

## L. G. CLARKE URGED AS STATE SENATOR

Widely-Known Business Man Will Run if Assembly Gives Indorsement.

### FITNESS IS CONCEDED

Sam Martin, Candidate for Auditor, Asks Assembly Recommendation. Final Preparations for Meeting Being Made.

Another substantial name was added yesterday to the list of those who are to be brought up for consideration by the Republican county assembly tomorrow in connection with the legislative ticket. That of Lewis G. Clarke, widely known business man and member of the Mayor's Executive Board. He is urged as the successor in the State Senate to S. C. Beach, whose term expires this year.

Friends and leading Republicans have been suggesting to Mr. Clarke for some time that he authorize the presentation of his name before the assembly, believing his chances excellent of receiving the recommendation of that body. On account of the press of private business he was reluctant to consider the matter at first. He announced yesterday that while not a candidate for the place, yet the assembly's recommendation would suffice to draw him into the race.

### Success Is Predicted.

While several other names doubtless will be brought before the assembly in the same connection, it is predicted in many quarters that Mr. Clarke's candidacy will spell success for him. He is widely known personally and by business reputation. Attention is called to the fact by his friends that during the 21 years of his residence in Portland he has achieved marked success in the wholesale and retail drug business, being now senior partner in one of the largest firms of the kind in the United States. Aside from that, his interest in public enterprises has been unflagging. He has taken little or no part in politics up to this time.

Few additional names have developed within the past 24 hours in connection with the various county offices. Willis Fisher, well known as a traveling man, has become active in the campaign, his aspirations for the County Clerkship. His name will be presented before the assembly.

Sam Martin, aspirant for the position of County Auditor, made it known yesterday that he desires his name placed before the assembly. Mr. Martin has a strong following, and has been a candidate for the Auditorship several weeks. He had not made known before, however, his position with reference to the assembly. Mr. Martin is chief deputy in the tax collecting department of the Sheriff's office and has a long list of indorsements. His chief contestant for the assembly recommendation is Captain H. U. Welch, who is serving out the unexpired term of Auditor Brandes, resigned.

### Ellis Runs for Justice.

Another aspirant for Justice of the Peace developed in Congressman T. Ellis. He sent a circular letter yesterday to the various precinct delegates asking that they consider his name, and be given to his name at the assembly.

In the effort to get the best possible material for recommendation to the voters of the county, it is said to be likely that in several instances men not avowedly out for office will be brought into the race, and the widest range shall be given in the deliberations as to best material for office.

Final preparations are being made for the holding of the assembly in the morning. A force of men was put to work yesterday working the ward and precinct sections. This work will be completed today.

A meeting of the County Central Committee will be held at a Republican headquarters tonight, when the work that has been done in the precincts towards getting out a full representation will be considered. No final election is expected in the event that one or two outlying precincts, not yet heard from, fail to act. The precincts will merely be cut off from representation, and the neglect will be attributed to lack of attention to civic duties on the part of the scattered electors therein.

### REED DELEGATION REJECTED

New Mass Meeting to Be Held Tonight in Precinct 79.

Protests from Republican electors in Precinct 79 at the delegation fraudulently put through by the notorious Ferdinand Reed, a leader of the anti-assembly forces, last Saturday night, resulted in the throwing out of the whole delegation yesterday. A call was issued on petition from several scores of electors in the precinct for another mass meeting, which will be held tonight at 8 o'clock at 480 Union avenue. This action was taken by J. F. Kennedy, chairman of the Republican County Central Committee, after the chairman of the precinct committee, L. G. Cole, had refused to issue certificates to the delegation as put through by Reed. An additional factor in bringing about the summary action was the complaint that the delegates were shut out from attending the meeting, which was ended by Reed and a band of his accomplices within 10 minutes of the time set for the opening of the meeting.

