T. R. GIVEN PRAISE

Admiration for Roosevelt Felt
by Apponyi.

IN HIM IS SEEN AMERICA

Distinguished Hungarian Count and
Politician Who Was Colonel's
Host, Declares All Hungary Is
Enthusiastic Over Him.

BUDA PESTH, July 7.—(Special)—Count Albert Apponyi, ex-Minister of Education and the most distinguished Hungarian politician of the day, has given The Oregonian the following statement on Colonel Roosevelt. The Count is peculiarly fitted for giving such an appreciation, as not only was he Colonel Roosevelt's host at Eberhard, but he has also been the ex-President's guest at Oyster Bay. Count Apponyi writes:

"Mr. Roosevelt found a welcome of a peculiar nature in Hungary. In many other countries, surpassing us in wealth and power, he must have felt that a few individuals only greeted him with a proper appreciation of his worth, while people at large simply considered him as a sensation of one day.

Everybody Gives Welcome.

"In Hungary, on the other hand, it was the whole people that received him, with a perfect understanding of the principles and ideals he represents and with a general sympathy grown out of that understanding.

"No nation is better qualified on the European continent to appreciate the great American citizen, because no other nation has such a treasury of political liberty, preserved under circumstances of peculiar hardship and, owing to their hard-won experience, such an insight into the moral forces that enable nations to uphold and to develop liberal institutions.

"We saw in Theodore Roosevelt a representative man of those forces; we welcomed him in that capacity quite as warmly as on account of his well-known regard for our country. We are perfectly aware that we have no business to take sides in American politics. Whether Mr. Roosevelt is a Republican or a Democrat is immaterial to us.

"What made us feel enthusiastic about him was simply the feeling that there we had before us a man who upholds a high moral standard in public life, who makes that standard prevail in a great commonwealth, looked upon by us with a feeling of awe and admiring sympathy, who has done much to bring America into contact with world politics and has used his growing influence in the interests of peace and good will among nations.

In Roosevelt, America Is Seen.

"In a word, we saw America before us. We saw personified what we expect her to be on her own behalf and on behalf of mankind. Of course, our hearts went out to Mr. Roosevelt when we heard from his own lips his warm regard for our country, a regard based on a remarkably accurate knowledge of her history and on a real understanding of her future destiny and tasks. All this was—though perhaps confusedly—felt by the humblest citizen of this country.

"When Mr. Roosevelt honored my country house with his visit, he had to

pass through several villages, the peasantry of which crowded to welcome him without anybody's preparatory direction. These simple villagers felt in some way that our guest represented ideals, the prevailing of which in any part of the world brings some good to them too, because those ideals are apt to spread, like an atmosphere, especially in our time of modern internationalism.

"Such is the philosophy of Mr. Roosevelt's reception in Hungary, and I hope that every American without party distinction feels gratified by the tribute of sympathy paid to his country in the person of a great American citizen. That is, at least, how we should feel on a like occasion. It is our intense desire that Mr. Roosevelt's visit to Hungary should strengthen the moral bond between his country and ours."

HEIRS SOUGHT IN SOUTH

OREGON ESTATE ALLEGED TO
BE IN WRONG HANDS.

Butte Lawyer Asserts Property of
Henry Alexander, of Polk, Is
Unlawfully Claimed.

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 7.—(Special)—L. G. Denny, an attorney-at-law, living in room 5 Mantle block, Butte, Mont., has written the local newspapers and police to ascertain the whereabouts of relatives of Henry Alexander, who died in the Willamette Valley, Polk County, Oregon, recently, leaving quite a fortune.

Denny asserts that several persons in Oregon who are not entitled to the property left by Alexander, estimated in value at \$12,000, are claiming the land and other things left by Alexander, and it is for the reason of keeping them from doing so unjustly that he has written the local police and asked for aid.

He writes that Alexander was born in New Orleans about 1840, ran away to sea, and after two years returned, but after seeing his father, mother and sister through the window, went away and was at sea for several years, enlisted in the Confederate navy, receiving a commission signed by Jeff Davis and Judah P. Benjamin. After the war he went to sea again, went to Australia and made money mining, and finally landed in Portland. He made several thousand dollars mining in Montana and afterwards acquired the property which, it is alleged, the Oregon people are trying to confiscate. So far, the local police and newspapers have not been able to learn anything of Alexander's people.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Shade trees of Washington, known for their number and beauty, are undergoing an attack from a horde of caterpillars. The trees are being stripped of their foliage rapidly. So numerous are the pests that they have baffled the caretakers' efforts to cope with them. Property owners have joined in the attempt to repel the invaders, but it seems that there is little chance to prevail against them. Some fear for the lives of the trees is expressed.

CANNON PLANS RAID

Uncle Joe to Invade Kaw In-
surgent Camps.

OWN CAMPAIGN TO FOLLOW

Speaker Will Aid Representative
Campbell Before Seeking Re-
election—No Danger of Defeat
in Ohio District, He Says.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Invigorated and bronzed by his excursion to Fisher-man's Island in Chesapeake Bay, Speaker Cannon is in Washington finishing up odds and ends preparatory to his departure for Danville.

