

CITY TO REGRETATE

Big Buildings Will Be Resplendent in Colors.

PERSONAL APPEALS MADE

President Hoyt, of Rose Festival, Finds Business Men Willing to Help Make City Attractive to Visiting Throngs.

Effective, beautiful and artistically arranged decorations for several of the downtown business office buildings have been promised the Rose Festival management within the past few days as the result of the personal appeal which President Ralph W. Hoyt sent out last Monday. The result of the appeal is that the situation seems to have been driven home to a large number of big property owners whom the idea of decorating up their edifices had not made much of an impression heretofore.

One big retail firm which occupies its own building and which in former festivals has not gone to the trouble of embellishing either front or display windows has announced that it will spend about \$500 in trimming up the store with not only the streamers, bunting, pennants and banners in the official pink and green colors of the festival, but it is working out an elaborate scheme of colored illumination by night.

Another leading business man said that he intended to decorate for the reason that it was the one thing which first struck the eye of the stranger when he came to town. He said that he was working out a plan to have a row of brightly decorated buildings always carries with it a sense of welcome and cordiality, is the way this man expressed himself, and that the giving of low excursion rates by the railroads would bring the crowds and he was getting for the first time to be imbued with the festival spirit.

Many Still Hesitate.

So far it has remained for a number of the leading hotels, two or three of the larger stores, and a few of the big office buildings to take the lead in developing decorative treatment for their buildings. President Hoyt said yesterday that while the returns from his letter calling for every citizen, business man and property owner to help in the decorations were very encouraging, there seemed to be a sort of hesitation on the part of some, almost as if they felt that because their neighbor was going to decorate it wasn't necessary for them to do so.

"That is not the spirit that we have hoped for," President Hoyt said. "I mean to imply that that is the reason why many are holding back. I think the movement should be more aggressive and that given evidence of being, Portland spirit and enterprise are really on trial this year, because the Rose Festival is the one big attraction that the entire United States has had to look forward to for the summer, at least in the West. Here we are getting extraordinarily high railroad rates which will inevitably add enormously to the attendance this year. This should be considered by every person who possesses civic pride even in the slightest degree."

In explanation of an number of inquiries that have been made at Festival headquarters, President Hoyt said he announced that no limitations as to the form of decorations are specified. The flags, festoons, draperies, outlines, floral effects, set pieces, designs of any and all sorts may be done in the official colors, pink and green, or the National colors may be used. Each building should be decorated in its own way, and the property owner is merely asked to decorate as much as he can and as artistically as he knows how.

Suggestions Freely Given.

The festival management will be only too glad to offer suggestions as to manner of decorations, and to send out lists and show pictures of many decorated buildings in other cities from which ideas may be gained. The headquarters of the festival in the Standard building is provided with all sorts of pictorial and artistic designs such as lend themselves to impressive effects.

LANDLORD HAS NEW PLEA

Demand of Italian Boarders Are Excuse for Selling Liquor.

Making the plea that all Italian people drank beer and whisky at their meals instead of tea or coffee, Charles Nordini, who keeps a lodging-house for the sons of Sunny Italy on East Clay, between Union and Third streets, failed yesterday to convince Judge Bennett yesterday that he was not violating the law, and two fines, amounting to \$125, were imposed upon him.

Nordini, who speaks in broken English, told the court that, in order to keep his boarders, he had to give them beer and whisky to drink, which occasionally he did of claret wine. Sergeant Smith and Patrolman White testified that they entered Nordini's place after 11 o'clock one night and were told by the landlord that they could get a drink of whisky. Nordini has no city liquor license, although he says he has a Government permit.

Judge Bennett found Nordini guilty under both the state and city charges, fining him \$25 on the former and \$100 on the latter count. An appeal was noted and the Circuit Court will have an opportunity to render a decision on the case.

GIRL DENIES RING THEFT

Court Gives Blanche Frazier Chance to Make Her Defense.

With eyes red from crying, and looking not at all like a criminal, Blanche Frazier, the 17-year-old girl who is accused by Mrs. L. J. Wright of stealing a \$400 set diamond valued at \$400, appeared before Judge Bennett yesterday and asked that the case be continued to the next day. While the girl did not enter her plea yesterday, Detective Hawley, who brought her back from McMinnville, said that she vigorously denied her guilt.

She told the court that her home is in Wilhelmnia. Her parents are aware of her plight, but, according to her statement yesterday, they are not coming to Portland to assist her in her trouble. The complaining witness was in the courtroom yesterday, and evidently wanted to make the trial as much as possible. Judge Bennett put the case over until today, however, and will appoint an attorney to defend the girl.

TRAINED 'FLEAS PERFORM

Manager Cordray, of Oaks, Will Introduce Expensive Feature.

For ages the world has been pestered by the Pulex irritans, or common ordinary flea. Apparently no use was ever discovered for the annoying little pest. Mr.

Cordray, the enterprising manager of The Oaks, during his far search for unique attractions, unearthed away back in Berlin, Germany, a circus composed entirely of fleas, trained to most extraordinary feats. Right on the spot it was decided to bring them to The Oaks, and at great expense the circus was secured for the coming season.

Many people would naturally suppose that the fleas were a hardy specimen, but this is not so; the fleas through which they are put, lessen their life, so it is said, and extreme care is taken of them. The fact also that the opera singer does not cause any more worry to her managers than do this same excitable troupe of tricksters. It is also said that the fleas take three square meals of blood a day from the trainer's arm, to keep these dainty Polux irritans in prime condition.

