

LANGFORD WINS FIGHT WITH BARRY

White Man Surprises by His Ability to Withstand Punishment.

ROUGH TACTICS FEATURE

Victory Comes in Sixteenth Round, After Terrific Slugging and Pierce In-fighting—Straight Left Punch Closes Contest.

LOS ANGELES, April 14.—In a battle which demonstrated anew the power of Sam Langford, of Boston, as a human fighting machine and added to the reputation of Jim Barry, of Chicago, only a tribute to gameness and ability to withstand punishment, the "Boston Demon" sent his white antagonist to the mat for the final count in the 16th round at the Vernon arena today.

It was a vicious go from start to finish, with the negro well in the lead after the first half dozen rounds. From the tenth, in which Barry had been knocked down twice for the count of nine, until the 16th, when a straight left to the chin ended the combat, it was little more than a slaughter. Langford landed upon his man almost at will, and victory for him by the knockout route appeared to be only a matter of time.

White Man Is Game. Barry surprised the ringside crowd with the strength he displayed, despite the terrific bombardment, and a rally in the 15th inspired his backers with the hope that he would yet outlast the ultimate winner. Langford had tried hard for a knockout in the tenth and again in the 15th to win the money wagered on those rounds, but failed.

While the men did not weigh in before entering the ring it was said that a difference in weight of 50 pounds favored the white fighter. Barry's weight was given as 196 and that of Langford at 146. In the clinches the white man showed far the stronger of the two, being cautioned by the referee several times for nearly throwing Langford to the floor. In hitting power the advantage, if any, was with the "Cave Man."

Fighting Forced From Start. The two gladiators went at one another viciously at the sound of the gong calling them to the center for the first round. Near the finish of this period, Langford almost dropped Barry with a right uppercut.

There was slam-bang fighting at close range in the second and both men were bleeding at the mouth when they went to their corners.

Until the eighth the milling was a mixture of terrific slugging rallies and in-fighting, Barry throwing the negro around roughly in the clinches and undergoing severe punishment whenever they fought at long range.

Langford cut loose after the eighth round and sent constantly for a knockout. He pounded Barry on the kidneys at close range and varied uppercuts with straight rights and lefts to jaw and stomach when they stood apart. Barry fought back gamely.

In the tenth the negro executed a coup in ring tactics. Getting Barry near the ropes, he suddenly exerted all his strength and threw the white man against them; then, catching him on the rebound, landed a terrific swing flush on the jaw. Barry dropped for the count of nine.

Best Saves Second Time. Barry came up surprisingly strong in the 11th and in a fierce onslaught hurled Langford backward through the ropes. Near the close of the 12th, Langford again threw Barry against the ropes and caught him on the rebound for a knockout. Again the bell seemingly saved the Chicagoan.

After that time it was only a question of how long the white gladiator could last. He threw caution to the winds and attempted to exchange blow for blow. The last four periods were marked by a succession of slugging matches, with Langford doing most of the execution, though Barry often forced the fighting and rushed the black man to the ropes again and again. It was in one of these hard rallies in the 16th round that the Bostonian caught his almost exhausted opponent with a straight left to the chin that ended the combat.

ALL IS READY FOR BIG TRACK MEET TOMORROW.

All local schools enter teams for events which will show prowess of athletes.

All is in readiness for the big annual indoor track and field meet to be held tomorrow in the Columbia University stadium. With two new names received yesterday from the Y. M. C. A., the entry list was swelled to 181, a number larger by six than any previous meet.
