# POISON IS IGNORED BY HYDE DEFENSE

Attempt Made to Show That Deaths of Swopes Was Entirely Natural.

JURY TO GET CASE SOON

Various Diseases Said to Produce Symptoms Such as Shown in Convulsions Described - Colonel Swope Spoke of Death.

KANSAS CITY, May 5.-Disregarding the evidence of the acientists that poison caused the deaths of Colonel Thomas H. Swope and Chrisman Swope and the con-vulsions of Miss Margaret Swope, the defense in opening its case today tried to show that the deaths were setural. show that the deaths were natural.
Sylvester Spangler, on the stand for Dr. Hyde, accured of the murder of Colonel Swope, testified that the millionaire was so feeble for the year before he died that he fainted several times. Only the day before death came, testified Mr. Spangler, Colonel Hyde told him he might die at any time.

From Dr. F. W. Froehling the defense elicited the information that

fense elicited the information that either graemic poisoning, typhold fever or meningitis would result in the symptoms such as those shown by the three Swopes when convulsions devel-oped. On cross-examination, however, the physician admitted the attacks also resembled cases of strychnine poison-

The Hyde murder trial entered upon the The Hyde murder trial entered upon the last lap today when the defense began its presentation of witnesses. Between 18 and 20 persons will testify in behalf of Dr. Hyde, it is said, and indications are that the case will be in the jury's hands within a week. Mrs. Logan O. Swope was the last witness for the prosecution yesterday. She made a calm and straightforward witness. The defense questioned her intelly.

"I am well satisfied with the trial thus far," said Dr. Hyde before court today.

"I think I shall be acquitted."

In an effort to prove that Colonel Swope's physical condition was poor, S. W. Spangler, for several years business manager for the millionaire, was called upon to open the defense's case. Mr. Spangler said Mr. Swope drank heavily until II months before his death. When Colonel Swope gave up drinking, testified the witness, he became very weak. The millionaire was a user of patent medicines and remedies centaining strychnine, said Spangler. nine, said Spangler,

#### Swope Predicted Sports.

"'I may be here a day or a week, but I can't last long, I'm liable to die at any minute,' "Mr. Spangler said Colonel Swope told him the day before he died. Prosecutor Conkling made an ineffective attempt to show that Colonel Swope oblected to Dr. Hyde marrying Frances Swope. The testimony was barred. After the marriage, it was shown, the million-aire gave property valued at \$10,000 to the defendant.

Typhold fever, unaemic poisoning or meningitis, said Dr. F. W. Froehling, the next witness, often caused convulsions similar to those produced in the cases of Thomas H., Chrisman and Margaret

Dr. Freehling was of the opinion that this remedy was a good heart stimulant, and in common use.

"You would have to know the pulse and temperature before you gave this oil, wouldn't you?" asked Mr. Reed on cross-examination.

"Certainly," answered Dr. Froehling. Margaret Swope's testimony was that Dr. Hyde injected the oil without ex-amining her condition.

Bourne in Senate Defends Selection of Chamberlain.

OPPOSITION TO LAW SEEN

Many Republicans Inspired by Desire to Make Statement No. 1 Odious, Says Senator-Plot by Enemies Is Alleged.

May 5.—Commending the election system of his state, Senator Bourne, of Oregon, in an extended speech in the Senate today aroused a general debate on the question of representative government which dealt especially with the effect on the Southern states of the system of selecting Federal officials for

Stating that there were no penalties attached to the law, Mr. Bourne said that at the session of the Legislature at which Chamberiain had been elected, an ex-Government official and assistant to the chairman of the Republican National Committee appeared in Oregon and promised Federal appointments to Legislators if they would disregard their piedges.

"The effort was made by the enemies of the law," he said, 'to create the impression that by reason of this person's relations with the chairman of the Republican National Committee during the National campaign he would be able to deliver these promised Fedbe able to deliver these promised Federal appointments in case Statement No. 1 subscribers sold their honor and betrayed their trust."

Motive in Vote Detected.

sourne said that in his opinion Chamberlain received the votes of several thousand Republican enemies of the law, who believed they could pre-vent a Republican Legislature from ratifying the choice and who sought to make Statement No. 1 and the primary law odious. He defended the primary

"Results attained under direct legis-lation in Oregon," he said, "compare so favorably with the work of a Legislative Assembly that an effort to re-peal the initiative and referendum would be overwhelmingly defeated. No effort has been attempted.

He declared that Oregon had "evolved the best form of popular government in the world today." and defended the election of his Democratic colleague, Chamberlain, by a Republican Legislature.

"At the general election in June Senator Chamberlain defeated Mr. Cake, notwithstanding the state was overwhelmingly that an effort to repeal the initiative and referendum value defeated. No effort has been attempted.

"Plainly stated, the alm of our law is to destroy the irresponsible political machine and put all elective officers in the state in direct touch with the scope, as the real source of authority; in short, to give direct and full force to the ballot of every individual elector in Oregon and to eliminate the dominance of corporate and corrupt influence in the administration of public affairs."
