PORTLAND MAN ACCUSED

H. O. PINSONAULT HELD FOR RAILROAD ROBBERY.

Chance Remark Dropped While Unconscious Gives Clue--Detectives Follow Him.

SEATTLE, July 13.—A chance remark dropped by H. O. Pinsonault, ticket agent at the Everett Passenger station of the Great Northern Railroad, and arrested today on a charge of complicity in the robbery of the station, furnished the clue that finally led to his arrest, according to John Lane, special agent of the Union Depot Company, St. Paul, who assisted the Great Northern detectives in the Everett case.

"The first few words spoken by Pinsonault when he was found, apparently in a state of unconsciousness, were the only clue, but we followed it and succeeded in solving the mystery of the robbery," said Mr. Lane when he arrived in Seattle tonight. "As he was picked up from the floor, where he lay with a badly bruised head, Pinsonault said:

"They knocked me out and robbed the office."

"If the man had been knocked unconscious how did he know that the office had been robbed? We decided to watch Pinsonault. The third day he took a train for Portland and visited the home of Miss Helen Morris, to whom, we learned, he was engaged."

"The detective shadowing him was soon hard at work among a few of the associates of Pinsonault and unearthed an interesting story. According to this detective, Pinsonault had formerly lived in Portland, where he studied for the ministry."

"One day he met Miss Morris and fell madly in love with her. He laid aside his plans for the ministry and made a proposal of marriage to the young woman."

"The detective's investigation proved that financial reasons had prevented the marriage. On his last visit to Portland, soon after the robbery, Pinsonault boasted that he had sufficient funds with which to marry the young woman. Today, as Pinsonault arrived in Everett, he was placed under arrest by the detectives and when confronted with the evidence, made a complete confession."

SANDBAGGING ONLY RUSE

Ticket Agent Confesses He Was in Plot to Rob.

EVERETT, Wash., July 14.—A Great Northern ticket agent named Pinsonault and James Jefferson, each aged 22, and Mrs. B. Smith, proprietor of two restaurants near the Great Northern station, are in the City Jail charged with having robbed the Great Northern ticket office of \$2537 on the night of July 4.

J. S. Delaney, district special agent for the railroad, says that Jefferson, a cook employed by Mrs. Smith, Jefferson declares that he is innocent.

According to Pinsonault's confession, the woman and Jefferson conspired the plan to him and after several weeks of argument convinced him that it was feasible. Pinsonault says that Jefferson, as part of the plot, pretended to sandbag him and took the money.

Fifteen hundred dollars has been recovered and Mrs. Smith says she used \$400 to pay bills.

MAN THOUGHT DEAD, ALIVE

Widow's Attempt to Collect Insurance Leads to His Discovery.

ANACONDA, Mont., July 14.—(Special.)—Daniel Harrigan, a well-known smelter man and prominent resident of Anaconda, whose body was supposed to have been found in Antelope Gulch some time ago, is alive and well in Canada. His widow has, for some time been trying to collect \$2000 from the Modern Woodmen Insurance Company.

The body was badly decomposed, and at the coroner's inquest it was identified positively as Harrigan from the clothes and the teeth. The insurance company, however, asked an investigation and today definitely located Harrigan in the North.

DETROIT, Mich., July 14.—(Special.)—Portland Elks' lodge headquarters continued to be by far the most popular place in all Detroit Wednesday. Through the entire day and evening have these hospitable Portlanders extended the right hand of fellowship and held open house for the Elks of the entire grand lodge. This hospitality has probably done much for Portland and for Oregon. The word Portland means the most generous hospitality displayed by any organization since the grand lodge opened.

During this evening's reception in the headquarters, Harry G. IMPERIAL HOTEL DAMAGED

Bell Boy Awakens Guests When Flames Break Out on 7th Floor.

Albert Finn, 19 years old, a bellboy in the Imperial Hotel, is a hero of Portland today, for the cool-headedness of young Finn accounted for the prevention of a panic and probable fatalities among 300 sleeping patrons in the hotel when a fire broke out between the ceiling of the seventh floor and the roof of the building at 11:30 o'clock Wednesday night.

