

BUDDY RYAN'S HOME RUN WINS CONTEST

Beavers Take Last Game of Series With Angels and Lead by 1 Point.

KRAPP PITCHES REAL BALL

Visitors Get Only One Hit and One Score During Nine Innings—Home Team Leaves for South to Meet Vernon on Wednesday.

With the score tied at 1-1 in the last line of the eighth inning yesterday, Buddy Ryan hit the ball high over the right field fence for a home run, chasing in Gus Fisher and Perle Casey, giving him for a total of three runs, ahead of Portland the final and deciding game of the series with Los Angeles. The score was 4 to 1.

Portland now leads the league by one point. Eugene Krapp, the best fielding pitcher in the league, occupied the hill for Portland, and he allowed the Angels one hit and one run, and that lone bingle cut no figure in the score made by the visitors.

Portland Starts Early. Portland became acquainted with the scoreboard in the opening inning. After Smith had been retired at first, Olson singled to left, and Rapps advanced him to second with an out. Wheeler pulled a wild pitch, and Olson perched on third. Gus Fisher, the mighty aviator, slammed one far over Bernard's head in center for three bases, scoring Olson.

Wheeler stabbed Casey's drive and ended the inning by retiring the captain at first. In the fourth the Angels tied the score without the assistance of a hit. Daley walked for the second time, and took second on Bernard's sacrifice. Howard hit to Krapp, who threw to first, while Olson advanced to third, and when Olson shot Dillon's grounder low to Rapps, Daley scored.

That was all for Los Angeles, for the only hit allowed by Krapp came to Billy Roth in the fifth, and after he had reached second on Delmas's sacrifice, Olson pulled the old gag of hiding the ball, and caught the thick-necked snooker quietly on dangerous ground.

Then Ryan Comes to Bat. Gus Fisher walked, and Casey hit to Delmas, who tossed to third, Van Halten ruling that Rapps was out on a close play. This brought Buddy Ryan to bat, and the stocky outfielder hooked one fairly "on the beam" and it sailed high and far over the right garden wall for as pretty and timely a home-run drive as has been seen here since the days when Ote Johnson delighted the fans with circuit swats.

All hands trotted home amid the frenzied applause of the big Sunday crowd. That decided the game, for Krapp fanned Daley, and Bernard and Howard were easily wound up in the Angels' half of the ninth.

Both teams left last night for the South. McCredie's band, consisting of a seven-piece band, is en route to Los Angeles to meet the Hooligans in the game series, while the Angels invade San Francisco for a similar series with the Seals.

DINGHES COLLISION

Owners Say Launch Did Not Try to Avoid Collision.

RACE IS DECLARED OFF

Owner of Olympic, However, Declares Accident Was Unavoidable, as Boats Crossed Bow Too Close.

The Dinghies Celt and Duckey were run down by the launch Olympic in front of the Oregon Yacht Club yesterday afternoon. Both small boats were badly damaged and the owners, James Hazlett and H. F. Todd, who were sailing their boats, narrowly escaped injury. The stern of the Duckey was stove in and the fudder was carried away and sunk. The main boom of the Celt was broken.

The Olympic, which was loaded with passengers for the Oaks, did not stop after the collision. Hazlett in the Celt, and Todd in the Duckey, were in the stream jockeying for the right of way, which was to start at 4 o'clock. Both boats were on a starboard tack, the Celt almost under the lee of the Duckey, when the Olympic came along at full speed and crashed into them.

Neither sailor could see the Olympic approaching. Todd heard the crash as the Olympic struck the boom and barely had time to deflect his course and avoid being hit amidships. A big crowd had assembled to see the race and for a few moments there was great excitement. As the launch sped on it was seen that both men were holding their own and were not injured, although their craft were sorry-looking spectacles. Hazlett and Todd paddled their boats ashore and the race was declared off.

The Olympic is a 25-passenger gasoline launch owned by John D. Mitchell and runs from the Merrill boathouse to the Oaks. "The accident was unavoidable," said John D. Mitchell, owner of the Olympic last night. "The dinghies crossed my bows so close that I could not avoid hitting them. I slowed down and as soon as I saw they were about, proceeded. I would not have gone on if I had thought they were in danger. It is true that sailboats have the right of way on a tack but they have no business crossing your bows. When I came in I stopped for the boats and had to back up to avoid hitting them.
