Contracting continues in a small way in Utah, at a range of 20 to 22 cents, and in the "Triangle' at 22 to 23% cents. Late reports state that ever at these prices buyers are obtaining contracts with more or less difficulty. Bostor operators are doing very little now in the way of buying wool on the sheep's backs, owing to the extreme prices ruling."
