

COMMUTERS HOLD FORT ANOTHER DAY

Tacoma Company Avoids
Force, but Declares It Will
Win in End.

TRANSFERS ARE REFUSED

Jacob Furth, Head of Stone & Webster Interests, Says Concern Never
Will Concede Reduced Fare
to City Limits.

TACOMA, Wash., June 28.—(Special.)—The Furth line, against the street railway company for 5-cent fare continued right merrily today, with the advantage of the commuters, on the side of the commuters. It is the strangest contest a traction company ever had to deal with, and is just now a battle of endurance, the company hoping to tire out the Furth line, and continuing to try to collect the extra nickel when possible, but abandoning the attempt rather than use force to the passenger resists.

Following the tactics of yesterday, by force of numbers the Furth line prevented the company collecting the extra nickel for the ride to the city limits.

In occasional instances women were peacefully put off for refusing to pay the extra fare when the Furth line commuters left the cars unwatched during the dull hours of the day. Policemen rode the cars all day, but no arrests were made. In most instances the streetcar men accepted 5 cents and made no attempt to collect the extra nickel.

The company's only retaliatory measure was refusal to give transfers from the Furth line. Jacob Furth, of Seattle, head of the Stone & Webster interests in the Northwest, came to Tacoma today and spent an hour with General Manager Bean and Attorney J. F. Fitch, the latter one of the Furth line lawyers. Furth said that the company never would consent to 5-cent fares to the city limits.

When asked what the company proposed to do about the Furth line's refusal to pay, Furth said that "was a detail for the general manager to work out."

No appeal has been made to the courts, the company evidently seeking to tire out the commuters. "We have not received a bit from our original stand," said Manager Bean. "We are going to run these cars and we are going to collect 10 cents a ride before we get through."

At 10 o'clock, when the jury had been out 102 hours, it was announced at the Criminal Court building that there was little chance of an agreement tonight.

During the evening nearly a dozen pitchers of ice water were taken into the room, whether for drinking purposes or to revive jurors overcome under the strain of the situation the bailiffs would not say.

During the day the food allowed the jurors was reduced to a marked degree. This was the result of an effort to starve themselves. The change was made because of the fact that many of the jurors, accustomed to active lives, had continued to eat their accustomed meals, with the result that they have all but collapsed under their imprisonment. The lack of exercise and fresh air is supposed to have been the chief trouble with the men who were sick.

BISHOP M'VICKAR DIES

Long Career of Episcopal Head in
Rhode Island Is Ended.

BEVERLY, Mass., June 28.—William Nelson McVickar, Episcopal bishop of Rhode Island, died at his summer home at Beverly Cove late today, after a lingering illness. He had been bishop of Rhode Island since 1900. Bishop McVickar was born in New York, October 19, 1848. He was graduated from Columbia College, 1866, and from the Central Theological Seminary in 1868.

He had been rector of Holy Trinity Church, Harlem, New York City, and of Holy Trinity, Philadelphia. He was deputy to the general convention of the Episcopal Church from 1882 to 1886. He was a member of the board of managers of the General Missionary Society.

AUTO DASHES INTO CREEK

One Killed, Six Hurt in Race With
Electric Car.

CHICAGO, June 28.—One man was pinned under an automobile and drowned, and five others and a young woman were seriously injured this morning a few miles from Hammond, Ind., when the car plunged into a creek. Irving Betz, with four male companions, met Frank Betz and Miss Brackett at Lake Front Park, and after supper they started home. They were about half way between Roby and Hammond when at a turn in the road young Betz lost control of the car.

The big machine plunged from the road, crashed through a fence, struck a telegraph pole, and turned turtle in a creek containing five feet of water. The man killed was Peter Ripley. The auto was racing with an interurban electric car.

The Betz brothers are sons of Frank Betz, millionaire manufacturer of Hammond.

