

VOTERS TO DECIDE ON 32 MEASURES

Long List of Initiative Petitions Filed With Secretary of State.

SIX COME ON LAST DAY

Bills Affecting Many Interests to Come Up at Next Election.
Work of Checking Lists Is Big Task Now Done.

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—(Special.)—Time for filing initiative petitions closed at 5 o'clock this afternoon and the people of Oregon will be called upon to vote on a grand total of 32 measures at the coming general election. With practically each county having some local legislation coming before it and a great number of precincts voting on the question of wet or dry there will be practically 35 measures to vote on in the majority of precincts.

Of the state measures proposed there are 16 constitutional amendments. There are 25 measures proposed under the initiative and out of the grand total of 32 there are six measures proposed by the Legislature. One of the measures is a referendum of a legislative measure on the question of raising the salary of Judge William Smith in the Eighth Judicial District.

Eight of the measures deal with counties, six of these being proposals for new counties and two of them annexation measures, both of these dealing with Multnomah County. This leaves seven miscellaneous bills proposed under the initiative plan.

Each one of the 32 measures required over 8000 signatures on the petition and many of them had over twice that number, but it was necessary for the force of the Secretary of State's office to check over that number of names before receiving the petition officially.

Ballot numbers have not been given to all of the petitions, but this work will be completed within a few days and the copy for the ballots made ready to send to the County Clerks throughout the state, who have the task of printing the ballots. There were 19 measures for the Clerks to place on the ballots at the last election.

Petitions Filed on Last Day.

Six petitions were filed today. One of these was presented by the Commercial Club and provides ways and means for the creation of new counties, the object of the bill being to place more difficulties in the way of the people. Four measures were filed by the People's Power League by W. S. U'Ren, including a bill to extend the primary, a constitutional amendment providing for election of members of the Legislature by proportional representation, a bill for the inspection of public offices and the publication of an official gazette and a constitutional amendment requiring that three-fourths of a jury may return a verdict in a civil case and generally modifying the system of civil procedure.

A petition was filed by Judge Lionel R. Webster, of Multnomah County, for the Good Roads Association. This is in the nature of a constitutional amendment having for its purpose a larger scope in securing funds for road construction.

Heavy Work Given Voters.

In addition to the six measures filed today the 26 other measures are as follows, ballot titles not being prepared for some of them as yet:

Woman's taxpaying suffrage amendment granting to all taxpayers the right of suffrage.

A bill for the establishment of an Eastern Oregon branch State Insane Asylum.

A bill to elect delegates to a constitutional convention the second Monday in October, 1911.

A constitutional amendment to provide a separate district for the election of each State Senator and each State Representative.

A constitutional amendment to cause taxes to be collected for public purposes only and providing the power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away.

An amendment providing for state railroad building.

An amendment directing a uniform rule of taxation.

An act to increase the salary of the judge of the Eighth Judicial District.

An act to create the county of Nesmith.

A bill to provide for the maintenance of the normal school at Monmouth.

A bill to create the county of Otis.

A bill to annex a portion of Clackamas County to Multnomah.

A bill to create the county of Williams.

An amendment providing for people of each county to regulate taxation and exemptions.

An amendment giving cities and towns control over sale of liquor.

A bill for liability of employers.

A bill to create the county of Orchard.

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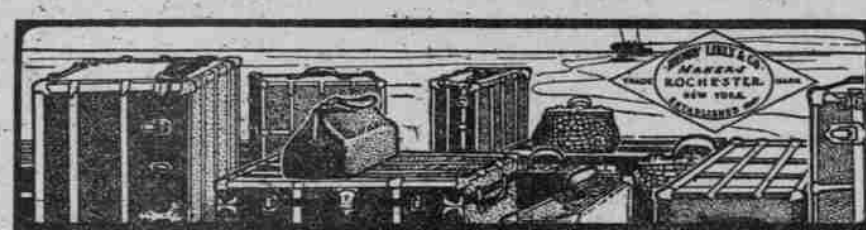

STAND NOT CHANGED

Idaho Candidate for Governor Wants Option Law Tested.

PROHIBITION NOT WANTED

B. F. O'Neill, Republican Leader, Says to Favor State-Wide Cessation of Liquor Traffic Would Be to Discredit His Party.

"My position on the liquor question is in no wise altered. I stand for a thorough testing of the present local option law and believe that any attempt by the next Legislature to secure statewide prohibition is not only undesirable, from the standpoint of those who earnestly desire to remedy the unquestioned evils of the liquor traffic, but is also a political folly for the Republican party," said B. F. O'Neill, Republican candidate for Governor of Idaho, in an authorized interview when his attention was called to the announcement of Governor Brady, made a few days ago, in which the Governor announced that he has decided to stand in the present campaign squarely for statewide prohibition.

