

MULTNOMAH CLUB LIVES AGAIN

Catholic Young Men's Representatives Win in Boxing Bout.

FEATURE CARDS SCORE

Frankie O'Brien, of 118-Pound Class, Shows Ability in Clever Exhibition in Go With Rose. Several Surprises Sprung.

With an unexpected victory by P. Brady over R. E. Butler in the 17-pound class, the Catholic Young Men's Club took the honors from the Multnomah Club in the championship boxing carnival.

Thursday night in the Multnomah Club gym, winning three matches out of five. The feature bout of the evening was between Clarence White, of Multnomah, and Stanley McDonald, of the Catholics.

Bevis Wins Championship.

The first card of the programme was furnished by Bevis and West, both of the Multnomah Club. This was a club championship affair in the 117-pound class and Bevis got the decision on points.

Joe Franta surprised the fans by giving Omar Dranga, the Multnomah champion lightweight, a hard run. Dranga, in his boxing experience, had to show that he is a comer and that with Dranga's experience he would probably have won the bout.

Frankie O'Brien, the Catholic Club 118-pound entry, furnished the cleverest exhibition on the programme when he easily bested Eddie Rose, of the Multnomahs.

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Wrestler Makes Debut. Nelson Mose, the wrestler, made his debut in the boxing ring by going with Paul Struck at 133 pounds.

Lieutenant R. Sears, of Vancouver, B. C., and R. E. Buell, of Multnomah Club, furnished an interesting exhibition bout in the heavyweight class.

Following the action of the local police in securing the release of her daughter, Mrs. Briggs telegraphed a ticket to the authorities at San Francisco, with instructions to place her wayward daughter aboard the steamer Kamao, City bound for A. Giana.

Mildred Briggs is 16 years of age and mysteriously disappeared from her home here on February 22. Investigation made by her relatives brought to light the fact that she left the city the following day, accompanied by Frances Gilbraith, a waitress, and her son George and Bond. Subsequently the two women were located in San Francisco.

When Wehner was driving his truck along the plank road between Jersey City and Newark when he overtook Mabel, who was trudging along the highway. She had a sign that said "I am going to see my aunt in Newark. You'll give me a ride there, won't you?"

When Newark was reached Mabel told her recollection of her aunt's address and she kept the tender-hearted truckdriver driving around Newark most of the afternoon in search of the girl's residence.

When Wehner's sister kissed the child good-night Mabel said she intended to go to bed, but she wanted to know if there was a nice baby brother she could adopt and take home with her.

"Lucia di Lammermoor" is one of the good, old romantic operas that are waited to us from the parlor pianos and barrel organs, and yet the sorrows of Lucia and her Edgardo never fail to arouse a sympathetic hearing.

"Aida" is estimated to be Donizetti's masterpiece, and although both libretto and music are tearful, yet they cannot be called dull, as the action is as tragic as the most devoted of modern school could desire.

Those who were at the Bungalow last night—that is to say, if they are musical enthusiasts—ought to count themselves fortunate in hearing such a thrilling performance of Verdi's "Aida."

Indeed, on hearing lots of phrasing of "Aida," all one has to do to imagine that the spirit of Wagner rules the music to shut one's eyes, listen, and what echo comes forth? "Lohengrin."

"Aida" drew the light at the inauguration of the new opera house in Egypt, December 24, 1871, and was specially written, at express speed, at the command of the Khedive.
