St. Paul and Spokane Only Two Cities to Show Greater Gain. Portland's Increase 41.4.

Portland's bank clearings for the week ending last night showed an increase of 41.4 per cent over the clear-ings for a corresponding week a year ago. Only two cities in the country, according to Bradstreet's bank clear-ings, show an increase more than this city for the week. These are St. Paul city for the week. These are St. Paul and Spokane. St. Paul shows an increase of 51.1 per cent, while Spokane shows an increase of 45.2 per cent.

Last week Portland led all the other cities of the country in relative increase in bank clearings over the corresponding week of last year. The inresponding week of last year. The increase for last week amounted to 73

The bank clearings for Portland this week amount to \$8,544,000. Seattle, with \$10,619,000, shows an increase for the week over a year ago of only 4.1 A few cities show a decrease for the

A few cities show a decrease for the week over the corresponding week of last year. Among these is New York, the decrease being 2.4 per cent. Boston shows a decrease of 9.2 per cent.
