

STOCK OPERATOR TURNS INFORMER

Arrest of Louis A. Cella for Perjury Follows in Bucket-shop Hearing.

WIRE CONNECTION TOLD

Washington, D. C., Concern Alleged to Be Allied With Jersey City Grain Concern—Others Are Held for Extradition.

NEW YORK, July 14.—Louis A. Cella, the wealthy St. Louis broker, who is accused of having operated a bucket-shop in Washington, was today placed under arrest by United States Marshal Henkle on a charge of perjury.

Cella's arrest followed another surprise sprung by the Government today at the hearing of the bucketshop charges against Cella, his brother Angelo and Samuel W. Adler, who are named in the Federal indictment, on which it is sought to remove them to Washington for trial.

The Government produced as its principal witness Henry Altemus, of Georgetown, O., formerly president of the Standard Stock & Grain Dealers of Jersey City, and before that employed by the Cella Commission Company. Altemus, who was indicted jointly with the Cella brothers and Adler, turned state's evidence, and gave testimony connecting the three defendants with the Standard Stock & Grain Dealers' concern in Jersey City, which was a wire connection with the alleged bucketshop in the District of Columbia.

INSANE FARMER AT LARGE

Sheriff With Warrant Unable to Find John H. Ruble.

ALBANY, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—John H. Ruble, supposedly violently insane, is at large near his farm six miles south of Albany. Officers have been unable to find him.

His wife came to Albany yesterday and obtained a complaint declaring that he is insane. According to her story, Ruble has been acting strangely for three weeks and Tuesday night choked her and threatened to kill her. She escaped after a struggle and fled to the home of a neighbor.

NEWARK MAYOR STEPS OUT

Yields to Town's Desire to Do Its Own House-Cleaning.

NEWARK, O., July 14.—After a conference lasting hours, Mayor Herbert Atherton resigned his office today in response to pressure exerted upon him by leaders of his party and personal friends.

The reason given was that it was hoped thereby to save the city the disgrace of an investigation by the Governor of the lynching last week of an anti-saloon league detective and the subsequent suspension of Mayor Atherton by Governor Pearson.

It was announced that "Newark wants to do her own house-cleaning."

STEWART MENZIES KILLED

Former Portland Engineer Crushed by Dredge Near Dawson.

DAWSON, Y. T., July 14.—Stewart Menzies, master mechanic of the Yukon Gold Mining Company, with large dredging works at Ogishville bridge in the suburbs of Dawson, was killed yesterday by a three-ton dredge which fell across his body while being swung into place by a crane. The chain gear broke. His death was instantaneous.

JAPS PHOTOGRAPH FORTS

Actions of Camera Men Around Harbor Defenses Cause Suspicion.

ASTORIA, Or., July 14.—Three Japanese on the hill near the wireless station were observed taking pictures of the mouth of the river, especially in the direction of Fort Stevens, last Sunday afternoon. From that point with strong glasses a view can be had directly into the forts.

What attracted particular attention was the peculiar camera they were using, as the lens was in what looked like an extension telescope. If it had been for this nothing would have been thought of what they were doing.

Stagedriver Breaks Leg.

EUGENE, Or., July 14.—(Special.)—When about five miles out of Eugene this morning, on a smooth piece of road near Hemenway's Hill, the axle of the heavily-loaded Stinson stage snapped, and the driver, Clifford Flisk, was thrown between the horses and his leg broken by the wagon, which passed over him. Mrs. Joseph Morris, of Mapleton, was slightly injured, but the nine other passengers escaped unhurt. Another wagon took the passengers on toward the Coast and the ambulance brought the driver back to the Eugene Hospital.

representations as to these have been made to the German and British home governments or to Washington, probably because the British and German Consuls are Nicaraguan local merchants.

American Consul-General Eberhardt, who is detained at large and is now in Matagalpa on a tour of inspection, called the State Department today substantiating the reports of alarm of foreign residents. He said the opinion at Matagalpa was that these anti-foreign demonstrations were instigated by the Madriz faction, whose officials openly have threatened Americans and other foreigners.

ALLEGED FILIBUSTER IS HELD

Steamer Utstein Said to Have Cartridges Aboard for Madriz.

