

UGLY CHARGES ARE NOT TO BE DOWNTOWN

Mass of Graft Evidence Will Enter Into Testimony at Rawn Inquest.

HOME IS PUT UNDER GUARD

Dead Monon President Leaves All His Property, Worth Millions, to His Wife—One Graft Claim Now Said to Be Settled.

CHICAGO, July 25.—(Special.)—With the discovery today that a mass of evidence involving the Illinois graft cases will be injected into the testimony heard at the Ira G. Rawn inquest tomorrow evening, it became known that a cash settlement of another of the road's graft claims is under consideration and may be made shortly.

This new settlement is of a claim of \$750,000 against the Ostermann Manufacturing Company and because of the situation this evening it was expected that the hearing of evidence before Master in Chancery Taylor will be postponed when called tomorrow "till an agreement had been reached between the principals concerned."

Meanwhile members of the Rawn family were surprised by a curt notification from Samuel H. Greeley, president of the Winnetka village board, that he would take charge of the Rawn family home, where the tragedy occurred. With this notification was an equally terse assertion that Mr. Greeley was "firmly convinced evidence was being suppressed" concerning Mr. Rawn's death.

Rawn Leaves All to Wife.

The day's developments were rounded out by the discovery that Mr. Rawn had left a will in which his wife, Mrs. Florence Willis Rawn, is made sole beneficiary and executrix. While there was no schedule of property filed in the document, it was learned that the estate is valued at something over \$1,000,000.

Another significant development was the announcement that President Lovett had started for Chicago, presumably to attend the Rawn inquest. The scheduled settlement of the claim against the Ostermann Manufacturing Company, now the Ostermann Car Company, is the second in the history of the \$1,500,000 car repair graft investigation.

The other settlement was that made by the Blue Island Rolling Mill & Co. Company, against which the Illinois Central had a claim of \$600,000. It is said the settlement was for about this sum.

Insurance Aggregates \$135,000.

Frank B. Harriman, former official of the Illinois Central, who was to have been examined before a master in chancery tomorrow, started today with his wife for a ten-day automobile trip. Servants at the house did not know where the Harrimans had gone.

Stories of renewals of life and accident insurance policies and the taking out of new insurance by Mr. Rawn within the last few weeks before his death were refuted today, when it was learned just exactly what his accident policies are, and the dates on which they were renewed. The policies foot up \$110,000 and with accumulations, which are the same as "paid up insurance" in life policies, aggregate \$135,000. The insurance men who have handled Mr. Rawn's policies declare that he was considered a good risk, and although he carried more accident insurance than any man in Chicago, could have secured \$100,000 more with ease.

DISTANCE TO COAST CUT

Burlington Prepares to Shorten Route Through Montana.

HELENA, Mont., July 25.—That the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railway Company is about to build an important cutoff, which will result in a saving of more than 100 miles in its St. Louis-Puget Sound line, is indicated by the action of the board of directors filed with Secretary of State Yoder today.

The resolution authorizes the building of an extension of its line from Benton, Carbon County, to the Northern Pacific line at Fromberg, and the president of the company is instructed to proceed at once with its construction, the estimated cost being \$1,000,000. The resolution also directs the tearing up of the line between Toluba and Scribner, a distance of 70 miles.

While the new extension is only 30 miles long, it will give the Burlington an all line into Laurel, where it connects with both the Northern Pacific and Great Northern and over both of which it runs daily trains to the coast.

PLAYERS REACH TACOMA

Margaret Illington's Company Hears First Reading of Play.

TACOMA, Wash., July 25.—(Special.)—Twelve actors who will appear in support of Margaret Illington when she returns to the stage next month, arrived yesterday from New York and tonight at the Tacoma Hotel, the first reading of the new play, "Until Eternity," took place. Rehearsals will begin at once.

Those who will appear in the production are: Walter Edwards, Nina Morris, Ella Vane, John D. Barry, Edward Elmer, Zillah Shannon, Inez Shannon, Florence Timpani, Melvina Rowland, Daniel Lyons, James Derby and Gabrielle Ross.

James Ross, who will act as treasurer of the company, has arrived in the New York with the players. The scenery and costumes will arrive as soon as they have been completed.