Mr. Cannon will remain only a few days in Danville this time, for he contemplates a raid into the insurgent territory. It is his purpose to go to Winfield, Kan., and there speak in behalf of the renomination of Representative Philip Campbell, one of the standard Congressmen. "Uncle Joe" will then return to his district, take an automobile, and make a house-to-house canvass. He insists there is not any danger that he will not be renominated and re-elected.

The Speaker was asked today if he would be a candidate again for the Speakership. His eyes twinkled as he recalled the famous recipe for rabbit poeple—first catch your rabbit. In other words the House must be Republican before any thought of candidates arises.

PAYNE SEEKS SEAT AGAIN

Congressman to Campaign in New
York and Elsewhere.

AUBURN, N. Y., July 7.—Representative Sereno E. Payne, chairman of the House ways and means committee, is a candidate for re-election to Congress. In an interview announcing his candidacy, Mr. Payne said last night:

"I expect to be a candidate for re-election and I shall take active part in the campaign, both in New York and elsewhere."

He declined to say what Congressmen he was going to aid in the coming campaign, and in reply to the specific question whether he was going to help Mr. Lodge, he merely smiled and admitted that he had spoken in Massachusetts on other occasions.

"I expect to go wherever they send me," he said.

To the question whether the tariff would be an issue, he answered:

"Yes, the tariff and the good work done in Congress will undoubtedly be the issues everywhere and in this state will overshadow state issues, in my judgment."

"President Taft," Mr. Payne went on, "is to be congratulated for the general results of the first 16 months of his administration. He has achieved more in that period than any President previously. As the people get hold of the facts in regard to the tariff, they are more inclined to accept his first statement, that it was the best tariff law ever enacted."

"There has been a wonderful change of sentiment in regard to the legislation of Congress. In January our opponents were engaged in appointing the committees for next Congress; in March they were contemplating who should be their choice for Speaker; in July, when Congress adjourned, they were wondering whether

after all the next Congress might be Republican."

HADLEY AFTER LYNCHERS

Governor of Missouri Warns Negroes
Not to Provoke Riots.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., July 7.—Governor Hadley offered a reward of \$300 today for the arrest and conviction of every person who engaged in the lynching of two negroes at Charleston last Sunday.

He said there were no excuses for the lynching, as he had not committed a sentence of any person convicted of a capital crime.

In an interview the Governor warned negroes they must not provoke race riots on account of the Jeffries-Johnson fight.

"Negroes have no occasion to feel any satisfaction over the result of that fight," said Governor Hadley. "Its only significance is that a negro prizefighter wiped out a worn-out white prizefighter, who had impaired his constitution by idleness and dissipation."

"Jeffries no more represented the white race than does Johnson represent such men as Booker T. Washington, Professor Dubois. While I propose to do all that I can to protect the negroes in their rights and to prevent and punish acts of violence against them, the negroes must understand that only by their own conduct can they secure the respect of the people."

DISTANT QUAKE IS FELT

Washington Observers Record Se-
vere Shock.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—A severe earthquake shock, continuing from 12:01 to 12:04 this morning, was recorded by the Georgetown University Observatory. The preliminary tremors began at 11:58 o'clock and were followed three minutes later by the heaviest shock. The tremors died away at 12:04. The observers at the university say the earthquake probably was not more than 150 miles distant. The chief motion was east and west and was the heaviest recorded since January 1.

The Weather Bureau today issued a bulletin recording an earthquake at about midnight which is believed to have occurred about 150 miles from Washington, direction not known.

Cleveland Notes Tremor.

CLEVELAND, July 7.—An earthquake apparently nearer and of greater intensity than any other within the last six months was recorded at the St. Ignace College Observatory last night. The preliminary tremors began at 11:25 and the vibrations continued until 11:32. It is estimated that the disturbance was centered about 150 miles distant. The wave motion was east and west.

INCOG SCHEME IS FAILURE

Theodore, Jr., and Bride Drive Old
Horse, but Draw Crowd.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 7.—In the hope that they might escape being the cynosure of all eyes, Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and his bride, passing their honeymoon here, yesterday drove in from Montecito in an old buckboard to which was hitched a scrawny old horse. But it didn't work, and quite a crowd collected while young Theodore held the reins during the time his wife made some purchases.

One rather amusing incident was that Mrs. Roosevelt ran out of money and was compelled to "hold up" her husband, while the curious gazed on. He underwent this ordeal magnificently.

HONOR DUE FULLER

Late Chief Justice Will Be Laid
to Rest Today.

AMERICA PAYS TRIBUTE

During Funeral Services Flags Will
Fall to Half-Mast and Guns Will
Fire by Order of Gen-
eral Fred Grant.

CHICAGO, July 7.—S. S. Gregory and Dr. Samuel M. Moore announced late today that all arrangements were completed for the funeral of the late Chief Justice Fuller. The services will be held at St. James Episcopal Church at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Burial will be in Graceland cemetery.

At the hour the church services begin the flag at the headquarters of the Department of the Lakes on the Federal building will drop to half mast and there remain during the funeral. By order of General Grant 17 minute-guns will be fired at the same hour.

The pallbearers will be Campbell Wallace, Nathaniel L. Francis and Samuel M. Moore, sons-in-law of Justice Fuller, and Melville C. Aubrey.
