Haziett and H. F. Todd, who were salling their boats, narrowly escaped injury. The stern of the Duckey was stove in and the rudder was carried away and sunk. The main boom of the Celt was broken.

The Olympic, which was loaded with passengers for the Oaks, did not stop after the collision.

Haziett in the Celt, and Todd in the Duckey, were in the stream jockeying before the race, which was to start at 4 o'clock. Both boats were on a starboard tack, the Celt almost under the lee of the Duckey, when the Clympic came along at full speed and crashed into them.


