, a nurse. Rutherford bears a puffed face, which was caused by blows from McCartney's fists. The encounter was the result of a dispute over a butcher bill. McCartney will have a hearing in the Justice Court today.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES INSPECTED.—Rev. R. A. Hutchison, secretary of the Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church of North America, spent Tuesday in Portland inspecting the local United Presbyterian churches and the mission fields. He met the members of the United Presbyterian churches, at the Church of the Sistrangers, on Grand avenue, in the afternoon, and then over the location of the Third United Presbyterian Church on Hawthorne avenue.

HOME HAS 76 CHILDREN.—The Ladies' Relief Society held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday afternoon in the parlors of the First Presbyterian Church. A report from the secretary announced that at present there are 76 children at the Children's Home, all in a comparatively good condition of health. The recent epidemic of whooping cough, which temporarily inconvenienced a number of the children during the past few weeks, has now abated.

COUNTY'S PROFIT \$2300.—County Clerk Fields' office received \$622 last month, and expended \$392, leaving a profit for the county amounting to \$2300. In January, 1909, the receipts were \$529, and the expenses \$187. Last month's receipts were divided as follows: Recording department, \$243.77; county department, \$128.89; Circuit Court department, \$166.

ASTORIA'S TAXES HIGHER

Dike Improvement and Better Schools Cause Part of Increase.

ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 2.—(Special).—The work of extending the taxes on this year's roll has been completed and the roll will be open for collections next Monday morning. The total is \$24,080.64, which is \$56,722.70 more than the total last year. The main portion of the increase was occasioned by the larger state tax, the sum raised for constructing dikes and the additional sums required by the city to retire bonds and by the Astoria school district to defray the cost of improvements to buildings. The tax for state, county and city school purposes amounts to \$19,223.24, compared with \$18,674.44 last year. The tax for the city of Astoria, including public park and library, is \$3,160.40, whereas last year it was \$2,480.91. The Astoria school district tax amounts to \$1,700.22, compared with \$1,455.72 last year.
