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Forest Fire Situation Now Critical and Plames Appear on All Sides. Associate District Forester George H. Cecil last night requisitioned the aid of a detail of 20 soldlers to combal the for-est fire now raging in the vicinity of Medical Springs in Wallowa County. The fire is running before a strong wind and is utterly beyond the control of the few forest rangors who have been able to reach the scene. The soldlers will be sent from Vancouver Barracks, and will probably be entrained tonight. Orers arrived yesterday for the dis-match of 100 men to fight the great con-fingration now raging in the Colville Na-tional forest in Northeastern Washing-ton. The men will be detached from the 1,000 who are carrying on a mimle war-fare at American Lake. Timber owners, Forest Service officers and Conservation Society were yesterday considering a request to the Secretary of War for the immediate distribution of a large force of soldiers through the moun-tains for patrol duty. The request is be-lieved to be justified by reason of the dangerous situation confronting the en-tire state because of continued dry weather. If the men can be secured it is argued that they will be able to become unmanageable, and in that way probable loss of life, destruction of farm improvements and great timber losses may be prevented before the rains come. FIRE THEATENS FINE TIMBER Dry Forests in Southern Oregon Ablaze and Losses Feared.

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 12.—(Special.) —Forest fires more than a mile in length have broken out in Beaver Glads, five miles northeast of Butte Fails. This is a district that is heavily timbered with fir and is brushy and if the fire gets a good start it will be difficult to subdue it. The Forest Serv-ice has ordered a ranger with a crew of men to go to the fire. There are several other fires on the Crater Lake Forest, but they have been put out or are under control and are being closely watched watched.

Old-timers say this is the dryest season in the mountains in 20 years, and forest fires are numerous as a result.


HOMES BURN IN CLEARWATER

stances Will He Ever Return.