Since the Reed raid on the mass meeting, protests have been made daily to headquarters by the electors of Precinct 79, but the County Central Committee was loth to act. The refusal of Chairman Cole, however, to sign the certificates left the precinct with the prospect ahead of no delegation, and the petition for another meeting followed and was allowed. The delegates objected to Reed, Jess C. Moore and Guy F. Haines. These men suspiciously resembled good clothes and apparently had plenty of money. He will be arrested and made to work. ### PIONEER OF 1852 DIES

Injury and Old Age Cause Death of Mrs. Lorena Ann Owings.

Mrs. Lorena Ann Owings, an Oregon pioneer of 1852, died on Saturday, July 10, at the home of her son, John S. Owings, at Elliott Prairie. She had suffered two years from and injury sustained in a fall, during which time she was almost entirely helpless. The injury, together with old age, was the cause of death. She was buried in the Hubbard Cemetery.

Mrs. Owings crossed the plains with her parents, arriving in the Willamette Valley in 1852. In the Autumn of 1853 she was married to Charles Henry Owings. Soon after their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Owings settled on Elliott Prairie. Mr. Owings died eight years ago.

Mrs. Owings leaves one daughter, Mrs. Casto, and three sons, George, John and William, all residents of Elliott Prairie.

Young Man and Bride Reported Traveling Under Assumed Names.

"Registering under the names of Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Miller, of Buffalo, N. Y., Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., were at the Portland Hotel Monday and Tuesday. It was said last night. Their identity was disclosed by a patron of the hotel who says that he saw a telegram from Colonel Roosevelt to his son.

They arrived Monday and were assigned to room 408. There was nothing out of the ordinary in their appearance and manner and little attention was paid to them. A telegram received from San Francisco yesterday said that the young Roosevelts had recently taken a bungalow at Miramar, a suburb of Santa Barbara.

Since their marriage a few weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Roosevelt have been sojourning in California. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., has shown his desire to avoid publicity on numerous occasions by traveling under an assumed name and by his frank statements to newspaper men that he wishes to be let alone.

## SITE IS UNSETTLED

Belief Is Postoffice Will Be Retained at Old Location.

### KIND OF WORK CHANGED

Postmaster Says Government May Keep Present Structure and Build Anew Near Depot for Distributing Center.

Information received by Postmaster C. B. Merrick yesterday leads to the conclusion that the Government has no intention of abandoning the present buildings at Sixth and Morrison streets when the new building shall have been located and constructed upon the site for the purchase of which \$500,000 was appropriated by the last Congress. Under plans now being considered by the postal authorities the present building will be retained as a station. Translocation of postal business will take place in the same manner that it is now being conducted. The new building, with the exception that the distribution of the mails and the work incident to the sending out of the collections musty over the city from hour to hour, will be handled at the new building.

"I have ascertained something as to the recent methods adopted by the United States in large cities where new postoffices have been considered," said Mr. Merrick, "and because of the intense interest in the selection of a site for our new office, I feel that it may be properly passed along. The supposition that the Government may pay the \$500,000 now available as a part of the cost of a site, and await further appropriations by Congress is apparently never followed. The Treasury will either secure the site without more cost to the Government, or nothing will be done at present."

### Sites Near Depot Preferable.

"I am informed that it is now considered preferable to erect postoffices as close to the railway stations as ground can be secured, and that in all probability when the agent of the Treasury Department comes here to select a site from the list of bids to be submitted on or before August 2, he will pay but little attention to any consideration except the best interest of the Government and the most economical manner of handling the mails.

"Portland is being considered as one of the largest distribution points for the Government and the best interest of the Government is being provided for in the future. In other cities where the same reasoning applies the new buildings have been located as close to the depot as possible. In St. Louis, Chicago and New York, where new sites have been recently purchased, I am informed that the buildings have been placed just across the streets from the depots.

"It also appears that a certain style of architecture has been adopted for the buildings in the larger cities. It consists of a low building, never more than six stories in height, but preferably much lower. The distribution and mailing quarters will be on the ground floor, covered by an arched glass roof, and the administrative offices will be located on the upper floors. The building should be understood that I am only pointing out the tendencies of the Government in these matters, and in no way presuming to speak for the Secretary of the Treasury or his chief architect."

