Rice, chairman of the water main mittee from East Side push clubs, said yesterday that the City Attorney had been asked to draw the amendment to the charter for laying water mains according to the majority report. As soon as drawn the amendment will be printed for distribution. Mr. Rice said that the committee is opposed to calling a special election to have the amend-ment submitted, but it will be voted on November 8, at the general election. Some water mains are being laid ahead of hard-surface pavements, but otherwise the Water Board is not laying mains.
