

## ABRAHAM IS AFTER GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

State Senator Announces He Will Oppose Bowerman for Nomination.

## ORGANIZATION IS FAVORED

Roseburg Man Will Make Active Campaign, Making Speeches in Important Cities of State. Stand on Legislative Record.

State Senator Albert Abraham, of Roseburg, has joined the list of aspirants for the Republican nomination for Governor, making the number four that are now opposing Jay Bowerman, the assembly candidate. Mr. Abraham, who was in Portland yesterday, said that he would file his statement of candidacy within a few days. It will be as follows:

"If I am nominated and elected I will, during my term of office, strive to uphold the constitution and laws of our state and of the United States, and to maintain the blessings of liberty, peace, honor, harmony and prosperity for all the people; to secure and maintain truly representative government as among the best means of attaining such ends, truly representative party organization as the best means of securing representative government, and the primary plan as favored by Governor Hughes, President Taft and ex-President Roosevelt as the best means yet devised of securing truly representative party organization."

The candidates in addition to Bowerman and Abraham are now Grant B. Dimick, E. Hofer and George J. Cameron.

## Indorsement Not Sought.

While favoring the continuance of party organizations and indorsing the Hughes plan of recommending candidates to the party, Mr. Abraham did not seek the assembly indorsement.

"About a week before the state assembly was held in Portland," said Mr. Abraham yesterday, "I gave out an interview in which I said that if the assembly discussed available candidates for Governor with the object of naming the best man and was free from combinations and accomplished its professed object, I should not become a candidate, but that if it did not do these things I might enter the contest. I have now announced my candidacy."

"My attitude during the campaign will be somewhat different from that of the others who are engaged in the contest against Mr. Bowerman, for I am a firm believer in the maintenance of party organization. I believe that the method proposed in the Hughes-Roosevelt-Taft primary bill in New York is the right procedure. That provides for primary elections to name the delegates who make the recommendations and also provides a means of bringing out other candidates by petition. Such a plan would result in the nomination of the strongest men and enable the overthrow of candidates who might secure committee or assembly recommendation by improper means. I do not look upon the recent assembly as having been representative of the people. It nominated the strongest available man for Governor not as having deliberated with the view of selecting the best man for Governor."

## Comparisons Will Be Made.

"I shall make a platform campaign, speaking in all the principal places in the state, and in my addresses I will make comparisons between my record and that of Mr. Bowerman in the Legislature on matters of importance to the state."

"My chief aim shall be to cement the Republican party and with the party welfare in view, I believe I am logically the strongest candidate. If nominated, I would receive the votes of all true friends of the assembly movement and of maintenance of party organization, while if Mr. Bowerman were nominated, I believe he would have serious opposition from within the party."

"I believe it is incumbent upon a candidate for Governor to get before the people that they may judge his qualifications. If after meeting me, the voters decide that I am not the strongest candidate in the field, no one will be better satisfied than I."

"Personally, Mr. Bowerman and I are friendly, and I shall not make it a personal campaign other than to discuss his public record in the state Senate. I am not yet ready to make a statement as to what legislative matters I shall discuss during the campaign."

"I do not believe that the number of candidates opposed to Mr. Bowerman will have any material effect on the result, for the contest will finally resolve itself into a battle between him and his strongest opponent. It has been established in primary campaigns that the people will not vote for a man who, they believe, has no chance of securing the nomination."

State Senator Abraham is nearly 41 years old and is therefore six years the senior of Acting Governor Bowerman, but he does not look older. He is a native of Oregon, having been born in Douglas County. For four years he studied law in the office of Joseph Simon in Portland and for six years after his admission to the bar, in 1892, practiced law in this city. From here he removed to Roseburg, where he now has his law office. Mr. Abraham is the son of Sol Abraham, who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1855 and became one of the well-known pioneer merchants of the state. The senior Abraham took an active part in politics in Oregon, but never sought office. Albert Abraham was elected to the state Senate in 1908.