### Local Architects Want Chance.

Information received yesterday leads to the belief that Portland architects will not be seriously considered in the competition for designing and constructing the building. An effort has been started to invoke the Tawney law, an act of Congress which throws open work for local designers. It is charged that not a single building has been erected by architects outside of a small ring of Easterners during the past several years. It is explained that the men composing the clique have become exceedingly expert in the construction of the particular type of building favored by the chief architect of the Treasury, the materials used and the features which are considered essential. A well known Portland architect said yesterday: "It would be flattering should a Portland designer secure the contract,

but there is no doubt but that such a procedure would delay the completion of the structure at least two years. Being a new man, the architect would not have the confidence of his chief at Washington, and samples of every item of material would be called in there for testing. It might require months to settle upon one character of material alone. Then the Government is beginning to carry on these operations in a good deal the same manner that a private corporation does. They have their ideas and are not apt to take kindly to new ones."

### SOL BLUMAUER ARRAIGNED

Charge Against Him of Violating Traffic Ordinance Dismissed.

Sol Blumauer, a prominent merchant, was arraigned in Police Court yesterday on a charge of violating the traffic ordinance. It was alleged that he had driven his automobile through a crowd which was attempting to board a car at Fifth and Washington streets. The complaining witness was St. J. Litter, an electrical engineer, who testified that the crowd was divided and part of it forced close to the side of the car, when the automobile passed through. His testimony was supported by that of J. S. Randolph.

Blumauer and his chauffeur said the car had not yet come to a stop when they passed it. Judge Bennett dismissed the case, saying that as there were an equal number of witnesses on each side, he would take into consideration the fact that Blumauer's chauffeur had been prominent in aiding the police to act against speed maniacs.

An attempt was made by Blumauer to get a warrant for the arrest of Randolph, whom he accused of cursing the chauffeur, but a warrant was refused him.

### KANSAS CROP 75 PER CENT

Topeka Man Declares Spring Frosts Did No Damage.

"Kansas will have a 75 per cent wheat crop," said J. R. Clouser, of Topeka, Kan., yesterday, at the Oregon Hotel. "The heavy frost that destroyed crops in the West has sunk a hole to a depth of 650 feet without meeting with any serious mishap. The indications thus far are encouraging, as a slight sum of oil comes up as the water is pumped from the well. ## CUMMINGS IS DUE

President of Hibernians Will Arrive in City Tonight.

### 10,000 ARE EXPECTED

Head of Irish Order Will Be Met at Vancouver and Escorted to City in Rose-Laden Car—First Function Will Be Sunday.

Mathew Cummings, National president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, and his corps of assistants will be in Portland tonight. The party will be met at Vancouver by the members of the Portland executive committee and will be transferred to a rose-laden private car. On arrival at the Grand Central Station in this city, the Hibernians will be taken to the Imperial Hotel, where headquarters have been prepared for their occupancy during the next week.

On the train which brings President Cummings to Portland will be several hundred members of the Pennsylvania and other Eastern delegations. After today every train arriving in Portland will be met by the reception committees of the convention and before the convention is called to order next Tuesday morning, approximately 10,000 visitors will be quartered in the city.

The alumni of the Christian Brothers' College have announced the first feature of the week of meetings, to occur Sunday night at the Armory, when the noted Father Peter Yorke, of San Francisco, will lecture. Father Yorke has become interested in labor problems and is one of the best known speakers of California. His subject will be "The Pope, an Independent Ruler." Judge W. M. Gates will preside.

The announcement of the lecture has caused preparations for an excursion into rich red woods and natural scenery from Salem. The electric train will be in charge of Rev. A. Moore and Colonel Hofer and will return to Salem the same evening. Large crowds from other cities are expected at the meeting. Preparations were yesterday completed for the pontifical high mass to be celebrated on Tuesday morning at St. Mary's Church by Archbishop Christie. The musical programme will be given by a monster choir made up from singers from all Catholic churches in the city.
