Opposition to Proposed Nesmith and Umpqua Counties Develops at Well-Attended Meeting.

DRAIN, Or., April 8 .- (Special.)-The apathy manifested by the Eugene and Roseburg committees appointed some time ago to oppose the absorption of a portion of Douglas County within the lines of the proposed Nesmith County creation, and the fact that the people of Florence. Lane County, also desire to absorb the western portion of Douglas County into a new county to be known as Empqua County, has aroused the people of Drain into an attitude of defense on their own account. A large meeting of citizens and business men held last Monday night resoived to outline still another county. A subscription paper was started and several hundred dollars was at once subscribed. The petition is being circulated throughout the town and this portion of Douglas County, and is meeting with a good response. seburg committees appointed some time

HUGE PAVING CONTRACT ON

Ellensburg Will Lay 50,000 Yards of Hard Surface This Year.

ELLENSBURG, Wash., April 8. -(Special.)-Representatives of ten contracting firms, some of them the biggest paving concerns in the Pacific Coast, are in the city looking over plans and specifications preparatory to submitting bids for paving the streets of Ellensburg. The firm awarded the contract will be required to start work

contract will be required to start work at once and G N. Miller, City Engineer, said this morning that work could be under way by May 1.

Contractors estimate that 620 carloads of material will be needed for paving Ellensburg streets. A good part of this material will consist of sand and gravel for concrete. Representatives of the contractors propose to go to the Columbla River for this and the Milwaukee traveling freight agent. F. K. Swan, has been in the city for the past week arranging rates for hauling this material. Laying the 50,000 yards of paving will probably take about five months to complete. During the time the work is in progress about 200 men and a great number of teams will be engaged.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 8.-The Interior Department has informed Land Commissioner Ross and Atterney-General Bell, of Washingand Atterney-General Bell, of Washington, that several changes will be made in the department regulations in conformity with their recommendations, which will permit the state to perfect selections of more than 5000 acres of land, worth approximately \$2,000,000. Changes made will give the state equal rights with individuals in acquiring title to lands thrown open to entry.