## ENCAMPMENT IS SOUGHT

M. L. Pratt Believes G. A. R. May Meet Here in 1912.

M. L. Pratt, past department commander for Oregon G. A. R., and member of Summer Post No. 12, is in favor of taking up the movement to secure for Portland the National encampment for 1912. He thinks that no time should be lost in getting the matter under way, so it can be presented to the National encampment, which meets at Atlantic City September 13.

"I am sure that we can secure the National encampment either in 1912 or 1913," said Mr. Pratt yesterday. "If we make the right showing at the meeting of the encampment at Atlantic City in September, many thousands of badges ought to be printed bearing the words 'Portland in 1912,' and have them worn by the delegates at the encampment during the session. This will call attention to Portland as the

prospective meeting place. If we should not get the encampment in 1912 I am sure it would come to Portland in 1913. The importance of the encampment is worth to Oregon and to Portland all the cost in money and efforts that could be put forth. A considerable sum would have to be raised to finance the matter. I think that the Legislature would make an appropriation and that, with what could be raised in Portland, would finance the session."

"Some of the comrades I have talked with fear that not enough money could be raised, but I think it can be raised when it is understood that the National encampment is one of the greatest conventions in the United States. A least our delegates to the National encampment should start the movement and take badges with them worded as I have indicated. The commercial bodies, in my judgment, can do nothing fraught with so much importance to Portland as to assist in this movement."

Portland Y. M. C. A., who returned to this city yesterday. Mr. Clark reports that there are now 33 boys in the camp and that 73 have spent one or more weeks each, there this month. He will return within the next few days.

The trip out was made earlier than was planned because of a minor accident suffered by Miss Hazel Raber, of Corvallis, a guest of Mrs. Clark at the camp. While descending Mount St. Helens with a party of 20 last Saturday, Miss Raber broke one of the small bones in her wrist. She was coasting down a sharp incline near the foot of the mountain when she struck a rock and was slightly bruised, besides the injury to her wrist. This is the first accident that has occurred in the Y. M. C. A. camp. Mr. Clark says that reports sent out that several of the boys had narrow escapes on the sides of St. Helens were erroneous. As a matter of fact, he says, no boy has ever been injured on the Y. M. C. A.'s Summer "hikes," and every precaution is taken against accident.

The climb Saturday was the third that has been made since the Y. M. C. A. camp was established. Altogether, 49 boys have reached the summit. Excursions have also been made to the copper mines near Spirit Lake and to St. Helens Lake. In making the latter trip, the boys followed a creek that flows 110 feet in a quarter of a mile. St. Helens Lake is 1400 feet above Spirit Lake.

The fishing at Spirit Lake is reported to be excellent and the boys have one meal of trout almost daily. The largest fish caught so far was 2 1/2 inches long, although 23-inch trout have been caught in the lake.

It is intended to keep the Y. M. C. A. camp open until the middle of September. Each Monday a new group of boys goes out from Portland, part of the trip being made in the association launch. The boys at the camp are not all members of the Y. M. C. A., several Portland church clubs participating in the outing.

achievement of the order both in Portland and in the state generally.

Head Consul I. I. Boak, in his response, said that the spirit of fraternalism and good fellowship was felt everywhere in Portland and believed that all his comrades present thoroughly appreciated the kind words spoken and the kind things already done for them.

"We came to Portland knowing that we would meet not only your best citizens," said he, "but as well our comrades in Woodcraft and in other fraternities, all of whom have dedicated themselves to the doctrine of good fellowship and fraternal co-operation. We are here to emphasize that what is most needed in this economic struggle for existence is the quality and quantity in the matter of home-protection."

"We come to Portland bearing in our hearts the banner of Protestant and Catholic, of Jew and Gentile, of Unitarian and Universalist—confessing one and all before the high priest of common sense and common honesty our belief in the doctrine of the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man."

Mr. Boak concluded by referring to the progress the order is making and to the achievements it hopes to attain for the common good. His address was warmly received.

