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JURORS WILL GET HYDE CASE TODAY

Court Gives Instructions for Verdict of First Degree Murder or Acquittal.

CLOSING ARGUMENTS BEGIN

Kansas City Physician Expresses Confidence That He Will Be Freed—Wife's Testimony Is Attacked by Prosecution.

KANSAS CITY, May 11.—All of the rebuttal testimony was completed, the court's instructions were delivered to the jury and one of the state's closing arguments was delivered in the Hyde murder trial today.

By Judge Lathrop's instructions to the jury the accused physician either must be found guilty of first degree murder, punished by death, or life imprisonment or must be acquitted.

Testimony All Stands.

None of the testimony admitted in the trial was withdrawn by the court from the jury. All the issues collateral with the alleged killing of Colonel Swope were admitted with this explanation:

"The evidence introduced as to other transactions, if any, is admitted to your consideration for the sole purpose of throwing light (if they have that effect) upon the intent and motive of the defendant in the transaction for which he is now on trial, and for no other purpose."

Special instructions were given the jury regarding the testimony of Mrs. Hyde and of the medical experts for both sides. In these connections the court said:

"The wife of the defendant is a competent witness in this case and you must consider her testimony in arriving at your verdict, but in determining what weight and credibility you will give to her testimony in making up your verdict, you may take into consideration her interest in the result of the case and that she is the wife of the accused party on trial, testifying in his behalf."

Case Entirely Circumstantial.

"The opinions of experts who have testified in this case is testimony which the jury should consider and examine in connection with all other testimony in course, subject to the rules of credit or disbelieve as the testimony of other witnesses."

Attention was also directed by the court to the fact that all evidence against Dr. Hyde was circumstantial.

By the law in this state the instructions to the jury were read before the attorneys began their arguments. Assistant Prosecutor Henry L. Jost opened the argument for the state, talking for two hours. Three more speeches will be made by each side. Three hours are given to each set of attorneys. Determined attacks were made by the state today upon Mrs. B. C. Hyde's story

regarding the whereabouts of her brother Thomas on the night of December 18 and the testimony of Dr. Hyde's neighbors in relation to the formation of hydrocyanic gas in a corpse.

Mrs. James H. Clinton, of Independence, Mo., swore Mr. Swope telephoned Dr. Twyman from her residence on December 18 at a time when Mrs. Hyde had testified he was at Mrs. Swope's residence with her. Mrs. Clinton said Mr. Swope held something in his hand while telephoning. Mr. Swope then testified it was capsules said to have contained cyanide which were dropped by Dr. Hyde that he held.

Two scientists, Prof. Paul Schweitzer and Prof. H. F. Cady, swore it was impossible for the amalgamation of formaldehyde and ammonia to produce hydrocyanic acid in a dead body.

CARTAGO TO BE REBUILT

Quake-Stricken City to Arise From Ruins—No Epidemic.

SAN JOSE, C. R., May 11.—The Red Cross, the police, the military and members of the French colonies are actively engaged in the relief work and have accomplished much since the earthquake.

As fast as discovered, the injured are removed to this city, where they receive medical attention. The public schools have been converted into temporary hospitals. The sanitary authorities are burying the dead promptly and are taking all precautions against an epidemic.

Kindly expressions of sympathy have been received with gratitude by the public. The messages of condolence are many. The donation of Mexico, the activities of the American Red Cross, and the promptness with which press associations of other countries have made known the distress of the stricken territory are practical proofs of foreign sympathy that are recognized and appreciated.

WEST'S VIEW GIVEN

Borah Says Pinchotism Is Holding Back States.

EXODUS TO NORTH CAUSED

Senator Declares 100,000 People Have Been Driven to Canada in Year—Theoretical Ideas Are Repeatedly Punctured.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., May 11.—Senator Borah delivered a speech on practical conservation in the Senate today, and repeatedly punctured theoretical ideas advanced by Pinchot and Garfield. In the course of his remarks Borah said: "Whatever the wisdom of Congress shall be as to the manner in which natural resources shall be conserved, that should be followed by all citizens and undoubtedly will be. But to suspend our laws, say to the settler in the first place that you may go here or there, and upon complying with the law, acquire rights and a home, and then, after he has been invited to do so, to arbitrarily deprive him of this right is to establish a principle which will be far more costly in the end than the loss of some of our natural resources."

"There have passed over our borders within the last year 100,000 American citizens to acquire homes in Canada upon its public domain. These people carried with them thousands and thousands of dollars, all of which we could very well afford to lose. But no nation can afford to lose the brain and brawn of its best citizenship, and drive from our public domain, at a time when there are thousands and millions of acres of unoccupied land, those who desire to make homes and build up communities, pay taxes and sustain the commonwealth."

"The West's in full harmony with any policy that will prevent waste, that will prevent monopoly, that will prevent destruction, but the West is not in harmony and never will be in harmony, nor submit to rule or policy which, under guise of conserving, strangles communities and deprives us of opportunity to build up our states."

Quoting Garfield's contention in favor of the right of the President to withdraw the lands under specifically prohibited, Borah said it was entirely contrary to the facts, and he added he thought it would not have been made if there had been due reflection. If this rule were to be followed we would have a Government of men and not a Government of law, according to Borah.

Forest Grove Bars Firecrackers.

FOREST GROVE, Or., May 11.—(Special.)—The City Council last night passed the ordinance prohibiting the use of firecrackers, toy pistols and pyrotechnics within the corporate limits. A delegation from the women's clubs appeared before the Council to urge the enactment of the ordinance. William Langley was chosen as City Attorney and will serve until January 1. The city will call for

Polk County Itemizer Turned Over to Methodists, While Editor Rests.

DALLAS, Or., May 11.—(Special.)—The Polk County Itemizer of this place will inaugurate next week a novelty in local newspaperdom by turning over the management of the paper and job office to the Methodist church.

A percentage of the receipts of the week will be devoted to church use. The management will be in the hands of Rev. M. E. Spahr, the local pastor. Judge Stouffer will superintend the editorial and local pages. Church members will be reporters and advertising solicitors and do special work, and Editor Flske will take a week's outing in the woods.

Forest Grove Lodge to Build.

FOREST GROVE, Or., May 11.—(Special.)—Washington Lodge No. 48, I. O. O. F., of this city, awarded the contract for the construction of its new lodge home to Starrett & Son, of Forest Grove. There were four bidders and the successful bid was \$15,950, but alterations are to be made in the interior finishing to cut the cost to \$15,000. Ex-

cavation will be started in a week or 10 days. The new building will stand at Main street and First avenue, north. It will be a three-story structure of glazed red bricks.