SALEM TO HAVE BOULEVARD

Paved Thoroughfare Will Extend to State Fair Grounds.

SALEM, Or., July 25.—(Special.)—The City Council tonight decided to start work tomorrow on a boulevard to the State Fair Grounds along Capital street. The street through the residence section will be paved with bitulith and near the limits will be macadam.

The present work will extend to Madison street, it being impossible to reach the Fair Grounds until certain property which blocks the roadway is condemned. Present construction work will be at an expense of nearly \$10,000.

MILITIA ON GUARD

Grand Trunk Strike Situation Well in Hand.

NO NEW OUTBREAK SEEN

Indiana National Guard Keeps Watchful Eye on Strikers and Sympathizers at South Bend.

Trains Run by Gun Right.

STATION IS OPENED.

The South Bend station was opened today, after having served as an emergency police station and hospital throughout the night. When train service was entirely abandoned yesterday, the station was closed and locked and kept in readiness for the confinement of possible prisoners or victims of the mob.

The road's two westbound trains last evening were delayed just outside the city so long that the passengers and mail were taken off and the trains were unloading. The Lehigh Valley westbound express train, due at 6:05 o'clock, after it had stood on a siding east of the city for about seven hours.

Louis Freel, a strikebreaking car-painter, who was shot by a railroad detective yesterday, will die, according to word from Epworth Hospital this morning.

STRIKE SOLUTION IN SIGHT

Grand Trunk Trouble Over May Be, If Protection Is Given.

MONTREAL, Can., July 25.—Solution of the Grand Trunk strike problem is now in sight, according to the company's officials. It neither includes arbitration, nor any further negotiations with the conductors and trainmen. The only essential is adequate protection of the company's property and employees, especially those who have taken the places of strikers.

The railroad officials began the week with an ambitious programme. It was announced that freight of all kinds would be accepted for immediate shipment.

The shops at various points, closed a week ago, were reopened today. Practically all the 1000 employees returned to their places.

Several minor wrecks, alleged by the railroad officials to be due to tampering with switches by unauthorized persons and declared by strike leaders to have been accidents resulting from the handling of trains by inexperienced men, have been called to the attention of the authorities.

The local militia at Brockville, which has been a storm center, is said not to be doing satisfactory protective work. The City Council is expected to request the Government to send a detachment of regulars from Kingston.

Hodcarriers Go on Strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—The hod-

carriers of this city struck today as a result of the refusal of the Association of General Contractors to grant their demand for an eight-hour day.

Between 600 and 700 men are out, and about 1000 bricklayers have been forced to quit work in consequence of the strike. It was stated at the office of the Building Trades Council that the trouble would probably be adjusted very soon. A meeting of contractors to consider the situation has been called.

WHAT IS INSURGENCY?

Murdoch Calls It Movement to Put Nation in Hands of People.

EXCELSTON SPRINGS, Mo., July 25.—

"What is insurgency?" This question was asked this morning of Representative Victor Murdoch, of Kansas, who is here trying to recover a voice lost speaking in Kansas.

"The movement," Mr. Murdoch said, "purposes to take this Nation out of the hands of the special interests and put it into the hands of the people. It is not a movement to imperil property. It is not a movement to tear down the individual. It is, first of all, a movement to protect property, to build up the individual and expand and uplift the democracy."

"On one side is the Kansas idea, on the other side the Rhode Island idea, the standpoint, standpoint state idea."

OKLAHOMA CITY HAS 64,205

Growth of New State Capital 540 Per Cent, in Ten Years.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Oklahoma City, to which Governor Haskell moved the capital of Oklahoma, from Guthrie, has had the remarkable growth of almost 540 per cent in 10 years, according to figures enumerated in the 13th census, which were made public by Director Durrant, of the Census Bureau, today.

The present population is 64,205, an increase of 54,168 since 1900, and an increase of 13,723, or 21.8 per cent since 1907, when a special census showed 32,482.

Ardmore, Okla., decreased in population, it having had 8759 inhabitants in 1907, while in 1910 there were only 8618.

LOVE LAUGHS AT JAIL BARS

Accused Bankrobber Marries Companion of His Flight.