Only 10 persons at one time are able to view a performance, and in Europe, where these exhibitions are most popular, the little groups of 10 are ticketed, and anxiously await their turn, like a busy barber-shop on a Saturday night.

The fleas will be exhibited in a popular show, and the almost priceless bunch of tiny performers will be prime favorites.

According to the latest bulletin, all other fleas have left The Oaks and vicinity.

Kyle Asks People to Name Trunk Line Stations

Chief Engineer's Invention Runs After Evolving Most of Them.

WHO has any suggestions for station names? Station names are a commodity of which Chief Engineer Kyle of the Oregon Trunk Line is just at present. Mr. Kyle has a few hundred miles of railroad that must be dotted with stations every four miles or so. By strenuously burning the midnight oil he has evolved most of the destinations done. But 127 miles of main line still await distinctive names.

Indian names, names of rivers, creeks, girls, boys, generally—in fact, every possible kind of name have been running through Mr. Kyle's brain as he sits at his desk in the Henry Building, with a copy of the railroad guide at his left hand. The guide is presently in the hands of the public, and for it is not his desire to use the name of any other station, particularly of others on the Hill line.

The money may be pretty or they may be ugly; they should have some suggestion of the country which the road traverses; they should not be longer than two syllables and preferably one. The name should be euphonious and at the same time attractive to residents in the neighborhood. Mr. Kyle has been up against. He is willing to help by mail only. Letters suggesting the names of stations should be sent to "Stations" on the envelopes, then they will not get mixed up with other mail. So, if Oregon people want to pick out names, appropriate names for the Oregon Trunk Line stations, they have their opportunity.

BAD GANG IS BROKEN UP

Judge Bennett Imposes Maximum Fines on Bunco Men.

Three members of the bunco gang which attempted to operate in this city a few nights ago, were given heavy fines by Judge Bennett yesterday. The men were Charles W. Harris, Fred Jones and John S. Verhagen, all of whom have been fined with the Harvey Dale crowd at one time. While there was no definite evidence against these men, other than that they were associated with Fred Jones, who was sentenced to one year in the County Jail Wednesday for attempting to rob G. Verhagen of \$25. Judge Bennett fined them \$100 each. Harris and Jones were fined under an after hours charge, while Johnson is booked on the police blotter as a "vag." One hundred dollars is the maximum fine which can be given under an after hours charge.

"Every once in a while a sweet gang of sure-thing artists attempt to operate in this city," said Judge Bennett yesterday, "and the minute they are caught a howl is set up that they are not being given fair play. I have no doubt at all that this set up came to town with the purpose of preying on such victims as crossed their path. I will therefore give them the maximum fine on the charge under which they have been brought before me."

RIVERS FALLING SLOWLY

Standstill at Portland Due Saturday; Rise Possible Monday.

River conditions remain unchanged and the Willamette at Portland continues to fall slowly. The Columbia at Portland is at all points and the drop at the Dalles was 5 of a foot. The river will probably come to a stand at Portland Saturday, and continue to fall slowly. In the eastern part of the state there possibly will be a slight rise Monday.

Fair weather, with northerly winds, is predicted for today. The temperature has been lower all over the Northwest and at Portland the maximum was 69 degrees. No rain has fallen since Tuesday, and there is a deficiency of 1.47 inches.

SECOND PLACE HELD

Portland Retains Position as Wheat Shipping Point.

Official statistics of the Department of Commerce and Labor for the 10 months ending April 30 place Portland in second place as a wheat-shipping port of the United States. New York is usual, stands in first place and Philadelphia comes third. Duluth beats Puget Sound, which winds up fifth. The bulletin of grain exports was received at the local Custom-house yesterday morning.

PUGET SOUND IS FIFTH

New York Has First Place and Philadelphia and Duluth Follow Oregon Metropolis—Fiscal Year Will End June 30.

New York's exports of wheat for the 10 months of the fiscal year amounted to 9,573,420 bushels. During the same period Portland exported 5,452,387 bushels, while the combined ports of Puget Sound showed only 5,882,133 bushels. Exports from Philadelphia were a trifle in excess of 4,600,000 bushels, while Duluth showed barely in excess of 4,000,000 bushels.

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"OLD HOSS" SALE TO BE HELD

Deputy Collector Barnes Will Dispose of Confiscated Goods.

R. F. Barnes, Deputy Collector of United States Customs, will hold an "Old Hoss" sale in the office of the Appraiser in the Customs building this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Confiscated stuff, unclaimed samples and a lot of miscellaneous junk will be knocked down to the highest bidder.

EXCURSION SEASON OPEN SOON

Steamer Bailey Gatzert Will Go on Run Next Wednesday.

The Summer excursion season of 1910 on the Columbia River will open Wednesday, May 25. On that date the steamer Bailey Gatzert will make a round trip between Portland and The Dalles. With the exception of Thursdays and Sundays that schedule will be maintained during the entire Summer. The Gatzert is now being overhauled for the Summer season and when placed in commission will be in finer shape than at any time since she was built.

The steamer Francis H. Leggett sailed for San Pedro this afternoon, with a full cargo of lumber, loaded at Portland and at the Hammond Lumber company, here.

Kirkcubrightshire to Bring Coal

J. & A. Brown have chartered the British ship Kirkcubrightshire to bring coal to Portland from Newcastle, N. S. W. This vessel is now ready to sail for East London, South Africa, for the Australian port. She registers 1483 net tons and is well known in Portland, being on her regular trips to this port in the grain trade.