## Farm for Widows Is Planned.

The session yesterday afternoon was taken up for the most part in the reading of recommendations by Consul I. I. Boak. A project that Mr. Boak especially recommended to the consideration of the session is that of a Woodmen of the World farm for widows and orphans. After reviewing the progress of the order for the last three years, Mr. Boak submitted the following special recommendations:

I recommend that women in towns of less than 10,000 inhabitants be admitted to benefit membership, without extra charge.

I recommend repeal of the accumulative certificate law in its present form, but that it be continued in a modified form and apply only in case of death by consumption, heart disease and certain other chronic ailments.

Provision should be made for the issuance of a \$1000 certificate; also payment of benefits on the annuity plan when requested in the original application, or at a later date when agreed to by regular and legal indorsement.

I earnestly recommend that all future sessions of the head camp be held in Denver, Colo., the home city of the order. Our records are now too valuable and too bulky to be moved with safety from the vaults

or head office building, to remote parts of the jurisdiction; besides, it would be of great advantage to the delegates to personally visit the head office and inspect the various departments of the order's work and see with their own eyes just how everything is done and how it does it.

## Boys' Department Favored.

I favor the creation of a juvenile department for boys between the ages of 12 and 18, to be conducted on practically the same plan as the "Boys of Woodcraft," now in successful operation in the territory of the sovereign camp, Woodmen of the World. Our hope as an association is in the boys of the future, and the earlier we begin training them the better recruits will they make later on.

Our order is now 29 years old, and the records show that we have one member 75 years old, two 74, one 70, six 69, 12 68, and other ages in proper proportion. Gray hairs and weakening limbs are increasing rapidly, and the time is near at hand, if indeed it is not already here, when we could, with propriety and in keeping with our fraternal obligations, provide in practical way for the care and support of dependent widows, their widows and orphans. It should make no difference whether dependency is due to old age, disease or other causes; if related to our fraternal family, they are entitled to our consideration and should have it.

Land is still cheap in this Western country, but advancing steadily in value, and I believe Woodmen of the World farm, favorably situated somewhere in our jurisdiction, where our old and dependent members, their widows and orphans could be cared for at a trifling expense per capita, would be a splendid investment, not only from a fraternal and humanitarian standpoint, but as an advertisement of our peerless order as well. Light employment could be given those able to do it, thus offsetting in a measure expense of maintenance, and encouraging industry, rather than idleness; the whole affair to be handled by a commission or board of governors to be selected as the head camp may direct.

Greetings from the Eastern jurisdiction of the order were conveyed by Sovereign Adviser Fraser and Sovereign Physician Cloyd. Past Head Consul M. T. Moses, of San Francisco, who has attended every session of the head camp, gave the order words of commendation, dressed the delegates and his remarks were warmly received.

## Prize Drills Create Interest.

The prize drills to be given at 8 o'clock this evening at the Army will be participated in by at least 12 uniform rank teams. The companies have been preparing for the event for some time past, eager to capture the principal prize of \$250 and the head camp loving cup given by Head Consul I. I. Boak. It is expected that the exhibition of military movements on the part of the contestants will be particularly interesting. Teams representing local camps will also compete for a loving cup donated by Colonel William Reidt, of Webfoot Camp, No. 65.

The presence of the large number of uniform rank teams is of particular interest to Woodmen, as it indicates that special legislation may be considered during the session of the head camp, in regard to the military affairs of the order. The uniform rank has been maintained for the past several years as an organization independent of the head camp and it is desired by many that the head camp take some official recognition at the present session and provide some means for its benefit and growth.

For the entertainment of the visitors Harry Day, chairman of the committee, has arranged a number of features. Tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock the delegates and officers will be taken for a trolley ride to Council Crest and a band concert will be held. All Woodmen and their wives and families are invited. 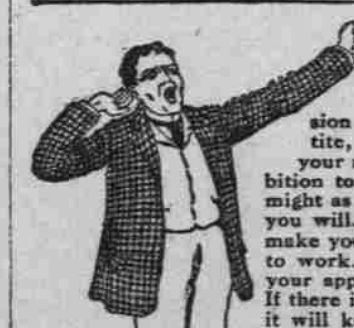