PHILADELPHIA, July 25.—John R. Marshall, better known as "Darby Moulton," under arrest here for alleged connection with the looting of the National City Bank of Cambridge, Mass., this afternoon was married in the office of his attorney to Eleanor Holliday, who was his companion in his flight from Cambridge.

Marshall and his wife left tonight in custody of a Deputy United States Marshal for Boston, where Marshall will stand trial.

NEGRO WOMAN CARRIED OFF

Notorious Resort Keeper Thought Drowned by Mob.

MONROE, La., July 25.—Unidentified men broke into the City Jail here early today and carried off Laura Porter, a negro woman prisoner, keeper of a resort where white men are reported to have been robbed on several occasions.

It is generally believed she was thrown into the Ouachita River and drowned. The Porter woman had been warned to leave town many times prior to her recent arrest for larceny. Officers declared they had unearthed a conspiracy which showed that the woman had lured intoxicated white men to her resort where they were beaten and robbed by negroes.

Fire Wipes Out Nevada Town.

WADSWORTH, Nev., July 25.—Fire, which started shortly before 12 o'clock last night, wiped out the town of Wadsworth, 35 miles east of Reno, causing a loss estimated at \$50,000. Nearly every building in the place was destroyed. The entire business district was burned and the only buildings left standing were a few frame buildings on the outskirts of the town and the Southern Pacific depot.

KANSAS CITY, July 25.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt will be a visitor at Kansas City from noon until midnight on September 1, according to a message received from him by E. Mont Kelly of this city. Colonel Roosevelt's message said that he would be at the "disposal of his hosts."

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HOT WINDS BLAST SHOOT BEST CROPS

Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Arkansas Shriveled Under Burning Sun Rays.

BREEZE AFFORDS RELIEF

Prostrations and Deaths Few Despite Record-Breaking Temperatures

All Over Missouri and Red River Valleys.

KANSAS CITY, July 25.—Intense heat was experienced here today and in almost every section of the Missouri River and Red River Valleys. The Southwest is being swept by a heat wave which is the most oppressive of the summer, and from all points come reports of record-breaking temperatures. Numerous prostrations and one death have been reported as due to the heat in this section, and these figures are small only because a breeze has been moving, affording some relief to persons, but doing an inestimable damage to crops.

Losses to farmers from the blistering sun rays will be great. Corn crops throughout Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas have suffered greatly and the cotton crop in the Southwest is now beginning to be affected. Peach crops in Arkansas, which were thought promising, will not yield a half of the expected amount, and a continuation of the present hot spell will do even greater damage.

Breeze Saves Great Suffering.

Locally the temperature stood at 100 at 4 o'clock this afternoon, this being the hottest day of the summer in this city. Constant breezes, however, relieved the situation and few prostrations were reported as taking place here. The heat continued all day. Three prostrations early in the day, before the breeze started, caused fear of great suffering before the day was ended.

At Topeka the Government thermometer registered 104 in the shade. The winds were very hot and great showers of crops is reported. This temperature is one degree above the record for the summer. At Joplin, Mo., the thermometer registered 107 degrees in the shade, this being the highest in several summers. The first death from heat this season in that town occurred today, when Benjamin Shumaker, 88 years of age, a retired merchant, succumbed as a result of over-exertion in the sun.

Hot Winds Sweep Oklahoma.

Even higher temperature is reported from Guthrie, Okla. There the mercury climbed to 111 in the shade and to 123 in the sun. Hot winds continued all day, doing great damage to crops, but despite the great heat no prostrations were reported.

This hot wave was by no means local in Oklahoma, but extended all over the state. At Oklahoma City the thermometer reached 101 at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, this being the hottest day of the year there. A registration of 109 degrees is reported from Sapulpa.

Forest Fire Gets Fresh Start.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 25.—(Special.)—Instead of being under control, as reported yesterday, the timber fire on the North Fork of Sprague River now presents a more serious aspect than ever. Although the rain of a few days ago put a slight check on the blaze, it has broken out afresh. More than 50 men are fighting the fire, which is reaching over new territory and now threatens to do a large amount of damage. An extra crew of men went out from this city today to assist in trying to get the blaze under subjection.