SCORE OUT FOR OFFICES

Clark Sheriff's Job Wanted by Six
Aspirants.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 28.—(Special.)—Politicians and office-seekers are becoming numerous and are posting the county with their respective

cards announcing their intention of running for office. During the last few days several new candidates for the race, have declared their intention. At the present time there are six aspirants to the office. They are George Johnson, Deputy Sheriff; J. A. Walters, Deputy Sheriff and Game Warden; Ira Cresap, Vancouver policeman; Charles McCafferty, a liverman; Jessie W. Hill, and O. Shintaffer, rancher. The first five candidates are residents of Vancouver, and Shintaffer is from View.

Four men have started in the race for Clerk of the Court and County Clerk, one office. They are W. S. T. Derr, A. W. Calder and H. R. Caples, of Vancouver; Felix Van Vleet, of Camas, and Charles Alexander, of Yacolt.

A trio are running for County Auditor—Carl Quarnberg, present deputy; William Marshall, of Vancouver, and J. G. Eddings, present County Commissioner of Camas. William Fletcher, Deputy County Treasurer, and J. J. Waggoner, Jr., are running for County Treasurer.

Jay V. Pike and J. M. Withersell are seeking the office of Superintendent of schools.

WESTERN UNION ANNOUNCES
ITS POLICY AS TO FIGHT.

General Manager Says Telegrams
to Distribute Others' News, and
Not Act as News Agent.

NEW YORK, June 28.—General Manager Brooke, of the Western Union Telegraph Company, issued a notice today that the company would not furnish news bulletins either by special cable, by messengers, or on the telephone, relating to the progress of the Jeffries-Johnson prizefight at Reno, Nev., July 4. Numerous applications have been made for such service.

The Western Union Company will confine itself to handling of such messages as may be filed for regular transmission in the ordinary manner at Reno by press associations, by newspapers and by individuals.

Explaining the company's attitude, Mr. Brooke issued this statement tonight: "The Western Union Telegraph Company is not in the business of gathering news. That is a function of press associations and of newspapers. The telegraph company is a transmitting agency and as such will confine its activity in this Reno affair to the transmission of news dispatches gathered by other agencies and filed with it for delivery to various points."

The Western Union will endeavor to place at the disposal of the public and the newspapers the very best facilities for transmitting their dispatches quickly and accurately, so that people interested in the fight may obtain desired information. A large number of wires are available for such use at Reno, not only on the 4, but at other times. In addition, such extra facilities will be provided as to render convenient the duties of the reporting agencies.

"The regular transcontinental wires normally passing through Reno will be cut at that point. By so doing messages can be sent simultaneously both east and west, thus bringing into service all transcontinental routes. The various ticker services of the Western Union Telegraph Company are for the reporting of quotations and matter of official record. They will not be used for the giving of news descriptions of this prizefight."

CLANTON IS FISH WARDEN

Grants Pass Man Succeeds H. C. McAllister, Resigned.

SALEM, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—The Board of Fish Commissioners today appointed Edward Clanton, of Grants Pass, as Master Fish Warden, to succeed H. C. McAllister, whose resignation, to take effect July 1, was received several days ago.

Clanton has been serving for the past two years as Deputy Warden in District No. 2, which embraces all the territory south of the Columbia River. He has been a life-long Republican and a resident of Oregon, and was endorsed by leading citizens of Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Douglas counties. The Board selected Mr. Clanton out of 20 applicants.

In selecting Mr. Clanton, the Board took into consideration the fact that at this season of year, when all the hatcheries are in operation and just on the eve of the Fall closed-season period, it was an inopportune time to change the policies that had been inaugurated by the retiring head of the department. Inasmuch as Mr. Clanton was strongly in accord with all of Mr. McAllister's methods, it was deemed unwise to appoint a man unfamiliar with the duties.

Henry O'Malley, of Oregon City, at present very busy in making up upward works of the United States Bureau of Fisheries in Oregon, was strongly in favor of the appointment of either Mr. O'Malley or Mr. Clanton. Mr. Clanton was satisfactory to Governor Benson, but when Mr. O'Malley was approached a week ago on the matter, he declined to consider the appointment. He had since changed his mind and was a receptive candidate.