MOBILE, Ala., July 14.—Customs officials here today refused clearance papers to the Norwegian steamer Utstein that is ready to sail for Bluefields, Nicaragua. It is alleged she has cartridges on board.

It was brought to the attention of the local customs officials today that 100 boxes of cartridges, said to be destined to the Madriz faction in Nicaragua, had been loaded on the Utstein. These cartridges were shipped by rail to Mobile from New Orleans and were in charge of Dr. Abadi, said to be a representative of General Madriz.

ESTRADA VICTORY RUMORED

Government Steamer Reported Taken by Rebels.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—A report that the steamer Venus, which the Madriz government purchased at New Orleans and outfitted at Greytown as a war craft, following a neutrality fight in the American courts, had been captured by the Estrada forces, was circulated here today, but lacked corroboration at either the State or Navy Departments.

TOP OF HEAD CHOPPED OFF

Miner Killed While Ascending Shaft Alone in Cage.

BUTTE, Mont., July 14.—(Special.)—The top of his head clipped sheer above his ears and brains lacerated and exposed to the eye—such was the death of Thomas Goodman, a miner, this morning.

Goodman was coming up alone in the cage when his head came in contact with the sides of the shaft. His dead body lay limp on the cage floor when it reached the surface.

boom in that the Collector is indorsed by no less a person than William Randolph Hearst. The editor, in an interview cabled from Paris the other day when asked whom he thought the Republicans should nominate, gave it as his opinion that the candidate should be Loeb, "or a man of that stamp, if one like him could be found." Then Mr. Hearst continued to laud Loeb at great length.

The most amusing political confession frankly that they do not understand at what Hearst is driving. Loeb and Hearst are not friends, in fact, it is doubtful if they have ever met. Loeb's interests have always been those of Roosevelt, for he owes all his prominence to the ex-President, and Loeb is not a man who forgets his friends. Why Hearst, who hates Roosevelt so bitterly, should try to boom a friend of his foe, is a mystery not easy to solve.

How Hearst Has Figured.

The most plausible theory is advanced by a newspaper man who has been

through many campaigns. It may not be correct, but it is interesting.

"Hearst does not believe that a Republican can be elected this year," declares the man above referred to, "so Hearst would like to see Roosevelt run and be defeated. He fears, however, that he cannot induce the ex-President to be the 'goat.' So Hearst is doing what he regards as the next best thing. He booms Roosevelt's friend, Loeb."

"If Loeb runs and is defeated, Hearst believes that it will be the worst kind of a black eye for Roosevelt. Hearst is thoroughly convinced that Roosevelt expects to take Taft's place in the White House on March 4, 1912. And if there is anything Hearst can do to prevent it, that particular thing will be done."

State Chairman Timothy L. Woodruff will step down and out as soon as the new committee meets to organize in October. Roosevelt and his allies undoubtedly will control the convention by a heavy majority and the man Roosevelt wants will be named for Governor.

But the question is, can he elect him? Most of the rank and file of the Republicans are sick and disgusted, and would like to see a new deal.

But they have very little use for Murphy and his gang of Tammany pirates. And at the present time Murphy is the Democratic party in the great State of New York.

INJUNCTION IS ISSUED

TACOMA RAILWAY COMPANY WINS POINT.

Five-Cent Fare Fight Made by Suburb Fernhill—Future Action Yet Undecided.

TACOMA, Wash., July 14.—(Special.)—Federal Judge Hanford handed down a decision today granting the petition of the Tacoma Railway & Power Company for an injunction against the people of Fernhill in the five-cent fare fight. Whether 5 or 10 cents is the legal fare the court does not attempt to say, as that question is to be passed on in another suit.

The court says: "It is the right of both parties to have the fare question determined without being vexed and unnecessarily burdened by public clamor or hostile demonstrations interfering with efficient car service."

The police, adds the court, have taken no part except to aid the citizens. The company is ordered to give a receipt for the extra nickel pending decision as to the legality of 10-cent fares.

The company has yet made no further effort to collect more than 5 cents.