"Early in the campaign I stated my position," said Mr. O'Neill, when seen at the Hotel Portland, where he is spending a few days resting. "I have frequently repeated it and shall do so to all who wish to know.

"As a Republican and a state chairman I cannot discredit my party, nor endanger the success of our state ticket, nor the success of any Republican who may be a candidate for either county or Legislative position in any doubtful county by advocating the abandonment of the present local option law before it has been tested. The Republican party made this local option a party measure in Idaho and enacted it into a law, and it is not for me to presume that the party did not comprehend the needs of the state.

Local Option Test Favored.

"Until the party has had an opportunity to speak in its state platform, I shall stand squarely for a thorough testing of the present local option measure. To abandon this law for any kind of a statewide prohibition measure, no matter by whom drawn, seems to me would be unwise for the people of Idaho and more than unwise for the Republican party.

"Such is my position. If a Republican convention representing the

wishes of the people should say that statewide prohibition is desired, I shall gladly bow my head to the judgement of my party. Furthermore, if the legislature of Idaho, representing the people, passes a statewide prohibition bill, thus evidencing that there is sufficient sentiment in favor of such a measure to insure its enactment, I will gladly sign it, if I am Governor.

"On the other hand, as I have repeatedly said, if the Republican convention should declare for the repeal of the local option law, so consistent am I that it is the part of wisdom to give that law a thorough test that I would under such circumstances decline to be a candidate for Governor."

CLAGSTONE FIRST MAN OUT

Former Speaker Enters Race for Governor of Idaho.

BOISE, Idaho, July 7.—(Special.)—Paul Clagstone, of Bonner County, Speaker of the House during the tenth session of the Legislature, is the first candidate for Governor of Idaho to file his declaration and issue a statement of principles.

Mr. Clagstone declares it is his intention to keep within the limit of \$50 fixed for campaign expenses by the primary law and if it is not sufficient for him to cover every county he will return home when the sum is expended.

He advocates a statewide prohibition law but not a constitutional amendment; opposes a platform convention after the primaries; partially indorses the conservation policy of Pinchot, and favors protection of water power sites for the benefit of the state; the passage of an anti-trust law; enactments prohibiting State Land Board members from speculating in Carey act projects and legislation in favor of the farming class.

He pledges his efforts to the relief of those injured by the Washington Water Power Company and to the conducting of an investigation of all Carey act projects in Idaho that all taint of suspicion may be removed from them.

OFFICERS ARE CRITICISED

Examiners Condemn Accounting System in Chehalis County.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 7.—(Special.)—Although the County Commissioners and Treasurer of Chehalis County are sharply criticised for not following the laws regarding their official duties, Treasurer Taylor learns that his shortage is but \$200, according to the report of the state examiners, rather than a shortage of \$2075, reported by a firm of Seattle accountants, whom Taylor recently employed to check his books.

The chief criticism of officials in the examiners' report, made public today by the State Bureau of Inspection and Supervision of Public Offices, are that the Commissioners have neglected actually to make a quarterly check of the Treasurer's cash books; that the board reduced his bond to a sum less than the actual cash he has had on hand, and that the Treasurer has failed to demand surety bonds from banks for the full amount of county deposits.

FARMER IS WARLIKE

Dairy Inspectors Are Met With Armed Resistance.

OFFENDER IS ARRESTED

Officials Say Joseph Stroda's Place Is Unsanitary and When They Try to Get Evidence, He Waves Weapon in Their Faces.

ALBANY, Or., July 7.—(Special.)—Because, with gun in hand, he defied State Dairy Inspectors to arrest him, Joseph Stroda, of Harrisburg, was today bound over to keep the peace. Stroda was arrested upon complaint of Chief Deputy Dairy and Food Inspector Paul V. Maris, of Portland, and Justice of the Peace Swan bound him over here today under a cash bond of \$50.

Deputy Inspector Duncan, of Portland, says he visited Stroda's farm four miles south of Harrisburg and finding unsanitary dairy conditions, made a second visit last week, accompanied this time by Maris. They say they found his cream separator very unclean and started to take some slime found in it as evidence, telling Stroda he would be arrested.

Stroda secured a shotgun, according to Maris' statement, and defied any dairy inspector in the state to arrest him or examine his dairy. Maris came to Albany and made a complaint.

Constable Catlin arrested Stroda at Harrisburg last evening and when brought before Justice Swan here today, he waived examination and consented to give bond without a hearing.