FORGER IS CAUGHT

John Davies, Wanted in Many
Cities, Captured Here.

POLICE GET CONFESSION

Detectives Trace Many Crimes to
"Back Hand" Artist, Who Says

He Has Mania for Crime.

Wife Is Hysterical.

"The most sought-after criminal on the Pacific Coast," is the police description of John Davies, "the back-handed check forger," who was captured yesterday by Detectives Tichenor and Howell. Davies is accused of passing 21 bad checks and committing numerous burglaries in Portland recently, and Detectives Day and Hyde had been after him several weeks. Tichenor and Howell ran across him yesterday and remembering his face, put him under arrest.

After his arrest a search of Davies' home at 252 Sheridan street by the police, revealed jewelry valued at \$300, many suits of men's and women's clothing, burglar tools, and safe cracker's implements. Confessed to this evidence against him, he broke down and reluctantly confessed to the detectives that he had committed crimes ranging from safe burglary to forgery in various cities along the Pacific Coast.

Prisoner Has Crime Mania.

"I had a mania for adventure," he told the police. "Whenever I saw a house which I thought contained anything of value, I planned to enter it and usually did. If I saw a suit of clothes that struck my fancy, I arranged to steal it."

Davies, it is said, worked a very clever check-forging game. His plan was to draw a check for \$15 to \$35, purporting to represent a week's wages. With one of these checks he would appear Saturday evening with face and hands blacked, and clothing begrimed so as to be readily taken for a workman, and cash his supposed wages.

In this way he is said to have raised close to \$1000 in this city. The checks passed here purport to have been drawn by the West Coast Cracker Company, the Columbia River Salmon Company, the Pacific Bridge Grading Company and the Pacific Engineering Company, and range from \$15 up to \$35.

Police Trace Crimes.

While this paper has been giving the police trouble for some time, it was only about six weeks ago that a clew to Davies as the perpetrator was found. A house at 29 East Thirty-fourth street was burglarized, and Detectives Day and Hyde found that the thief had dropped a handkerchief. By the laundry mark on it they traced the crime to Davies. Although not able to catch him, they found evidence which convinced them he was a check operator and kept on the trail. They found he had sent a suit of clothes to a cleaner out of bed to deliver them to him.

His checks Davies is accused of passing in this city are in back-hand writing. Checks of similar style have caused trouble in every city in the West and the detectives are confident that Davies was their author. They have facsimiles of his alleged writing from Los Angeles, Sacramento, and other places. Davies has also been sought by the police in Seattle, Spokane and Tacoma.

Wife Threatens Suicide.

Davies' wife lived with him at the Sheridan-street house. When she learned of her husband's imprisonment, she became hysterical. Declaring she had been deceived by him, she threatened, weeping, to throw herself in the river. So excited did she become that the police have engaged a woman to care for her until her father can be brought from Longmont, Colo.

Proprietors of the Berlin Dye Works at 232 Third street, and the Western Tailoring Company at 273 Eleventh street, last night identified ten suits of the clothing found in Davies' room as garments stolen from their establishments last week. Owners of the jewelry and other loot stolen by Davies have not yet been located.

NEGROES CAN LEAVE POST

For First Time Since Trouble, Col-
ored Troops Get Liberty.

SEATTLE, June 28.—Lieutenant-Colonel S. W. Miller, commander at Fort Lawton, today issued an order permitting the negro soldiers of the Twenty-fifth United States Infantry, stationed here, to leave the reservation. This is the first time the soldiers have been allowed off the reservation since the attack made upon Mrs. J. W. Redding near the post, June 4. Colonel Miller's order was issued today following the receipt of instructions from the War Department. The citizens living in the vicinity of the post are still greatly agitated over the refusal of Secretary of War Dickinson to remove the negro troops from Seattle, but as the Intermountain district is thoroughly policed there is little likelihood of a conflict between the citizens and the soldiers as the latter pass through the district on their way to the city.