Despite the precautionary measures taken by the youth in organizing a fire brigade among his co-workers, two women on the fifth floor of the new annex discovered the presence of the blaze and ran through the halls, terror-stricken. Their screams aroused many of the patrons on the upper floors who used good judgment and remained in their apartments until notified from the office by telephone the exact location and possible danger of the blaze.

C. W. Scott, a patron about to retire in room 604, in the old annex of the hotel, smelled smoke. Upon peering into the hall, Scott observed a thick cloud of smoke about the ceiling. He telephoned his observations to the office. Coolly selecting W. D. Wood, another bellboy and Joe Damala, another employee of the hotel, to join him in the search for the fire, Finn and his trio of searchers hastened to the top floor in the elevator.

After alighting from the car the trio encountered a volume of smoke pouring down a narrow stairway to the roof.

Realizing that the flames were seated in the roof, Finn immediately ordered his companions to assist him in unreeing the emergency hose attached to the wall on the seventh floor.

They groped their way up the narrow stairway carrying the cumbersome hose. Upon reaching the roof the volunteer firefighters found tongues of flames bursting through near the north wall on the seventh street side.

Cautioning Wood and Damala to give battle with the flames without sounding an alarm, Finn dashed down to the floor below and turned on the water.

Without even exciting the suspicion of the elevator operator the bellboy descended to the office and summoned the fire department. While awaiting its arrival he "plugged in" to every room in the vicinity of the fire and informed the guests of their danger in anything but an alarming tone.

Fire Chief Campbell took personal charge of the firemen, who did admirable work in checking the progress of the flames. The hole 20 feet square was burned in the roof by a blaze supposed to have originated from crossed electric wires. The loss is estimated at \$1000, fully covered by insurance.

PARIS TO HAVE NEW CLUB

Society to Dispel Loneliness of Foreigners Bent on Study.

PARIS, July 14.—(Special.)—Club life in Paris is one of the interesting developments of the time. Until recently there were no such institutions for the man of moderate means, but philanthropy, have a taste for sport have changed all that.

The Vicomte Rene de Montozon Brachet, a young man of excellent lineage, has just started a club on novel lines so far as France is concerned. It holds out the hand of fellowship to the young foreigner resident in this city for the purpose of study or otherwise. Art exhibitions, concerts, and lectures will bring the young men into contact with the elite of Parisian society. There will be no more excuse for being lonely.

The club premises are situated at 13 Rue de Bayeux, in the Mont Parnasse region, which is peopled so largely by the art miss and the raw young man, with notions of paint, from the Western wilds of America. Among the patrons of this interesting work are Edmond Rostand, the Duchesse de Rohan, and Mme. Huilleit Adam, the well-known woman journalist and writer.

LABOR TO FIGHT LORDS

PARTY INSISTS ON CONTEST AGAINST VETO POWER.

Efforts to Make Truce Between Liberal and Unionist Leaders Are Cause of Dissatisfaction.

LONDON, July 14.—(Special.)—The Labor party is much dissatisfied with the attempts of the Liberal and Unionist leaders to patch up a compromise on the House of Lords veto question.

Speaking on Saturday at an Independent Labor demonstration at Burghley Brooke Park, near Loughboro, Mr. Phillip Snowden, M. P., remarked that with respect to the House of Lords' question it did not matter for the purpose of practical politics whether or not the Government was in earnest about it. The Labor party was in earnest. If it should turn out that the government did not prosecute this campaign to a conclusion which would forever take away the power of that institution to oppose the democratic will, then the Labor party would have something to say about it, and so would the people. He believed that if the government conceded one single inch from the conditions embodied in the resolutions in the House of Commons, if there were an agreement between the representatives of the Liberal party and the Unionist party for what they called a

settlement of the constitutional question which allowed the House of Lords to retain the shadow of veto power over financial measures or a permanent veto upon general legislation, then the Liberal party was dead without the hope of resurrection.

"I am bound to say," he went on, "I am sorry that there is going to be any political conference. I am sorry that there is going to be any attempt made even by the two front benches to meet and discuss and bargain and try to find common standing ground. If there is going to be a conference, as a member of the Labor party I deny the right of the two front benches to settle it. There are no other benches."

"I am not saying that the Labor party even if it were invited, would take part in the consideration of the matter. If the conference is to be held, it ought to be a House of Commons conference, and not a Parliamentary conference."