Manager Beane states that an attempt will be made in a day or two and that the fares will be collected, although it takes the whole Marshall's force to do it. Since some two weeks ago, when the Fernhillites refused to pay more than a 5-cent fare, and fought all attempts at ejection, the company has been receiving nickel fares and making no effort to collect more. Fernhill leaders tonight have not decided what action they will take, in view of the Federal Court injunction.

LANDIS WARNS JURORS

"BUSINESS INJURY" NO REASON AGAINST INDICTMENTS.

Inquiry Into Violation of Anti-Trust Law by Packers Is Renewed in Chicago.

CHICAGO, July 14.—A special Federal grand jury was impaneled by Judge K. M. Landis in the United States District Court today to hear evidence in regard to the alleged violations of the anti-trust law by the National Packing Company and subsidiary companies.

The jury was cautioned by Judge Landis in his charges to keep their actions wholly free from the influence of the often heard argument that law enforcement would unsettle business.

"You may safely assume," continued Judge Landis, "that no legitimate enterprise needs Governmental acquiescence in the commission of crime. You will treat the statute to which I have referred as being just as much in force as are the laws against stealing letters and counterfeiting coins."

The jury was also told to follow the trail until the "real offenders" were located.

William S. Kenyon, assistant to the Attorney-General, arrived here from Washington today to assist the United States District Attorney in the prosecutions.

CANADA TO CONFER ON FREIGHT RATES

Control of International Business Is Sought Through Commission.

NEW ISSUE IS PRESENTED

Railways Are Now Virtually Immune From Inquiry Where Through

Tariffs Are Involved—Appointment of Knapp Announced.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—An international railroad commission with supervisory authority over the railways of the United States and Canada probably will be the result of an action taken today by this Government in the appointment of Chairman Martin A. Knapp, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, as the representative of the United States to confer with J. B. Mabey, chief of the railway commission of Canada.

Announcement of Judge Knapp's appointment was made by the Department today. The appointments of Judge Knapp and of Mr. Mabey are the results of correspondence between the United States and Canada.

More than a year ago the subject was broached in a letter from Mr. Mabey to Judge Knapp. It was pointed out that the increasing traffic between the United States and Canada would render full control over rates in the future more difficult unless joint action were taken.

New Problems Involved.

It was realized that the acquisition of Canadian terminals by American railroads and of American roads and terminals by Canadian railways presented ever-increasing difficulties. It is not possible to compel railway or express companies to establish joint through rates to and from points in the two countries.

The reasonableness of rates between points in this country and points in Canada also is a question of great importance to shippers. To determine any question as to rates that may arise, it is necessary for the shipper to institute a proceeding before the Interstate Commerce Commission and before the Canadian Railway Commission, and even then the result is uncertain.

International Rates Immune.

The difficulty practically precludes any inquiry by existing tribunals into the reasonableness of through rates, as applied to international traffic. While no arrangements have been perfected for the conference, it is likely that Chairman Knapp and Mr. Mabey will meet in Ottawa in August. It is not improbable a subsequent conference may be held in Washington.

It will be the effort of the representatives of the two governments to adjust matters to make it possible to submit a report before the reconvening of Congress in December.

RATE SUSPENSION PROVIDED

Authority to Be Exercised Cautiously, Commission Says.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—In an official statement, the Interstate Commerce Commission announced today its intention to suspend all tariffs naming general and important rate advances, pending an investigation as to the reasonableness of the proposed increases.

"No more definite statement in this regard can now be made," says the commission, "but the specific orders will be announced from time to time as they are entered and served. It is expected that the suspension in each case will be for 120 days from the effective date named in the tariff, but the commission intends by subsequent orders to provide for making effective on the same day such advances as may be allowed."

It will be incumbent on the railroads to show reasonable cause for the advances they may make in these tariffs from time to time, the burden of proof of the reasonableness of the tariffs bearing on the carriers.

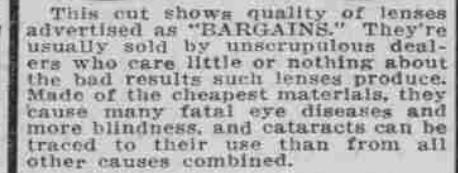
